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beauty of a sunset, God's presence in the Eucharist, God's wisdom at work in suffering. And just as we need to exercise our natural intelligence if we want it to grow and mature, we have to exercise this gift of faith too. The hardships of every day are the best opportunities to exercise our faith. When things go our way, we do not have to exercise faith to accept them - natural intelligence is enough. When they do not go our way, then natural intelligence is not enough. We have to say: I do not know where you are taking me, Lord, but I know you are still in charge. Sickness, betrayal, accidents, money problems, rejection, being made fun of because of our Christian standards - these things make us blessed, because in them we can exercise our faith in Christ. They make us more like Christ, who saved us by suffering all these things himself. The key to a thriving and enduring plant is a deep root system, protected from adverse elements, a reliable water source, and an adequate amount of sunlight. When a plant must be moved there is an elevated risk of killing the plant, since it exposes the root system and risks damaging it. If you dig it up and discard it, it dies. Plants grow toward their source of sunlight; they seem to strain toward it. Shallow roots, an unreliable water source, and insufficient sunlight may not kill the plant, but they do make it less fruitful or unfruitful. If we turn to Our Lord, seek to live in the light of his teachings with profundity, and trust in him, we will thrive. Even in the spiritual life we can fall into routine and superficiality, but that is because we stop making an effort to go deeper in our relationship with Our Lord. That enormous source of water described by Jeremiah today is the mystery of God. We can try to plumb its depths, but we never will. It never goes dry or gets stagnant. Dryness can occur in the spiritual life when Our Lord is trying to show us that we must go deeper in our relationship with him than mere sentimentality, than an empty stomach, a diminishing bank account, or sorrow. If we indeed place our trust in him, he will help us to grow spiritually with profundity. Let us renew our faith. Let us remind ourselves that earth is not heaven. Let us ask Jesus to teach us to live by this supernatural intelligence, so that it can be a sturdy lighthouse guiding us along this earthly road to heaven.

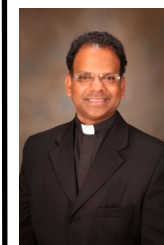

Father Tony's Corner



You never really know someone until you know what they want, what they really care about. Jesus wants us to know him. And so he begins his first homily by telling us what he cares about the most, by telling us exactly what he wants, exactly what he came to earth to give us: blessedness. He wants us to be blessed. In the Bible, this word refers to something very specific: the kind of happiness that only God can give, the kind he created us for, the kind we yearn for in the depths of our hearts and that we can never seem to find. This goes deeper than the superficial kind that comes with money or popularity. Jesus came to show us how to live like that. That is what he wants. He wants us to flourish. Everything Jesus teaches, everything he asks of us, everything the Church teaches about how to live, what to do, what to avoid -these are meant for our benefit, for our blessedness. Jesus does not want us to waste our lives; he wants us to live them to the full. The topic is happiness (being blessed), and in a total reversal of ordinary standards, Jesus links true happiness with struggle, hardship, suffering and opposition, not with the prosperity, popularity, and pleasure that we normally associate with happiness. What does he mean by this? Jesus is not saying that the good things of life are evil - not at all. They are God's gifts and we are meant to enjoy them. But he is saying that they cannot satisfy our desire for happiness. And so, if we put our trust in them, our lives will wither and harden, like tumbleweeds in the desert. No roots, and no fruits. Rather, Jesus is teaching us that the true path to happiness in this fallen world is paved with life's challenges and hardships. These remind us that this world is passing and imperfect, that the only dependable thing in life is our friendship with God. Hardships and challenges teach us to root our lives in the rich soil of knowing, loving, and serving him; then our lives will be like a flourishing tree, with strong roots and luscious fruits. This lesson has to be re-learned continually. Because of our fallen nature, we always tend to think we can find heaven on earth by putting together just the right combination of possessions, praise, and power. But we cannot, as our Lord makes perfectly clear. We are members of the Church militant for as long as we journey here on earth, and that means we need to keep our armor on and our supply lines protected, lest we fall into the enemy's traps. It takes faith to accept this teaching of Christ. Faith is for our Christian lives what natural intelligence is for our natural lives. We received natural intelligence when we were given life. It enables us to know, understand, and learn things about the world around us. It enables us to write poems and read books, unlike animals and plants, which do not have this kind of intelligence. When we were baptized, God gave a new kind of intelligence - faith. This enables us to see things from God's perspective. Faith allows us to perceive God's love behind the

Ash Wednesday (March 6) through Holy Saturday (April 20) as we prepare for the most holy season of Lent through prayer (Holy Eucharist), doing penance (self-denial), repentance of sins (reconciliation), almsgiving (works of charity) and meditating and praying the Stations of the Cross. I’m going to do something a little different this week. I’m going to go back to last week’s second reading. One verse in particular catches my attention.

“But by the grace of God I am what I am.” We are all familiar with the common phrase ‘There but for the grace of God go I.’ We use that phrase when a trait or situation that involves someone else is perceived as less than desirable, and we realize that the grace of God protects us from the same.
