We have one more weekend of ordinary time before Advent begins. Advent, of course, is the time of prayer and preparation for the coming of the Savior. It is a happy, joy-filled time. So why do this week's readings sound more like a lead-in to Lent?

In the first reading Daniel describes a time of great distress to come where many who have died will awaken. Some will live forever and others shall eternally face torture. In the second reading the Letter to the Hebrews, not by name, speaks of Jesus himself; the one who made a single sacrifice (death on a cross) to save the consecrated. And Mark's Gospel pretty much exemplifies the earthly circumstances of the time of Jesus' death. These seem to be readings more fitting for Lent than Advent.

If such a happy time approaches, how do we make sense of such dark and serious readings? Consider that both Advent and Lent are times of preparation. And it's easy to think that we couldn't have Easter if we didn't first have Christmas, but the reality is that there would be no reason for Christmas were it not for Easter. The two seasons are not only complementary, but need each other.

I've often thought we need more than one Lenten-type season a year, more than one time to be sacrificial. Since we are entering another time of preparation, perhaps this is a good time to be penitent. Give up something, be more prayerful, or make a financial contribution to a needy family or charity. Try to extend your sacrifice throughout Advent, versus just a single event, if possible. It won't be easy; after all, it is a time of parties and celebrations. But I bet it will be worth it.

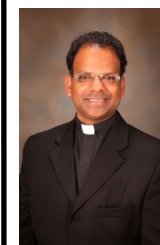

Father Tony's Corner

As we approach the end of the liturgical season, we are invited to mediate on the words of our Lord that he spoke towards the very end of his earthly life, just a few days before his crucifixion. As a matter of fact, some modern scholars and critics do not like Gospel passages like this one. They argue that passages like this were later additions to the Gospels, because Jesus was too gentle and forgiving to say such harsh things. But in fact, Jesus did say these things, and he said them precisely because of his deep love for us. Jesus does not speak about these events in order to scare us, but in order to motivate us. It is so easy to fall into a purely natural outlook on life, getting so wrapped up in our daily to-do lists that we forget the big picture, and we neglect our friendship with Christ. Jesus knows that nothing could be worse for our happiness, now and forever - and that is what interests him most. Even his predictions of the end of the world, then, are a reminder of his endless love. His main point is that with his death and resurrection the Old Covenant will end, and the New Covenant, the age of the Church, will begin. This will be the last period of salvation history. In this period, God's saving grace will gradually spread throughout the world, and the powers of evil will desperately, and unsuccessfully, battle against it. And at the end of the age of the Church, Christ will return to bring all human history to its culmination. Exactly when that will happen is shrouded in mystery, no one but the Father knows. What Jesus wants to make sure his Apostles understand is that it will occur, and he wants them to be ready for it at all times. He actually finishes the discourse by saying: 'Be watchful! Be alert! You do not know when the time will come'. We do not know, because we do not need to know. God has seen fit to assure us that history has a purpose, and that it will come to an end, and that we should always keep this in mind. Through the ages, many Christians have become obsessed with the details of how and when this will occur, often neglecting the whole point of this datum of revelation. It is enough for us to know that we are part of a story that has meaning and that it will come to a definitive end, such that the sun and moon and stars will be darkened - the whole order of creation will be transformed. At that time, we will receive just recompense for how we carried out our role in the story. It is that simple, and it is that momentous. Jesus tells us that the end of history will come, but he does not tell us when, because he wants us to live each day actively, vibrantly, fully. How can we live our daily lives with God 'at our right hand' so that we too can live with interior peace, joy, courage, and wisdom? It means three things. First, it means making our personal relationship with God a true priority through daily prayer, ongoing study of our faith, and frequent reception of the sacraments. This is what we can call keeping a healthy 'God-life'. Second, it means sharing with others the

THE EUCHARIST BY CATHOLIC ANSWERS

Have there been miracles involving the Eucharist? Although there have been no miracles involving the Eucharist that the Church has required Catholics to believe as articles of faith, there have been several reports of miracles that the Church has investigated and deemed appropriate for Catholics to accept. Here is just one of many:

- **Lanciano, Italy, 8th century:** During Mass, the consecrated bread and wine became actual flesh and blood. The host and globules of blood were preserved and are on display to this very day. A team of researchers in the 1970s and '80s examined the host and determined that the flesh came from a human heart and the blood type was AB.
