us off in traffic or fails to invite us to a party. It can be in major ways, like a betrayal or a rejection. But when Christ says 'Go, and sin no more', he is saying that with his power we can truly forgive others. Christ forgives us, he lifts us up, and he tells us 'Go and sin no more'. We need to experience once again God's pure goodness. God always gives us another chance, but sometimes we do not give ourselves another chance; sometimes we do not even want another chance. We like to sweep things under the rug sometimes. Lent is a time when God invites us to pick up those rugs, bring them outside, and shake them out. We each need to ask ourselves if we have really accepted the chances God has given us. We may have given up on some part of our life or on some relationship. We may think we are not worthy of being truly happy, and truly forgiven. Was the adulterous woman worthy? Only God is worthy, and God is holding out his hand, ready to lift us up to a brand new start. If you and I are not saints yet, it is only because we still have some reluctance in our relationship with God. We may say with our lips that we believe in his mercy, but in our hearts we lack trust. There are some walls around our hearts still, and we have not let God in all the way. He wants to come in. He knows that only he can heal the wounds that we are hiding. He knows that only he can give us new life, a fresh start. Today, as we contemplate Jesus' encounter with the sinful woman, let us ask him for the grace to trust him more completely, and to accept his offer of another chance as often as we need to, in our own prayer and especially in the sacrament of confession. And as he comes to be with us again in Holy Communion, let us pray for all those people in the world who have never known Christ's forgiveness, and let us pray that Christ will never let us be like the self-righteous Pharisees, that we will always be faithful sons and daughters of our merciful Father.

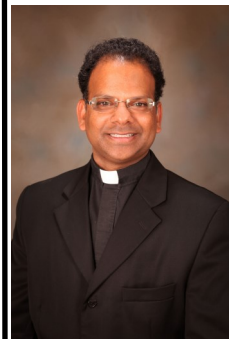

Father Tony's Corner



Jesus is in the temple, and the Scribes and the Pharisees bring a woman who has been caught in the very act of adultery. In Jewish law, the three gravest sins were murder, idolatry, and adultery, and all three were punishable by death. The Pharisees, and the religious leaders of the time, know it. And the woman is expecting death by stoning even though in her heart, she is wishing for a second chance. The cruelty of the Pharisees must be terrible for her, and they really do not care about her. But worst of all must be the shame originating from her sin. We have all sinned. We have all experienced shame, that burning desire to crawl into the ground and disappear. And the crowd is mocking her. Jesus does not ignore or excuse her sin. He acknowledges it and actually tells her to 'go and sin no more'. He does not condemn her. He gives her another chance. Giving us another chance is one of God's main policies. It is called mercy. It is called forgiveness. It is called real love in a sinful, and fallen world. In this fallen world, we are confronted with sin and sinners every day. There are two wrong ways to react to this reality. First, it is wrong to ignore the reality of sin. This is the mistake made by today's popular culture, which considers tolerance the highest value. It is the common attitude that says everyone can do whatever they feel like, that there are no objectively evil actions. In other words, sin does not exist. If we accept that point of view, we end up condoning evil. That is tantamount to approving of people destroying themselves - because sin is always self-destructive. So it is wrong to ignore the reality of sin. In this gospel narrative, Christ clearly condemns the sin. He tells the adulterous woman: 'Go, and from now on do not sin anymore'. He did not ignore the sin. Second, it is wrong to condemn the sinner along with the sin. When a person commits evil, that person is not rejected by God. God still loves that person and wants that person to repent and be saved. As God's children we are called to have the same attitude. In fact, Christ actually gave his life for people who were sinners. He is the Good Shepherd who goes out to search for the lost sheep. He is the doctor of souls who comes to heal the spiritually sick. Only God can see the person's heart. Only God knows how responsible the person is for the evil choices one makes. Only God knows the person's whole history. And so, only God can judge people fairly. When Christ says 'Go and sin no more', it is an invitation to a new way of life. Lent is a time the Church gives us to enter into that new way of life. Let us make the most of the remainder of Lent to do exactly that. When our sins are forgiven, it brings us to want to live differently. It brings us to want to be saints. One very practical result is that it brings us to forgive others. It is very easy to hold rancor in our hearts when someone hurts us. It can be in little ways, like when someone cuts

- **Annual Diocesan Appeal 2019:** Each year, every member of our diocesan faith community is asked to participate in making a gift to support the work and ministry of Bishop Pates through the Annual Diocesan Appeal.
