words and actions of Christ at the Last Supper. Christ took bread and the cup, gave thanks, broke, and gave them to His disciples saying: 'Take and eat; this is My Body. Take and drink; This is the cup of My Blood. Do this in memory of Me'. The celebrant prepares the altar and the gifts, prays over the bread and wine, and helps the assembly get ready for the tremendous sacrifice that will take place in an unbloody manner. It includes the following: offertory song, preparation of the altar, preparation of the bread, preparation of the wine, washing of hands, invitation to prayer, and prayer over the gifts.

Eucharistic prayer - is the center and high point of the Mass that makes Christ present for us in His Passion, Death, and Resurrection. During it, the entire assembly joins Christ in acknowledging the works of God and in the offering of Sacrifice. Includes the following: introductory dialogue, preface, Sanctus, Eucharistic Prayer, thanksgiving, acclamation, Epiclesis - ask God to consecrate the host and wine, Institution - Narrative and Consecration, Anamnesis - Command of Christ through the apostles offering intercessions, final Doxology, and great amen.

Communion rite - is the part when God gives a gift to Him. In both cases the gift is the same Jesus Christ, the Son of God and Savior of the world. It includes the following: - the Lord's prayer, rite of peace (sign of peace), fraction - rite breaking of the Bread, comingling, Agnus Dei (Lamb of God), personal prayer, Communion, silent prayer, and prayer after Communion.

Concluding rite - just as the people were greeted at the beginning of the Mass, so now the celebrant greets the people again and blesses them in one of the forms, either the simple form or a more solemn blessing (particularly at various seasons or on specific feast days). Includes the following: greeting, blessing, dismissal, and recessional hymn. Enlightened may we be able to approach the Holy Eucharist with a little more favor and passion.



**Father Tony's Corner**



Today, we celebrate the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ - also known as *Corpus Christi*. The Latin word *Corpus Christi* is translated "Body of Christ." This day honors the Real Presence of Christ in the Holy Eucharist. It is one of the few celebrations that do not commemorate an event in the life of Jesus or Mary. Instead, it is dedicated to a fundamental tenet of Catholicism - Jesus' sacramental presence in the consecrated bread and wine. This is also one of the few feasts that were promoted by laypeople and only later adopted by the Universal Church. Juliana of Liège, a 13th-century Norbertine canoness, longed for a feast day outside of Lent to honor the Holy Eucharist. After receiving several visions of Christ, she petitioned her bishop to institute the day which eventually propagated to nearby cities and towns. On August 11, 1264, Pope Urban IV issued the papal bull *Transiturus de hoc mundo*. It declared Corpus Christi as a feast day throughout the entire Latin Rite. This was the very first papally sanctioned universal feast in the history of the Latin Rite. Curiously, the successors of Urban IV did not uphold the decree and the feast was suspended until 1311 when it was reinstated by Clement IV at the Council of Vienne. It provides an opportunity to look in to detail at our celebration of the Holy Eucharist, and have a better understanding of our celebration. The Holy Mass has the following parts: - introductory rite, liturgy of the word, liturgy of the Eucharist, Eucharistic prayer, communion rite, and concluding rite.

Introductory rite is that section of the Mass preceding the Liturgy of the Word that confers a quality of preparation and introduction on the Eucharistic Sacrifice. The intent is that the assembled group unite as a community properly prepared to hear God's Word and celebrate the Eucharist. It includes the following: - entrance hymn, entrance procession, greeting, penitential act, gloria, and opening prayer.

Liturgy of the word - is a major part of the Mass between the opening prayer and the preparation of the gifts during which the Word of God is proclaimed, responded to, authoritatively explained, accepted and held fast, and appealed to. It includes the following:- the first reading, responsorial psalm, second reading, gospel acclamation, Gospel, homily, profession of faith, and universal prayer (general intercessions).

Liturgy of the Eucharist - is the major part of the Mass after the Liturgy of the Word and ending before the Concluding Rite. This part corresponds to the
