## Requirements for Baptism at Mary Queen Catholic Church<sup>1</sup>

- 1. At least (1) one parent must be a practicing Catholic.
- 2. Both parents<sup>2</sup> must agree that the child is to be baptized and raised according to the Catholic faith.
- 3. The parents must be either (1) members of Mary Queen Catholic Church or (2) live within the geographical boundaries of Mary Queen Catholic Church.<sup>3</sup>
- 4. Parents must attend a preliminary interview with a member of the Mary Queen Catholic Church clergy to determine that requirements are met and to set dates for catechesis.
- 5. Parents must attend the catechetical session at the time and date determined by the interviewing clergy.

## Criteria for Assuming the Role of Sponsor for Infant Baptism Within the Catholic Church

- 1. Must have received the Sacrament of Confirmation.
- 2. Must be a Practicing Catholic (means regular mass attendance and frequent reception of the Sacraments of Eucharist and Reconciliation).
- 3. If married, must be married in the Church by a priest or deacon.
- 4. There must be no impediments to marriage (means if there was a previous marriage it must be annulled prior to being a sponsor).
- 5. If the there are two sponsors they must be male and female.
- 6. At least one sponsor must meet criteria 1-4.
- 7. A non-Catholic Christian who has received the Sacrament of Baptism within his or her tradition may act in the place of the second sponsor as a Christian Witness.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>3</sup> Geographical boundaries are the city limits of Friendswood, Texas and are set by the Archdiocese of Galveston-Houston. Those living outside the boundaries must provide a Letter of Permission to Baptize from the parish in whose jurisdiction they reside. Note: A Letter of Permission does not force Mary Queen Catholic Church to baptize the child, the right to accept or refuse lies with the pastor.
