You Crowned Him with Glory and Honor

When I look at thy heavens, the work of thy fingers, the moon and the stars which thou hast established;


- ⁴ what is man that thou art mindful of him, and the son of man that thou dost care for him?
- ⁵ Yet thou hast made him little less than God, and dost crown him with glory and honor.



Psalm 8:4-6 offers us a glimpse into God's love for creation, particularly his love for the human person. What is also striking about this verse is that the psalmist marvels at his own creation, his place before the Lord. With awe and wonderment, he infers his own smallness and yet his grandeur in the eyes of God. This passage speaks of our created image and likeness, man as the *imago dei* and our inestimable worth in the heart of God. The Catechism beautifully states that "The desire for God is written in the human heart, because man is created by God and for God; and God never ceases to draw man to himself. Only in God will he find the truth and happiness he never stops searching for" (CCC 27). God's nearness to us is exemplified in his mindfulness for our humanity, his care for us. The only way to understand the human person in his fullness is in relation to God. Only in the mystery of the word made flesh does the mystery of man come to light. (Gaudium et Spes 22). We only perceive, understand, and begin to comprehend our dignity in the encounter with Jesus Christ. St. John Paul's monumental work known as the Theology of Body talks about an adequate anthropology. Theology of the Body expounds on St. Paul VI's prophetic encyclical Humanae Vitae where he talks the idea of a total vision of man. If we were to characterize this age with its confusion and misunderstanding of the human person, one could say we are living in an age rife with anthropological heresies; that is, false and erroneous interpretations of our personhood as created in God's image and likeness. What is needed today is an adequate anthropology, which offers an understanding of man in light of grace, man as *imago dei*. Only the Church bears the full truth of our humanity.



Speaker Spotlight: Lynda Olson and Lindsay Caron On Theology of the Body Parent School



You two met at a women's conference where you both were speaking on aspects of the theology of the body and began to talk about some shared perspectives on how to expand the theology of the body to Catholic youth in our area. Tell me more about that -

We were just finding that many teachings found in the mainstream education programs that deal with sexuality or personhood were either opposite of, or apathetic to our Catholic values. The teaching of gender fluidity as a personal choice, taught in many k-12 environments by people unaffiliated with a child's family group is concerning. We wanted something not just for our own children but for the modern Catholic family who were in our midst, in our parish, in our neighborhoods.

Lindsay, tell me what are you working on?


After looking at several curriculums that taught theology of the body and encountering the everyday difficulties of families trying to incorporate one more thing into their already swamped schedules, I and the team came up with the idea of creating a Scholastic type of mini magazine full of bright, engaging photos and graphics that's easy to use and to have out on the counter, or at the dinner table.

So, this would be a publication?

Yes, it will be designed to encourage parents to be interactive and we hope it will foster communication. It is completely reasonable in expectation - only six to eight pages every month or two. In a single year, families will be able to teach 8 beautiful themes of TOB with a nearly zero-effort formula. We are ecstatic about this because we believe it is finally the answer to many parents' dreams.

How will that work? How will parents access that?

Well, it is designed as an alternative or a supplement, Catholic schools and parishes will be able to purchase TOB Monthly in bulk to send home with children. Children can complete the packet with their parent as homework and return it to school for further classroom activities and discussions that can enhance lessons. Parents and teachers/catechists are best when they collaborate, and TOB Monthly is the perfect model to facilitate this collaboration for the ultimate development of the personhood of each child.



When do you think parents will be able to start accessing this?

We are shooting for TOB Monthly to be ready for order by 2022 and will be available in 4 age groups: Littles (age 1-4), Kids (age 5-9), Middles (age 10-13), and Teens (age 14-18). In the meantime, Lynda, what other resources are you offering?

Well, I am hosting small group meetings for teens and their parents. These small gatherings are usually once/month for teens and their parents and are focused on exploring Pope St. John Paul II's teachings on human love, personhood, and sexuality.

I'm also offering a two-part retreat in Cottage Grove this May at Our Lady of Perpetual Help called *The Original You on Chastity* for teens and their parents - one part will be with parents and teens together (Friday evening) and the other part will be a 1/2-day retreat with teens only (Saturday mid-morning).
