It's an ideal trip - until Michael is swept overboard. He's washed up on an island, where he struggles to survive. Then he discovers that he's not alone. His fellow-castaway, Kensuke, keeps his distance at first. But when Michael's life is threatened, he slowly lets the boy into his world. The two teach and learn from each other until, inevitably, they must part ways.

No More Dead Dogs by Gordon Korman - Wallace gives a thumbs-down to a book much to the chagrin of his English teacher, who sentences him to help with a stage version of the book. Wallace is unaware that his improvement suggestions will wind up changing the entire production.

Maniac Magee by Jerry Spinelli - Jeffrey Lionel "Maniac" Magee might have lived a normal life if a trolley accident hadn't made him an orphan.
