Cycles of Faith

22nd Sunday in Ordinary Time

"When you hold a banquet, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, the blind; blessed indeed will you be because of their inability to repay you." Today Jesus instructs us to be generous enough to serve others without expecting repayment. At least, without expecting to be repaid in THIS life. It's interesting that the Gospel concludes with Jesus' promise that if we follow this teaching, we "will be repaid at the resurrection of the righteous." In other words, God will "repay" our generosity on earth by welcoming us into heaven. Really, what better investment could there possibly be?

It can be tempting to think of our money as purely our own. We work hard to earn it. Or we receive it from others who wanted US to have it. Or luck came our way (and too bad for you that it didn't come your way). We thus feel possessive of

our money and often struggle with the idea of giving it away or lending it without hope of being paid back (with interest!). But today's Gospel challenges us with a different perspective. In essence, Jesus tells us to use our money for the sake of others, not just to assure our own earthly

comfort. As difficult as this request may be, its important to remember that Jesus honors the sacrifice! This is why he promises repayment in heaven. He understands that it "costs" us a great deal to part with the security of using our money for ourselves alone. He understands that in caring for the poor, we risk putting ourselves in their company.

But God's ways are not the ways of the world. Instead of investing everything in a bank, Jesus asks us to invest in the poor. After all, no bank on earth can possibly provide the infinite rate of return that Jesus promises.

Celebration of the Sacraments

Anointing of the Sick • Celebrated twice a year at the weekend Masses. Anyone who is ill, infirmed or going to surgery may request the anointing by contacting Fr. Terry.

Baptism • Baptism takes place on Sundays during Mass or following Mass. Contact Fr. Terry to set a meeting to prepare for the sacrament and set a date. Baptism for older youths and adults occurs at the Easter Vigil or before marriage.

Reconciliation • Before Mass on Saturday at 4:30 pm, after any Mass, or by appointment with Fr. Terry. Communal services during Advent and Lent. First Reconciliation is celebrated during Advent.

Confirmation • Is celebrated in the seventh and eighth grades or at the Easter Vigil. The Bishop visits every two years and we alternate between the two parishes.

Eucharist • First Eucharist is celebrated during April each year with children in the second grade.

Holy Orders • Contact Fr. Terry if you are interested in the vocations of Priesthood or religious life.

Marriage • Contact Fr. Terry at least 6 months before setting a date for marriage. Couples are to attend Engaged Encounter or the Sponsor Couple Program.

Mass attendance is mandatory for those requesting Sacraments, Fr. Terry.

Religious Education Begins September 7th

We invite all youth preschool -12 and adults to participate in our religious education program beginning Wednesday September 7th at IC Parish Center. Mass will be offered at 5:30pm at IC. A meal will be offered in IC Parish Hall at 6:00pm and classes will run



from 6:30-7:30pm at IC Parish Center. Parents may pick up registration packets the night of the first class.

For the safety of our children we are asking parents to:

- --Drop off their children so they may either enter the side door next to the old courthouse or the side door next to the church. Children and adults should not enter thru the front or back doors. If you need to come inside, please park either on the street, in the old courthouse parking or behind the church facing Clay Street so you will not block traffic.
- --Please do not drive thru the alley way between the hall and office.
- --Do not drop off your children early. Playground monitors are not available until 6:00pm. If your child arrives early there will not be anyone to watch them.
- --Parents coming to Mass we ask you to please take your children to Mass with you. Again there is not anyone to watch your child at that time
- --f you are late bringing your child to class, you may drop them off at the basement door of the parish center. Small children should be escorted to the classroom by their parent.
- --Parents may pick up their child at 7:30pm near the basement door drivethru style, by entering the parking lot via Wood Street and exiting on Clay Street. If you need to come into the building, please park your car facing Clay Street so you will not block traffic.
- --For the safety of the children please do not avoid parent drive-thru pickup by asking your child to come and meet you in a parking lot. Grade school children will only be released in the parent pick up line, to the parent or escorted to the car by the teacher.

EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP

I really loved watching Tim Russert, former NBC News Washington bureau chief and moderator of "Meet the Press," who passed away in 2008. I guess what I loved the most about him was his tremendous sense of humility. He was a brilliant political mind, but he always conducted himself as a humble servant of the people and, being a devout Catholic, of his God.

There is a story about Russert's audience with then Pope John Paul II. Saint John Paul II said to Russert, "You are the one called Timothy, the man from NBC? They tell me you are a very important man." The response? "There are only two of us in the room and I am certainly a distant second." This story is quite something standing on its own merit, but many say that Russert was like that with most people, whether they be successors to St. Peter or not.

This type of gracious humility is so very important in our walk as good stewards. When it is through God's gifts that we achieve a certain standing in the world, city, or our parish community, we must never lose sight of the generosity of God that made that possible. It is through and because of God that we are parent, son, daughter, spouse, friend, or companion. The constant striving to keep God front and center allows us to more clearly see the opportunities to use our gifts because it is through this gracious humility that our grip on them is loosened.

People like the late Tim Russert serve as examples of the assertion, "God is God, and I am not." To live in right relationship with God means that we have the chance to rejoice in the gifts given to us and share them freely, knowing that we are sharing with others not just ourselves, but God himself. WHY DO CATHOLICS DO THAT?

Question: On August 29 we celebrate the Passion of St. John the Baptist; can you tell me more about his role in relation to Jesus?

St. John the Baptist is understood to be the precursor. the one who prepares Jesus' way. A careful reading of the Gospel texts also reveals other aspects of the relationship between John and Jesus. The Gospels have John affirming that he himself was not the Messiah. The Gospels do speak of John's disciples so such insistence shows evidence that some understood John to be the Messiah and began to follow him. The Gospel writers make certain that John clarifies his role to eliminate this possible confusion. In the synoptic Gospels (Matthew, Mark, and Luke), John speaks of the One who is to come after him, against whom he cannot even begin to measure up. In John's Gospel, John directs his disciples specifically to Jesus, the Lamb of God. In all four Gospels, Jesus does not begin his public ministry until John is arrested. All this leads some Scripture scholars to speculate that Jesus possibly began his formation as a disciple of John. Through John's tutoring and guidance. Jesus came to understand his own vocation. Once John is arrested. Jesus picks up where John left off, bringing his own style and message to that of John, developing it into something uniquely his own.
