

#### FOURTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Last Saturday, I had to run a couple of errands after Mass, and listened to the Catholic Channel on the radio. There was a fascinating discussion between a religious Sister and a Dominican priest about a book written in 1948 by Father Thomas McGlynn, O.P. entitled <u>Vision of Fatima</u>. The Dominican priest spoke about his discovery of the book on Amazon with a price tag of \$200+. After asking a fellow Dominican if the book existed in their library in Washington, DC, a copy was sent to him and the world of Fatima opened up before him.

With the permission of the Dominican Provincial, the book has been republished by Sophia Institute Press in Manchester, NH for the centenary of the apparitions (at a greatly reduced price from the \$200!).

Now you know that I get excited over books and reading—a pastime that I know not everyone shares. BUT what was intriguing about this book is that Father McGlynn had the opportunity to interview Sister Lucia directly. Additionally, he interviewed her sisters Teresa and Maria (I didn't know she had sisters!) and other people from Fatima as well as some of those who experienced physical or moral healings after a pilgrimage to Fatima. As the interview continued, there were many facts that were recounted that I had never heard. Multicolored flowers that fell from the heavens and corrections by Sister Lucia to a statue of Our Lady that Father McGlynn was sculpting were just a few tidbits that were brand new to me.

So what did I do? I came home and looked it up on Amazon. I promptly ordered it for my Kindle because, heaven forbid, that I should wait to delve into this book head on. And I'm so glad I did! It is a very easy read, but I'm intrigued by the details of the apparitions that I had never heard. I chuckled as Father McGlynn described Sister Lucia's "corrections" to his sculpture, but also loved reading about Sister Lucia's "humanness." Clearly she was not one to sugar coat anything—and when something was wrong, she let the priest know.

It's not what I'd call a long book, but it is one that is filled with beauty, with wonder, with surprises. In this hundredth year since the apparitions, I was looking for something more than the movie "Our Lady of Fatima." I was looking for something with meat—and I'm so pleased that a chance running around for errands produced such a wonderful summer read. If you thought you knew it all about Fatima, be prepared for some surprises. If the message of Fatima and the encouragement to pray the Rosary is all you know, the book will turn out to be a delight. Take the time this summer and learn more about this miracle.

Now I happened to have listened to this interview as we are preparing to receive the Pilgrim Virgin statue this week. All I could think about was that Our Lady is preparing us for a wonderful, new understanding of the importance of her appearance and of her message.

On a similar but different note, I know that I shared with you a couple of weeks ago my joy over the beatification of Father Solanus Casey, OFM Cap. Now I'm practically bursting out of my skin—and not because I'm portly. I just heard that Father Solanus will be beatified on November 18 of this year—the twenty-second anniversary of my ordination to the priesthood!

No matter what Capuchin house I was assigned to where Father Solanus lived, an interesting dynamic existed within the community. Those houses really seemed to have a good prayer life, a good fraternal life, and a beautiful ministry to the poor and suffering. I'm so excited about his beatification, not only for the "personal" connection, but also because he is an American through and through.

If this is the way the summer is starting, it's going to be a great one. If a group of us decide to read the <u>Vision of Fatima</u> book and would like to discuss it, I'm game. The same is true for anyone who would like to read more about Father Solanus. <u>The Porter of Saint Bonaventure's</u> is a beautiful biography of his life and well worth some discussion.

### THE BELLS ARE RINGING...

Believe it or not, there's even more to be said about the use of bells in our Catholic tradition and some interesting facts about our own bell in the steeple.

We were blessed to receive our bell from the Little Sisters of the Poor when they closed their home in Framingham, MA. The bell that we enjoy was once theirs and continues to call new generations to prayer and to remind "the neighborhood" of our liturgical worship at Saint Kathryn's.

It's a beautiful call to prayer before our weekend Masses. For those who have been running close to arriving at the start of Mass time, you know that somehow or another, that bell "lights a fire" in your walk so you get into the church before Mass begins.

But did you know that church bells are "baptized"? Indeed, on the day they are installed in their original setting, the Church provides a ritual for its consecration!

Each bell is named (usually with the name of Our Lord, the Blessed Mother, or one of the saints of the Church) and godparents are selected, usually the do-



nor or other persons with a particular attachment to the parish or to the bell itself. (If anyone knows what the name of our bell is, we would be interested for our history!). The bell is then washed with holy water. The outside of the bell is anointed with the oil of the infirm (the same oil we use for the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick), and the inside is anointed with the Sacred Chrism (used at baptism, confirmation, the ordination of priests and bishops, and the dedication of churches and altars). A lighted and smoking censer or brazier is put under the bell and the bishop or priest prays that these sacramentals of the Church may, at the sound of the bell, "put demons to flight, protect us from storms, and call your faithful ones to prayer."

Think about it...our bell does all of these things and signals to the community the times of Masses, times for prayer, and the times during which the consecration is taking place. So the next time you hear our bell, remember that it's not just making a pretty sound—it's doing the work of God's kingdom!

# **RELIGIOUS EDUCATION REGISTRATION**

Registration for the 2017-2018 academic year for religious education classes has begun. Children already enrolled in the program received the registration forms at the conclusion of their classes.

We have had an unprecedented number of families participating in our early regis-

tration incentive! We are now in phase 2 of registration between June 1 and August 1, with registration fees at \$45.00/\$90.00 per family; late registration after August 1 will be \$50.00/\$100.00 per family. Please be mindful that our classes are filling up quickly. We expect that during phase 2, most families will be able to be enrolled in the group that is more convenient for their families, however, as phase 2 continues, we cannot make any guarantees. More than likely, when we enter into phase 3 of late registration, we will only be able to place children where there are open spaces—which could mean that families may find themselves in both groups!

As a follow-up to the announcement of the restored order for the sacraments of initiation, we need to be clear that the sacraments will be received this year as in the past. First Penance and First Communion will be celebrated in the second grade and Confirmation will be celebrated in the tenth grade. There will not be any changes to the order of the sacraments this year!
