Message from the Pastor

Suicide is painless, as the theme song to the movie "M*A*S*H" goes. This, of course, is not true. Suicide is a devastating tragedy and my prayers go out to anyone who has suffered through a suicide in their family or ever considered it for themselves.

But when we speak of spiritual suicide, it can be seemingly painless, and even enjoyable. I'm talking about the self-inflicted deadly wound of mortal sin. When we freely and knowingly choose an act, which is of serious matter, we basically kill ourselves spiritually. When we sin in this way, we cut ourselves off from the life of God; we snuff out the life of grace.

To commit a mortal sin is the worst thing we could ever do, and the stupidest thing if you really think about it. To cut yourself off from God by a willful choice is to deprive yourself of the life of your soul and risk an eternity apart from God and the joy of Heaven. How could we be so senseless as to ever dream of doing such a thing? But we do.

To commit a mortal or deadly sin, is to freely choose to do something we know is wrong and is of serious or grave matter. First, we must know it's serious and sinful. We could plead ignorance, but that excuse usually doesn't go very far. We should know better. And to not seek the truth of moral situations is to sin as well. There are certain areas of natural law which are deemed obviously wrong, such as the killing of an innocent person. It's up to us to form our consciences according to the teachings of the Church, of Scripture and of Natural Law.

Second, we must freely choose the act. If there is any hint of coercion or lack of freedom because of a physical or even an emotional state, then the culpability is reduced. Our weakness is not an excuse, but the force of habit can be a factor. This is only coupled with the sincere effort at correcting bad habitual behavior.

Third, it must be of serious matter. This is where judgement is required and consultation with a priest confessor can help. Usually everything mentioned in the Ten Commandments is of serious matter. Missing Mass on Sunday is one which carries with it grave matter. It is a mortal sin to miss Mass on Sunday, apart from any circumstance that would prevent you from going, like being sick or caring for a sick loved one. Being on vacation does not dispense one from the obligation to go to Mass on Sunday. One should seek reconciliation in the Sacrament of Confession before one receives Holy Communion the next time.

I don't want you to do the right thing because of a fear of mortal sin. You should do the right thing because it is best for you. But we need to be on guard in these matters. Spiritual suicide is not painless; to die in the state of mortal sin hurts for all eternity.
