Message from the Pastor

WHERE IS THE OUTRAGE?!

Three thousand babies are killed at the hands of medical professionals in abortion clinics throughout our country each day! Three thousand children are murdered, legally, every day of the week! WHERE IS THE OUTRAGE?!

An abortionist, Kevin Gosnell, whose clinic in Philadelphia was discovered to be a veritable house of horrors, with fetal remains in a freezer and the most atrocious condition of both facilities and staff. WHERE IS THE OUTRAGE?! (He is now in jail, thank God.)

African American abortions account for 40% of all abortions in the US, while blacks make up only 13% of US population; this is a form of racial eugenics first followed by the founder of Planned Parenthood, Margaret Sanger. WHERE IS THE OUTRAGE?! (Planned Parenthood targets minority neighborhoods for abortion.)

The effects of abortion on women is staggering. Post Abortion Syndrome affects women years later with depression, nightmares, and headaches, resulting in dependency on drugs or alcohol, and even suicidal tendencies. WHERE IS THE OUTRAGE?! (Abortion goes against an authentic feminism, which includes life-giving and the nurturing of life through motherhood.)

Partial birth abortions are described by NPR as "*performed after the 20th week of pregnancy, typically require that the fetus be dismembered inside the womb, so it can be removed without damaging the pregnant woman's cervix*" and "*the majority of cases, the procedure is performed on a healthy mother and healthy fetus that is 20 weeks or more along in development.*" There are over 15,000 late-term abortions performed in our country every year. Babies are dismembered, meaning their arms and legs are torn off their little bodies. How much pain do they experience? WHERE IS THE OUTRAGE?!

Babies born after a botched abortion procedure are left to die without any palliative care. There are politicians who won't even support legislation that will require medical care in such cases. WHERE IS THE OUTRAGE?!

The major news media regularly ignores the *March for Life* in Washington DC each year and other pro-life stories. Thousands of people, especially young people gather in protest in January every year and most of the news channels don't even report it. WHERE IS THE OUTRAGE?!

I could go on. The fact of the matter is we are legally killing innocent life. Abortion is murder plain and simple. Fighting against abortion is fighting for life; the fundamental right to life. Without this right strenuously defended, all other rights crumble. That is why this issue is so important. The Pro-Life Movement takes in all angles of life issues, but it must focus primarily on abortion, because children's lives are being lost, one every 30 seconds. So I ask, WHERE IS THE OUTRAGE!

The meeting was called to order and opened with a prayer led by Kent Schlegel.

Chris Knatz made a motion to accept the minutes of September 10, 2018, as emailed. Ed Poeppelman seconded the motion.

New Business

Council & Father reviewed the electrical estimate submitted by Harrod & Nagel Electric. One item on the estimate will be asked to be dropped. Some electrical work will be done by volunteers of the parish.

Two bids were reviewed by council to have the kneelers refurbished. It was decided to have Dan Metzger paint the kneelers and Kay Mueller replace the padding and vinyl.

All church pews have been refinished and are ready to be put back into church.

Father Barry held a fundraiser on Facebook which brought in \$14,759 for the church updates.

The painters and artists are making good progress. The sacristy is ready for the new cupboards. Work is ready to be done on the plumbing, electrical and ductwork. All of these items need to be completed before the carpeting can be installed. Council discussed additional painting on the statues. Father will be obtaining an estimate from the artists.

Chris Knatz went over the ideas for the party and suggestions made at the October 4th meeting. A second planning meeting will be held on November 19th at the rectory at 7:00 pm.

Father will be gone from October 15 - to October 26th.
