MESSAGE FROM THE PASTOR

"My body, my choice!" has been the rallying cry for the pro-abortion crowd recently. But is this true? It is true that you can do pretty much anything you want to yourself. However, your freedom is governed by your nature. A human being is not free to fly without technological support, because it's not in the nature of being a human to fly. It does seem that some things within our control can be done freely. If you want to jump off a bridge or put a gun to your head, you can. If you want to eat anything you want or change your appearance in any way, you certainly are free to do so. But...and there is always a 'but', if someone else is involved with that decision, you are not as free or autonomous as you may believe to be. And if the law is involved or social norms or the common good are at stake, then your freedom can be limited in some way.

For instance, if you want to kill yourself outrightly or in effect do that through abuse of food, drink or drugs, your relationship to others has to be considered – your family, your spouse, your kids, as well as your community, job, church and friends. How will this decision affect them, emotionally or economically? So, you don't really have absolute autonomy and freedom to say 'my body, my choice'; that is, if you want to be a part of the wider community outside of yourself. If you lived on a deserted island with no contact with anyone else in the world, then go and do as you please. Of course, there is the fundamental relationship with your Creator, which puts boundaries on your freedom as well.

When it comes to abortion, the scientific fact is clear: it is not only the mother's body that is involved with the decision to end a pregnancy. There is someone else there (in addition to others such as spouse, other children, family and community.) That so-called 'clump of tissue' is in fact a living member of the human species. This is a scientific fact. From the moment of conception, a new individual life is present, with a unique DNA, which will grow and develop into a fully human being. It is not just a 'potential' human life – it is a human being – just not fully developed. It is therefore a person, and it enjoys all the rights and privileges of a person. The fact that it is totally dependent on its mother to live is beside the point; it's the same thing with a newborn infant or even a young child, which would die without the care of others.

This will mean changes to our laws to protect the unborn child. The child in the womb is just as much a person as the infant in the crib. There is nothing that fundamentally changes this fact when the child passes through the birth canal that suddenly makes the fetus become a person. "A person is a person no matter how small." – Dr. Seuss.

So, the cry of the pro-abortion crowd is incorrect. Her choice involves someone else. She is not free to end the pregnancy and thereby end the life of an innocent human being by abortion plain and simple. We call that choice murder and abortion should be, as murder is, against the law. Until we resolve this situation of the fetus being considered property of the mother and having no rights instead of being a person that it is, we will never do away with the terrible crime of abortion.
