### Message from the Pastor

St. Paul makes it pretty clear in his letters that to be a good Christian you have to train. Being a good Catholic isn't just something that we "happen to be" without that effort. In many ways, it's like being an athlete. Two weeks ago, I talked about how St. Francis deSales' book *Introduction to the Devout Life* is kind of like having a coach in the spiritual life and FORMED.org is like athletes watching reels of their games to help them understand and see the fundamental principles of their game. What else do athletes have that would be helpful to someone trying to grow in their spiritual life? A game plan!

St. Francis deSales helps "coach" Philothea - the young woman he was originally writing the letters that became the book - on building a spiritual life. Perhaps his most important point is that the life of a married person *should* look different from the life of a monk or nun. This might seem obvious, but I think a lot of people think that, if they're really going to be "good Catholics", they have to spend every waking moment praying. But how on earth could someone be a good parent or employee or student if they spend all day acting like a monk or nun? The prayer life of a lay person should reflect the fact that God has called them to the lay state in life. So these are a couple of things that I think every lay person could - and should! - do every day to pray like a lay person:

*In the morning:* Spending 10-15 minutes in the morning to bring all the work of the day to mind and to offer it to God. Ask Him for the graces you need to accomplish it according to His Will. It might be accompanied by reading a little bit of Scripture (I'd start with the Book of Psalms and read one per day [unless it's a really long psalm!]), but by and large it is just a morning conversation asking for help. I usually do this with a cup of coffee in hand!

*Throughout the day:* Bring yourself into the presence of God throughout the day. Remind yourself that He's with you in the office or the classroom or wherever you find yourself. Sometime over the course of the day pray the Rosary. Maybe it's during lunch break or in the car, maybe it's all at once or it's broken up over the course of the day.

*At night:* Before going to bed, spend some time in quiet reflection over the course of the day. Where were the times you felt close to God today? Where did I fail and commit sin? Ask His forgiveness for your sins. People feel so far away from God, but when we take the time to examine our days consistently, we begin to realize how present He really is!

These are 4 or 5 simple things that any lay person could do. It might take time to get into the habit, but remember: I'm training to be a good Catholic and with hard work, dedication, and commitment to constant improvement, I can "run the race so as to win" with St. Paul. I can be an athlete for Christ!
