Updated Public Worship Capacity Beginning June 10, 2020 Last week, Governor Walz announced an updated public worship capacity in the State of Minnesota. Churches are now allowed to meet at 50 percent of the building capacity beginning June 10th. This is an increase from the 25 percent capacity that began on May 27. However, all the other safety measures including marking off two out of every three pews are still in place.

LOCKING THE CHURCH

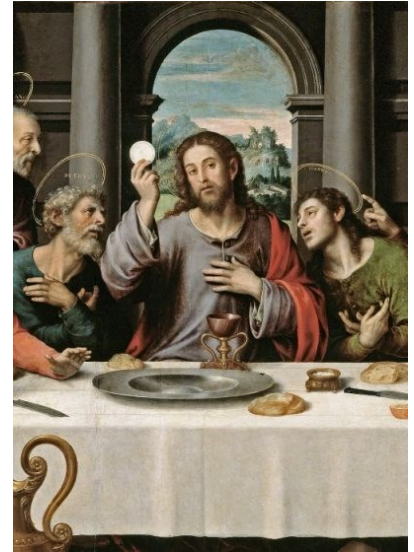
Both the parish pastoral council and parish finance council have discussed in their previous meetings and decided that there is a need to lock our church building at night. This is because our insurance policy requires that the church be locked at night. Secondly, Catholic churches hold the Most Holy Eucharist in the tabernacle and must be protected from vandalism or any other harm. Thirdly, with so many vandalisms and destructions of properties currently taking place in cities across the US, there is a need to protect our church building and its contents from any form of harm. So, this past week, Lawrence Wright, a locksmith from Warroad came and installed an automatic door locking system at the main entrance door only. It is programmed to lock automatically at 10:00 pm and open at 6:00 am. These times can be reviewed as it may be necessary. All the other doors of the church will be locked manually and only opened when necessary.

There is a keypad on the outside of the main door. If you need access to the Church for private prayer after it is locked, contact the parish office, and get a code, which will give you access. Codes may be requested for a single event or for on-going access. Code use can be tracked. The handicap push button works normally once the door is open.

We thank the group of parishioners whose donation made it possible for us to install this automatic door lock system and secure our church building. May the good Lord bless them most abundantly and grant their intentions. If you have any questions or need any clarification, please contact the parish office.

Word of the ‘Living Father’: Scott Hahn Reflects on the Solemnity of the Body and Blood of Christ

The Eucharist is given to us as a challenge and a promise. That’s how Jesus presents it in today’s Gospel.

He doesn’t make it easy for those who hear Him. They are repulsed and offended at His words. Even when they begin to quarrel, He insists on describing the eating and drinking of His flesh and blood in starkly literal terms.

Four times in today’s reading, Jesus uses a Greek word—*trogein*—that refers to a crude kind of eating, almost a gnawing or chewing (see [John 6:54](#), [56](#), [57](#), [58](#)).

He is testing their faith in His Word, as today’s First Reading describes God testing Israel in the desert.

The heavenly manna was not given to satisfy the Israelites’ hunger, as Moses explains. It was given to show them that man does not live by bread alone, but by every word that comes from the mouth of God.

In today’s Psalm, too, we see a connection between God’s Word and the bread of life. We sing of God filling us with “finest wheat” and proclaiming his Word to the world.

In Jesus, “the living Father” has given us His Word come down from heaven, made flesh for the life of the world.

Yet as the Israelites grumbled in the desert, many in today’s Gospel cannot accept that Word. Even many of Jesus’ own followers abandon Him after this discourse (see [John 6:66](#)). But His words are Spirit and life, the words of eternal life (see [John 6:63](#), [67](#)).

In the Eucharist we are made one flesh with Christ. We have His life in us and have our life because of Him. This is what Paul means in today’s Epistle when He calls the Eucharist a “participation” in Christ’s body and blood. We become in this sacrament partakers of the divine nature (see [1 Peter 2:4](#)).

This is the mystery of the faith that Jesus asks us to believe. And He gives us His promise: that by sharing in His flesh and blood that was raised from the dead, we too will be raised up on the last day.
