Some Words from the Pastor

We celebrate World Mission Sunday this weekend. We are asked and encouraged by Pope Francis to support the missionary activities of the Church, especially during these extraordinary times because of the global pandemic. As he says in his message, "In this year marked by the suffering and challenges created by the COVID-19 pandemic, the missionary journey of the whole Church continues in light of the words found in the account of the calling of the prophet Isaiah: "Here am I, send me"(6:8). This is the eve new response to the Lord's question""Whom shall I send? This invitation from God's merciful heart challenges both the Church and humanity as a whole in the current world crisis." The pope goes on to say that like the disciples who experienced a turbulent storm in the sea while they were in a boat, we can also get caught off guard. We realize that we are also in the same boat. We are all missionaries. Let us ask for the intercession of our Blessed Mother, as we honor her during this month of the Holy Rosary, so that we may always have the grace and joy to take part in the mission which her Son, Jesus, has entrusted to the church.

*STEWARDSHIP OF TREASURE

Twenty-Ninth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Today's Readings: Is 45:1, 4-6; Ps 96:1, 3, 4-5, 7-8, 9-10; 1 Thes 1:1-5b; Mt 22:15-21

Status Quo

Perhaps the most shocking sentence in today's Gospel comes from the mouth of a Pharisee: "And you are not concerned with anyone's opinion, for you do not regard a person's status." In context, that false compliment sounds savagely passive-aggressive. These scripture scholars do not actually admire Jesus' freedom, the unconventional way he interacts with men, women, and children from every background. It's possible some of Jesus' peers are jealous of his confident ease, but mainly they find Jesus threatening. Over and over again, Matthew's Gospel highlights the ways Jesus offends the Pharisees and scribes: failing to wash his hands in the traditional manner, for example, or, on the Sabbath, curing diseases and allowing his disciples to pick grain. Jesus does not focus on earthly status and the status quo; his mission is to proclaim the kingdom of God.

The Risk of Discipleship

When we deepen our relationship with Jesus, we follow in his footsteps. Sometimes this discipleship brings about obvious blessings, like belonging to a thriving parish community or feeling good about helping people in need. At other times, imitating Jesus means sharing in his sufferings. Like Jesus, we know the sting of rejection. We fear to lower our social status by spending time and money as Jesus may call us to do. At a social gathering, choosing to spend time with someone who is awkward or unpopular means we are not hanging with the in-crowd. Offering a full tithe to charity means we have less money to spend on trendy items. Letting go of our earthly desire to be admired can be difficult, but the Lord accompanies us in the struggle. Truly, Jesus Christ does not "regard a person's status." Inspired by this divine impartiality, we pray: Lord God, help us to love the extravagant freedom that comes from you. Help us to follow you out of the status quo and into your compassionate heart.

Cyberbullying is still a threat with distance learning

This year, with school starting online children of all ages will be interacting with one another via technology even more than usual. Be on the lookout for signs that bullying is happening via the internet, texting, various apps, or social media – as challenging as it is, monitor both the amount of time your children are "plugged in" and the content of what they are doing when interacting with their peers. Cyberbullying can include the use of apps, texts, photographs, and images that are intended to hurt, harass, embarrass, or even destroy the reputation of a victim. Unlike at school, you cannot walk away from cyberbullying — it spreads instantly, 24/7. Children who are cyberbullied may avoid going online or talking to their so-called friends. Status Quo

Tal vez la frase más impactante del Evangelio de hoy viene de la boca de un fariseo: “Y no te preocupa la opinión de nadie, porque no tienes en cuenta la posición de una persona”. En ese contexto, ese falso cumplido suena cruelmente pasivo-agresivo. Estos estudiosos de las Escrituras para ser exactos no admiran la libertad de Jesús, la forma poco convencional como se relaciona con hombres, mujeres y niños de todos los orígenes. Es posible que algunos de los compañeros de Jesús estuvieran celosos de su confianza en sí mismo, pero principalmente encuentran a Jesús amenazador. Una y otra vez, el Evangelio de Mateo destaca las formas en que Jesús ofende a los fariseos y a los escribas; no lavándose las manos de la manera tradicional, por ejemplo; o, en sábado curando enfermos y permitiendo a sus discípulos recoger granos. Jesús no se centra en el status quo terrenal; y el status quo de su misión es proclamar el reino de Dios.

El Riesgo del Discipulado

Cuando profundizamos nuestra relación con Jesús, seguimos sus pasos. A veces el discipulado trae obvias bendiciones, como pertenecer a una próspera comunidad parroquial o sentirse bien por ayudar a la gente necesitada. En otras ocasiones, imitar a Jesús significa compartir sus sufrimientos. Como Jesús, conocemos el aguijón del rechazo. Tememos bajar nuestro estatus social dedicando tiempo y dinero como Jesús nos llama a hacer. En una reunión social, elegir pasar tiempo con alguien que es incómodo o impopular significa que no estamos con la multitud. Ofrecer el diezmo completo para la caridad significa que tenemos menos dinero para gastar en artículos de moda. Dejar nuestro deseo terrenal de ser admirados puede ser difícil, pero el Señor nos acompaña en la lucha. En verdad, Jesucristo no “considera el estatus de una persona”. Inspirados por esta divida imparcialidad, rezamos: Señor Dios, ayúdanos a amar la libertad extravagante que viene de ti. Ayúdanos a seguirte fuera del status quo y a tu corazón compasivo.

San Juan de Capistrano

Juan nació en Capistrano, Italia, y siendo muy joven realizó estudios de Derecho, llegando a ser no sólo un prominente abogado, sino también juez, gobernador y a los 26 años, embajador. Debido a su vida política cayó preso a raíz de una batalla y, estando en la cárcel, reconsideró su vida y decidió hacerse franciscano. A los 30 años se unió a la orden de frailes menores bajo la tutela de san Bernardino de Siena, de quien aprendió teología y la devoción al Santo Nombre de Jesús. Más tarde, ambos se concentrarían en la salvación de las almas. Debido a sus habilidades diplomáticas, Juan de Capistrano realizó encargos diplomáticos y de cuestión militar por petición del papa en relación a los pueblos vecinos que deseaban echar abajo la cristiandad. Asimismo llevó a cabo la reforma dentro de la orden franciscana e impulsó un cambio notable en la vida de los sacerdotes. Fue un hombre que combinó la inteligencia con la pasión por el Reino de Dios y el amor por la Iglesia, influyendo el Este de Europa mediante su predicación. —Miguel Arias, Copyright © J. S. Isaías nos habla hoy de Ciro, el rey de Persia, ungido del Señor. Dios llama a Ciro por su nombre y lo conduce a servir a los israelitas. En este pasaje oímos que es el Señor quien le da a Ciro su título, quien lo arma contra sus enemigos, y quien abre los portones, y no deja nada trancado ante él. Y Dios hace todo esto para que su pueblo llegue a saber que “yo soy el SEÑOR,” y que “no hay otro” (Isaías 45:6). Pablo abre su carta esencialmente con la misma noción, que sólo en Dios podemos hallar gracia y paz. Pablo también da gracias a Dios en nuestro nombre, recordando nuestro trabajo fatigoso de fe, esperanza y amor. Y en la familiar lectura del Evangelio, Jesús dice a los fariseos que den al César lo que es del César y a Dios lo que es de Dios.
