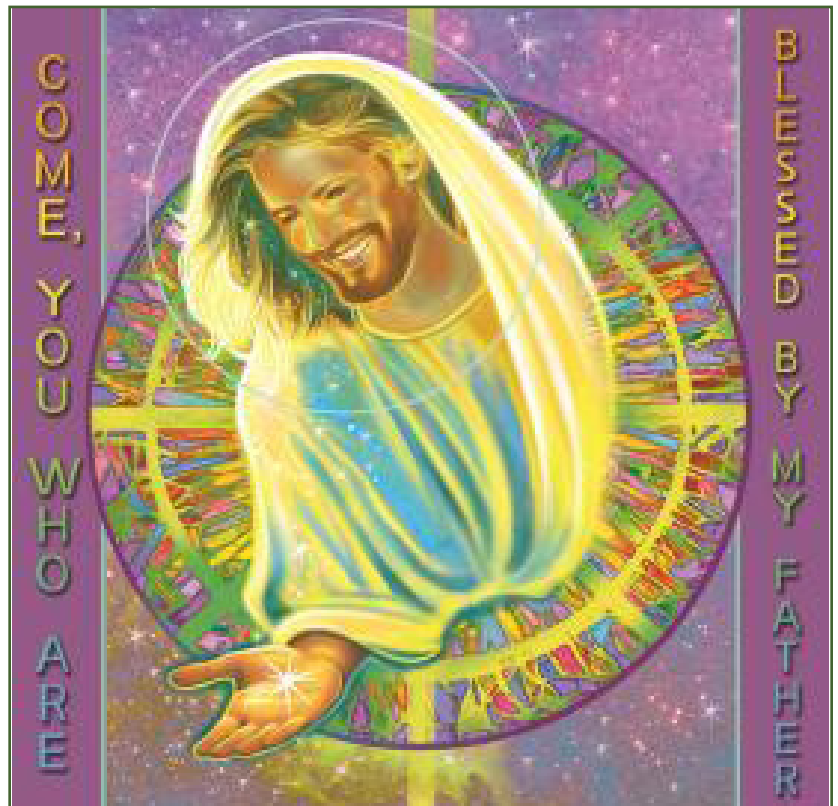

Some Words from the Pastor

Que Viva Cristo Rey! Long live Christ the King! Mabuhay and Kristong Hari! We celebrate this weekend the Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe. It is a grand liturgical feast that focuses on Christ as our King, as we culminate another year in our liturgical calendar. It calls us to rally behind our King, acclaiming him as our just, loving and compassionate Ruler, Great Teacher, Good Shepherd. He is the king of not just a particular nation, or race or people, but of the whole universe. Thus if he is the king of the universe, we should allow his reign to rule in our hearts and in the universe. It is the reign of his love. Pope Francis highlights this in his encyclical Fratelli Tutti as he invites us to establish a social friendship. Reflecting on the encyclical, Cardinal Chito Tagle says that a fundamental part of the pope's vision of a world open to brotherhood and sisterhood is universal love, and said, that only through it can we make social friendship possible. Universal love is openness to the other as opposed to being closed in on oneself - on my group, on my family, on my culture, on my community. Love is a form of seeking union with others. Love sees the value of the others; love celebrates the worth of the others. Love sees what is best for others. And this is how God loves This is how Jesus loves and even died for all. This how the Spirit blows! God who is love is total, full openness. We need to respond to this call to universal love, otherwise there is a risk of allowing this to remain just a mere concept or a slogan. It calls us to be open to universal solidarity

that includes and welcomes everyone, regardless of background, culture and race. It calls us to be compassionate and forgiving. It calls us to be more charitable and generous with whatever we have, sharing them with people who have less or nothing. I believe that allowing this universal love to reign in our hearts, is to allow the Lord to be King of the universe. It calls us to do good to anyone, especially the least and marginalized in society. The gospel reminds us of this, Whatever you do to the least of my brothers and sisters, you did it unto me. At the time of reckoning, before the judgment seat, what would the Lord tell us? It would be wonderful and delightful to hear him tell us at the end, "Come, you who are blessed by my Father. Inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world. You have been good and kind to the least of your brothers and sisters. Know that you did exactly just that to me. We can feel blissful about it. We know that we can only ask for the grace to be able to love as Jesus loved.

*STEWARDSHIP OF TREASURE

Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe

Today's Readings: Ez 34:11–12, 15–17; Ps 23:1–2, 2–3, 5–6; 1 Cor 15:20–26, 28; Matt 25:31–46

Old idea, recent addition

As we celebrate the solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe, many of the traditional hymns and images for the day are joyful and triumphal. For some, these connotations may be perceived as negative. In these days when there are strong divisions within the Church, and when some government leaders are so far away from the people, we need to hear all of today's scriptures, and draw a bigger, fuller picture of Christ as servant king. In Ezekiel, we see God as both the tender, loving shepherd and the one who will judge at the Second Coming. This ties in with Matthew's Gospel and separation of sheep and goats and "whatsoever you do." We pray Psalm 23 with great familiarity and hope. First Corinthians carefully explains to us the order in which all will happen. This is not an evil dictatorship, or a power-hungry leader, but the culmination of a plan that was carefully laid out in love.

Inherit the kingdom

The world in which we live is complex. We are a diverse, global society and there are many issues and opinions ranging from climate change to politics to creed. Sometimes we try and sort it all out, and it is hard to know who and what to believe. One can find multiple takes on the same news story, and social media can easily sway us. Yet when we focus on the Gospel story, it seems very simple indeed. We do not have to know it all or figure it all out. We are not the one on the throne during the Last Judgment. When God starts separating the sheep from the goats, the formula is a simple rule of thumb. "When did you see Christ in others? When did you respond accordingly?" It does not ask if you are Catholic or even Christian; whether you had a police record or an incurable disease; whether you had a PhD or a fifth-grade education, or what languages you spoke. The call is to remember that "Whatsoever you did to the least you did for me." And then there will be the invitation, "Come you who are blessed. Inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world."

The Shepard King

The job of shepherd and the job of king couldn't be more different from each other. Shepherds are on the lowest rung of society, kings are at the top. But God says, through the prophet Ezekiel, that the Messiah will lead in a way very different from earthly authorities who lord it over their people and cause harm with their poor leadership. Our King takes on the job himself. Christ, like a shepherd, will give rest, seek out the lost, bring back the strayed and scattered ones. He will heal the wounded and bind up the injured. Blessed Miguel Agustín Pro

Graham Greene's classic *The Power and the Glory* immortalized Mexico's persecuted Church of the 1920s. But photographs of Father Pro—arms outstretched to image Christ Crucified, kneeling in prayer before the firing squad, crumpled dead on the ground—vividly, visually remind us that not long ago, not far away, the faith we take for granted cost everything! Born to a mining family, Miguel became a Jesuit and was sent to study Catholic labor movements in Belgium in preparation for evangelizing Mexico's workers. But he returned to find a Mexico determined to annihilate Catholicism, and, like priests before him during Roman persecutions, England's Reformation, and in China today, ministered secretly to an "underground Church" until apprehended and sentenced to the firing squad. In his final moments, Father Pro blessed his executioners, forgave his enemies, and shouted: "Viva el Cristo Rey!—Long Live Christ the King!"—his defiant, dying proclamation of ultimate, transcendent loyalty. Father Pro's martyrdom reinvigorated that beleaguered Church, whose countless faithful, never again afraid, would throng John Paul II when he visited Pro's beloved Mexico fifty-two years later.

Cyberbullying is still a threat with distance learning

This year, with school starting online children of all ages will be interacting with one another via technology even more than usual. Be on the lookout for signs that bullying is happening via the internet, texting, various apps, or social media – as challenging as it is, monitor both the amount of time your children are "plugged in" and the content of what they are doing when interacting with their peers. Cyberbullying can include the use of apps, texts, photographs, and images that are intended to hurt, harass, embarrass, or even destroy the reputation of a victim. Unlike at school, you cannot walk away from cyberbullying — it spreads instantly, 24/7. Children who are cyberbullied may avoid going online or talking to their so-called friends. Solemnidad de Nuestro Señor Jesucristo, Rey del Universo

Lecturas de hoy: Ez 34:11–12, 15–17; Sal 23 (22):1–2, 2–3, 5–6; 1 Cor 15:20–26, 28; Mt 25:31–46

Vieja idea, nueva añadidura

Tal vez sea importante recordar que, si bien la imagen de Cristo como Rey ha sido conocida en toda la cristiandad, su fiesta fue establecida en 1925 como una reacción y una respuesta al creciente secularismo, comunismo y ateísmo que después de la Primera Guerra Mundial se estaban cada vez más extendiendo. Si retrocediéramos aun más en el tiempo, recordaríamos que a lo largo de la historia rara vez ha habido un tiempo de paz en el mundo cristiano. La misma Tierra Santa ha sido frecuentemente un campo de batalla. La misma historia de la Iglesia tiene cismas y divisiones; y cada concilio de la Iglesia fue convocado para tratar de corregir alguna noción equivocada, evento mundial o herejías de la Iglesia. Tampoco los líderes de la Iglesia siempre han tenido las manos limpias, y ha habido guerras, genocidios e insurrecciones “en el nombre de Cristo”. Hoy, cuando más y más personas abandonan a una Iglesia organizada, y se identifican como “personas espirituales, pero no religiosas”, la necesidad de Cristo como líder y guía es más apremiante que nunca.

Heredar el reino

El mundo en el que vivimos es complejo. Somos una sociedad diversa y global en donde hay muchos asuntos y opiniones que van desde el cambio climático hasta la política y la religión. A veces tratamos de resolver todo, y es difícil saber qué y a quién creer. Uno puede encontrar múltiples perspectivas de la misma noticia y las redes sociales pueden fácilmente influenciarnos. Sin embargo, cuando nos centramos en la historia del Evangelio, parece muy simple. No tenemos que saberlo o averiguarlo todo. No somos nosotros los que estaremos en el trono en el día del Juicio Final. Cuando Dios empiece a separar las ovejas de las cabras, la fórmula es una simple regla de oro. “¿Cuándo viste a Cristo en los demás? ¿Cuándo respondiste como corresponde?” No preguntará si eres católico o incluso si eres cristiano; si tienes antecedentes penales o una enfermedad terminal; si tienes un doctorado o una educación hasta quinto grado; o qué idiomas hablas. La llamada es para recordar que “todo lo que hiciste con el más insignificante, conmigo lo hicieron”. Y luego estará la invitación: “vengan benditos de mi Padre; tomen posesión del Reino preparado para ustedes desde la creación del mundo”.

Santa Cecilia (Siglo II)

Santa Cecilia es la patrona de los músicos, pero antes de cantar, su vida toda fue un canto para Dios. Nació en Roma y desde muy joven prometió entregarse a Dios y permanecer casta. Su padre no pensó así y la obligó a casarse con un no cristiano llamado Valeriano, quien no sólo respetó su voluntad, sino que también se hizo cristiano. Fue él mismo quien convirtió a su hermano Tiburcio, para luego, ser martirizados ante su negativa de adorar a los dioses de Roma. Al ver la manera heroica en que morían, Máximo, un cortesano se convirtió al cristianismo y también lo martirizaron. Cecilia dio sepultura cristiana a los tres, acción que le valió la reprensión y el juicio frente al Prefecto Almaquio, quien al ver que no desistía de su fe mandó que la quemaran en el baño de su casa, pero el fuego no le hizo nada. Después, mandó que la decapitaran y luego de golpearla en el cuello, agonizó durante tres días hasta que entregó su espíritu. Fue sepultada en las catacumbas de san Calixto.
