*STEWARDSHIP OF TREASURE

Eleventh Sunday in Ordinary Time

Today's Readings: Ez 17:22–24; Ps 92:2–3, 13–14, 15–16; 2 Cor 5:6–10; Mk 4:26–34

Today's scriptures connect the towering cedars of Lebanon from the prophet Ezekiel to the mustard plant of the famous parable of Jesus. Both plants represent the Kingdom of God. Both are also to be understood as symbols of the Church, where "birds of every kind shall dwell" (Ezekiel 17:23) and shelter in the cedar's branches, and the shade of the mustard plant's large branches provide dwelling for the "birds of the sky." Even today's psalm tells of the just one who is like a cedar flourishing in the house of the Lord

Now, the Church is not the Kingdom, but rather a sacrament, a visible sign of it. They co-exist in the here-and-now but also in the "not yet." As Paul reminds us, we must constantly work to continue building and growing the Kingdom by everyday good works of "the just one." So we are all birds and just ones.

"Let Me Tell You About the Kingdom of God..."

The Gospel of Mark is nothing if not a testament to the power of parables to illustrate the Good News through story. Jesus was a master storyteller, who understood the importance of using images and concepts to which his listeners could relate. A seed, a mustard plant, would symbolize one of Mark's signature focuses: the Kingdom of God. Centuries earlier, the prophet Ezekiel proclaimed most poetically to the Israelites, recently liberated from Babylonian captivity, that their God was still their hope, their comfort, their rescue, and their

shelter. Those refugees would understand the image of the towering cedar as a symbol of their kingdom, cut down, fallen, captured. By restoring their kingdom, their God was giving them a new creation (the replanted shoot) and a new covenant.

The Kingdom Come...

Ezekiel said that God would tear off "a tender shoot" (17:22) for this replanting. What does this sound like? Why, Advent, of course, and specifically the words of the prophet Isaiah: "A shoot shall sprout from the stump of Jesse, and from his roots a bud shall blossom" (Isaiah 11:1); and again in Isaiah's Messianic texts we hear: "He grew up before us like a tender shoot" (53:2). Jesse was the father of the great king David and, as we know, Jesus came to be that tender shoot, that blossom, the new Davidic King whose throne, the cross, was once a tree.

God's incarnation in Jesus, born fully human, is the fulfillment of the promise to Ezekiel of the renewed and restored cedar, the new Kingdom. That new creation and covenant exists for us in the Church, through the Holy Spirit making the seed planted within us grow, flourish, and spread. Thus we have the faith and courage to be that visible sign of the Kingdom bringing hope and renewal to the world. We must live Kingdom lives before we can convince others to do so.

Avoiding sexting and building healthy relationships

When teens start dating, they often feel pressure to keep up with their peers and to explore new romantic feelings. But these feelings, combined with teenage hormones and decision-making capabilities, can lead to some poor choices, including sexting. Sending nude images is dangerous and puts the sender and the receiver at risk. Photos can be shared instantly on cell phones and social media, and once out there, the images never go away. Talk to your teen about the consequences of sexting and the importance of building healthy relationships where partners respect boundaries and don't ask for explicit images. Santísimo Cuerpo y Sangre de Cristo

Lecturas de hoy: Ex 24:3-8; Sal 116 (115):12-13, 15-18; Heb 9:11-15; Mc 14:12-16, 22-26

Las Escrituras de hoy enlazan los cedros altos del Líbano que menciona el profeta Ezequiel con la semilla de mostaza de la famosa parábola de Jesús. Ambos árboles representan el Reino de Dios; y ambos deben entenderse como símbolos de la Iglesia, donde “toda clase de pájaros anidarán en él” (Ezequiel 17:23) y se refugiarán en las ramas del cedro, y la sombra de las grandes ramas del árbol de mostaza proporcionará morada a las “aves del cielo”. Incluso el salmo de hoy habla del justo que es como un cedro que florece en la casa del Señor. Ahora, la Iglesia no es el Reino, sino un sacramento, un signo visible de ese Reino. Y ambos coexisten en el aquí y ahora, pero también en el “todavía no”. Como Pablo nos recuerda, debemos trabajar constantemente para seguir construyendo y haciendo crecer el Reino con las buenas obras cotidianas del “justo”. Así que todos somos aves y justos.

Déjame Hablarte del Reino de Dios

El Evangelio de Marcos no es más que un testimonio de la fuerza de las parábolas para ilustrar la Buena Nueva a través de una historia. Jesús era un maestro contando historias, que comprendía la importancia de usar imágenes e ideas con los que sus oyentes pudieran relacionarse. Una semilla, una planta de mostaza, simbolizaría uno de los enfoques característicos de Marcos: el Reino de Dios. Siglos antes, el profeta Ezequiel proclamó muy poéticamente a los israelitas, recién liberados del cautiverio de Babilonia, que su Dios todavía era su esperanza, su

consuelo, su rescate y su refugio. Aquellos refugiados entenderían la imagen del impotente cedro como símbolo de su reino, cortado, caído, capturado. Al restaurar su reino, su Dios les estaba dando una nueva creación (el brote replantado) y una nueva alianza.

Venga a Nosotros tu Reino

Ezequiel dijo que Dios arrancaría “un brote tierno” (17:11) para replantarlo. ¿A qué te suena esto? Como a algo del Adviento desde luego, y específicamente a las palabras del profeta Isaías: “Saldrá un brote del tronco de Jesé, un retoño brotará de sus raíces” (Isaías 11:1); y una vez más en los textos mesiánicos escuchamos: “Creció ante el Señor como un retoño” (53:2). Jesé fue el padre del gran rey David y como sabemos, Jesús vino a ser ese brote tierno, ese florecimiento, el nuevo rey davídico cuyo trono, la cruz, una vez fue un árbol.

Jesús, la encarnación de Dios, nacido plenamente humano, es el cumplimiento de la promesa de Ezequiel del cedro renovado y restaurado, el nuevo Reino. Esa creación y alianza nuevas existen para nosotros en la Iglesia, a través del Espíritu Santo que hace que la semilla plantada dentro de nosotros florezca y se extienda. Así tenemos la fe y el valor de ser ese signo visible del Reino que lleva la esperanza y la renovación al mundo. Debemos vivir vidas del Reino antes de poder convencer a otros que lo hagan.

Evitar el sexteo y construir relaciones saludables

Cuando los adolescentes comienzan a tener citas, a menudo se sienten presionados a mantenerse al día con sus compañeros y a explorar nuevos sentimientos románticos. Pero estos sentimientos, combinados con las hormonas adolescentes y la capacidad de tomar decisiones, pueden llevar a algunas malas decisiones, incluido el sexteo. Enviar imágenes de desnudos es peligroso y pone en riesgo al remitente y al destinatario. Las fotos se pueden compartir instantáneamente en teléfonos celulares y en redes sociales, y una vez allí, las imágenes nunca desaparecen. Platique con su hijo adolescente sobre las consecuencias de sextear y la importancia de construir relaciones saludables en las que sus parejas respeten los límites y no pidan imágenes explícitas.
