While visiting Panama in January I took a boat ride to the


While visiting Panama in January I took a boat ride to the Isla de Taboga, the Isle of flowers. As we walked around the island we were told that Saint Rose of Lima was born there on April 20, 1586. She and her parents lived in a small house on the beach near Playa Hondo on the northern side of the island. The lovely little house is still there. Her father Gaspar Flores was a Spaniard and her mother Maria de Oliva was an Indian. Together they had 13 children. I visited the beautiful church where she was baptized (pictured below).

Shortly after, the family moved to Peru, where Peruvians refer to her as Santa Rosa de Lima de Taboga, and lived in Lima, where Rose helped support her family by carrying out domestic duties and selling flowers. She was a lay member of the Dominican Order and was known for her humility and kindness to those in need. Many came to her for comfort and guidance for their salvation.

She died when she was only 31 and is the patron saint of gardeners and florists. She is honored in many other parts of South America, in Mexico, and in the Philippines.
