Reflections of the Rector



A few weeks ago I bought a new rosary. It's called a *Memento Mori*, or Remember Death, Rosary. I liked it so much that I posted a picture on social media. What made that rosary unique is that some of the Our Father beads are small skulls, hence the name. Because of that, some of the comments I received on social media were that the rosary was macabre, that it went against the idea of a God of Life, and so forth. I understand the reasoning behind those comments, but I do not necessarily agree with them. As forgetful as we are, we sometimes need to be reminded of our mortality.

We just started Lent on Ash Wednesday. Our current rite for Ash Wednesday includes two possible phrases to use when distributing ashes to the faithful, but the most traditional one is, "Meménto homo, quia pulvis es, et in púlverem revertéris," or "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return." These words come from the book of Genesis. Those are the words that God addressed to Adam and Eve after they were expelled from the Garden of Eden. And what does returning to dust mean, if not that we are to die? Are these words so macabre or disturbing that we need not use them in the liturgy? Once again, we sometimes need to be reminded of our mortality, and the beginning of Lent is a good time to do it.

But why do we need to be reminded that all of us will have to face death at some point? The prayer for the blessing of ashes gives us the reason.

O God, who desires not the death of sinners, but their conversion, mercifully hear our prayers and in your kindness be pleased to bless these ashes, which we intend to receive upon our heads, that we, who acknowledge we are but ashes and shall return to dust, may, through a steadfast observance of Lent, gain pardon for sins and newness of life after the likeness of your Risen Son.

Who lives and reigns for ever and ever. Amen.

As we can see from this prayer, there are two reasons to be reminded of our mortality. First, to seek pardon for our sins and second, to recommit to live a life of holiness, in the likeness of Our Lord. And those are two things we can start doing this Lent, and hopefully continue doing for the rest of our lives.

Lent is a penitential time, as we can appreciate by the use of the color violet, and the omission of words that denote joy, like *Alleluia* or *Gloria*. Almost every parish hosts penance services, in which parishioners are able to go to individual Confession after having prayed together. We will host ours at the Cathedral on Tuesday, March 31st at 7pm. We will also participate in the "The Light Is On For You" program on March 10. We will be at St. Boniface, St. Joseph, and the Cathedral from 5 to 7pm hearing confessions. But Lent is not the only time in which we hear confessions. We sin all the time, and because we do not know when we will be called to our final judgement, we need to make sure we are purifying our soul constantly.

Frequent Confession, though, should not become an excuse to sin. Whenever we go to Confession, we should leave with a purpose of amendment, with a desire of conversion. Lent also invites us to that conversion, to a life in the likeness of Our Lord. During this holy season, we are encouraged to do almsgiving, fasting, and prayer. In doing all these three things we follow the example of Our Lord. Like He who gave all of Himself to and for us, we give of what we have through almsgiving. Like He who died on the Cross for us, we die to ourselves by denying our desires through fasting. Like he who was always in Communion with the Father, we unite our will to His through prayer.

My brothers and sisters, as Catholics there is nothing macabre in remembering that we are to die. On the contrary, it is something that we should do often, so that we are prepared. May this holy season of Lent be the starting point for that preparation, and may it continue for the rest of our life.

Sacred Music



Musicians spend years (and a lot of money) learning how to play their instrument. Early on we are taught the basics of music theory, how to recognize the notes on the staffs, how long to play each note, etc. For those of you who took lessons, no doubt you remember struggling to read the music and somehow make what you saw on the page transmit from your fingers and lungs into some type of musical expression. If you (and your parents) survived these early years of learning, you were eventually rewarded with a small amount of satisfaction in "mastering" the instrument.

Many times, though, we are not taught about the silence between the notes. Yes, we learn about rests, how short or long they are, and how to recognize them. But there are also tiny moments of silence between the notes that we need to recognize and observe to better our musical expression. These unmarked moments of silence some-

times make the difference between a decent rendering of a piece of music versus an outstanding and beautiful performance.

There are also moments of silence in our liturgies of the Church; moments of silence that allow us to reflect on what we have just heard proclaimed or Sacrament received. The General Instruction of the Roman Missal calls for periods of silence after each reading (including the psalm), the homily, and after Holy Communion. The Church asks us to use these times of silence to reflect on the scriptures and sacraments. This is the reason the music during communion concludes after everyone has received the Eucharist, so as to give everyone time to reflect and offer prayers of thanksgiving. It's also why it is so important to silence our cell phones, refrain from talking in the narthex (voices carry and are amplified in our acoustics!), etc. I hope this season of Lent you are able to find these moments of silence.

Faith and Sacramental Formation



A very popular Scripture verse to help us reflect throughout Lent is the Gospel of Luke "Whoever does not carry his own cross and come after me, cannot be my disciple." (Luke 14:27) Practicing prayer, fasting and collecting during Lent help us to join in the suffering of Christ and also the Cross. Through the Sacrament of Reconciliation confessing our sins and separating ourselves from earthly things, such as the excesses of food, television and other things that separate us from Jesus, so in that way we will slowly draw our hearts closer to the Lord.

During Lent it is easy to remember to keep our eyes on the Cross, however, we often overlook the second part of this verse of scripture that focuses on discipleship.

A disciple is someone who follows Jesus and shares his mission, his joy and his sufferings. As good baptized Catholics, we have received the grace to live as disciples, and through this grace, we must seek to deepen our relationship with Jesus and strive to live according to our faith in all aspects of our lives.

Although we already know that it is very difficult to follow Jesus and put aside earthly things, let us not forget that through the Holy Eucharist we remain united to the tree of life that is Jesus our Savior and giver of life.

All Catholics should seek to be disciples of Jesus Christ, and the main intention behind the activities and programs offered here in the cathedral is to guide our parishioners and the entire community to discipleship. For example, the time that all people (children, youth and adults) spend here preparing before receiving the sacraments, are offered a beautiful opportunity for everyone to grow closer to God and engage as disciples, since they open their hearts and Souls to sacramental grace.

Because of this, the baptismal preparation also includes a class that teaches parents and godparents about the sacrament and in the same way parents are instructed to increase their commitment to Christ by being the first teachers of faith in those Children who will be baptized.

As you and your families participate in the Cathedral programs, consider how those programs can help you on your journey to discipleship, and in this Lent, take a few moments to honestly reflect on your life as a disciple of Jesus and challenge yourself. to grow closer to Him through his acts of prayer, fasting and donation.




