Treasures from Our Tradition

Charlemagne, crowned Holy Roman Emperor on Christmas Day, 800, had a major interest in shaping the worship life of the church, and began a long period of reform and regulation. We owe many confirmation policies and practices to his rule.

A baptized person was required to be confirmed as soon as the bishop's presence made it possible. Priests were expected to do their best in seeing to it that a newly-baptized child received the Eucharist. One twelfth-century ritual insists that if the child is not yet capable of eating or drinking, then the priest might give him or her some of the Precious Blood on a leaf or a finger.

Pray for Healing from All Pandemics

Speaking about the world wide pandemic, Pope Francis recently reflected on the example of the prophet Jonah. "The city of Nineveh was afflicted by some sort of pandemic – perhaps by a moral pandemic – and was about to be destroyed. God called Jonah to preach a message of prayer, penance, and fasting."

He said that Jonah was initially overcome by fear and so ran away from his mission. God called him again, and the prophet went to Nineveh to preach. Pope Francis said people of all faiths and traditions are called to pray and fast together for delivery from the pandemic, as the people of Nineveh did in response to Jonah's preaching.

None of us expected the coronavirus pandemic, he said. Now it is upon us, and "many people are dying, many of them alone."

The Pope warned those who have not been touched by the pandemic not to rejoice. "Often the thought can arise: 'Well, at least I haven't been affected. Thank God I'm safe.' But think about others. Think about the tragedy and its consequences on the economy and education. Think about what will come afterwards."

He said we unite in prayer today to overcome this selfish attitude. Pope Francis said praying together is in no way "religious relativism". "How can we not pray to the Father of all? Everyone prays as they know how, as they can, according to what they have received from their culture. We aren't praying against each other... We are united in humanity as brothers and sisters."

He urged everyone to ask God for forgiveness of our sins, so that "God might put an end to this pandemic."

Peace of the Soul

Deep sorrow does not come because one has violated a law, but only if one knows he has broken off the relationship with Divine Love. But there is yet another element required for regeneration, the element of repentance and reparation. Repentance is a rather dry-eyed affair; tears flow in sorrow, but sweat pours out in repentance. It is not enough to tell God we are sorry and then forget all about it. If we broke a neighbor's window, we would not only apologize but also would go to the trouble of putting in a new pane. Since all sin disturbs the equilibrium and balance of justice and love, there must be a restoration involving toil and effort. To see why this must be, suppose that every time a person did wrong he was told to drive a nail into the wall of his living room and every time that he was forgiven he was told to pull it out. The holes would still remain after the forgiveness. Thus every sin after being forgiven leaves "holes" or "wounds" in our human nature, and the filling up of these holes is done by penance, a thief who steals a watch can be forgiven for the theft, but only if he returns the watch. – *Bishop Fulton J. Sheen*

Patiently Awaiting Judgement

Matthew, more than any other evangelist, talks about Jesus leaving and returning home. Often Jesus leaves the house because crowds have assembled outside and want to be taught. Today, after having taught and dismissed the crowds, his disciples follow him home, seeking further explanation of what seem to be, at least to us today, pretty straightforward parables.

For both Matthew and Mark, when Jesus is in the house with his disciples it signals a special teaching moment, and it should cause us today to perk up our ears. Usually it is Jesus giving commonsense advice about what it will mean to follow him. Today is no different. To follow Jesus means to be ready to encounter the followers of evil, to have to live and work and preach among them. It means patiently awaiting the judgment that can only come from God, the judgment of justly deciding who will be thrown into the flame and who will live to be a brightly shining saint. Let us heed this house-teaching, for it will be the same for us who follow Jesus Christ today.

God Is Just But Kind



In today's Gospel, the lesson of the parable of the weeds among the wheat is succinctly stated in the lines from Wisdom, which speak of God as just but kind. What is particularly striking in these verses is the balance the author achieves between God's might and God's mercy. In his view, God's leniency proves God's power. As he puts it, "Your mastery over all things makes you lenient to all." The same sense is conveyed in Jesus' parable. There is an interesting contrast presented between the calm restraint of the householder and the high anxiety of his slaves. As soon as the weeds appear, the slaves look for someone to blame. They even suggest that the householder has not sown good seed, and they are ready to act immediately to rid the crop of noxious weeds. He, on the other hand, acts with practical wisdom, confident that his wheat can tolerate the presence of the weeds. He knows his patience will be rewarded at the harvest. The power and patience of God is demonstrated in Romans too, in the intercession of the Spirit who takes our muddled and mixed messages and turn them into prayer.
