SENIOR CITIZEN DAY TRIP

"Grand Old Saint Mary's" 2019 – Changes-Before During and After
Last Sunday I encountered an old altar boy, 1970's, who returned to see the changes in the church. I assumed, as an altar boy he had a close up and personal familiarity and could spot the changes. Wrong! He failed the test. Our church has undergone many changes. Some of these are new, such as the candles around the perimeter of the church, some are old, such as the return of the pulpit to the south wall and some are in between, such as the ceiling. Let us take a tour of the church and examine some of these items. First, we will start at the apse, which is the semicircular, arched roof over the altar. Behind the altar is the reredos, which was purchased from a church in Cincinnati about the time the church was built. It has remained relatively unchanged. In the 1987 restoration, the original high altar was removed. Originally the symbols on the high altar were a cross representing faith, an anchor representing hope and a heart representing charity. If you look closely, the new high altar covers some of the reredos and the symbols on the face of it are different. The three symbols, faith, hope and charity have been replaced by the Greek letters Alpha and Omega. Alpha, the first letter of the Greek alphabet stands for the beginning and Omega, the last letter stands for the end. The two letters the first and the last, the beginning and the end, represent the scriptural proof of Our Lord's divinity. The central symbol at the center of the altar face is that of a pelican. Traditionally, the pelican legend symbolized a mother pelican wounding herself to feed her dying young. Early Christians adapted it to Jesus who gave his life for our redemption. Jesus continues to feed us through the Holy Eucharist. Unfortunately, the symbols are hard to see except when the front altar is moved during the Latin Mass. If you approach the altar from the side aisles to the communion rail, you can get a good look at the symbols. Surrounding the reredos, the wooden structure filling the space behind and beside the altar, is a new wooden structure covering the wall up the painting of the angels. This structure is from a Presbyterian church. Carved into the wooden wall is a tribute to the carpenter's sons who died in 1918. On the right, the inscription reads "To the glory of God and in loving memory of Erwin O. Diefenbach. 1887-1918." The inscription on the left wall is to the loving memory of Elmer H. Diefenbach. 1889-1918. Since they both were ~ thirty years of age and died in 1918, I wonder if they died in WWI. I have not found the answer yet but I am still looking. The large crucifix above the altar was removed in the 1987 renovation. The crucifix was stored behind the curtains on the stage in the Grade School. If you take a close look at the four ends of the crucifix, you will see the symbols that are associated with the evangelists, Matthew, Mark, Luke and John. At the top is a winged man representing Matthew, on the right is a winged ox - Luke, at the bottom is an eagle - John and on the left a winged lion - Mark. To be continued.
