SENIOR CITIZEN DAY TRIP

"Grand Old Saint Mary's" 2019

Changes-Before, During and After-Part 3

To continue last week's exploration of the apse area of the church and the changes, or those things that have remained the same over time. The reredos, the wood structure that covers the back of the apse area, contains three statues. The first is the center statue of Mary, Mother of God presenting the infant Jesus to the congregation. The infant Jesus has his right hand raised in benediction, a gesture used to perform blessings. The wooden statue is one of ten originally placed in the church, it is thought, but not verified, that they were purchased, along with the reredos, from a church in Cincinnati, when Saint Mary's was built in 1865. The statue on Mary's right, our left is Saint Catherine of Alexandria, a virgin, scholar and martyr, who converted at the age or fourteen and converted hundreds of people before her martyrdom at age eighteen. Her conversion of so many people, including the wife of the emperor Maxentius, so angered him that he ordered her condemned to death on a spiked wheel which is at her side on the statue. In her left hand she holds a palm frond which represents martyrdom. Catherine was identified by Joan of Arc as one of the saints who appeared to and counselled her. The statue on Mary's left, our right, is that of Saint Boniface of Mainz. Saint Boniface was known as the "Apostle of the Germans. He was born Winfred (later renamed Boniface by Pope Gregory II) c. 675 in Crediton, England. Boniface was ordained a priest at the age of thirty and in the year 716, he became a missionary to the Germanic area of Europe. During his mission work, in order to counter some of the pagan rituals, one of which was a sacred tree dedicated to the god Thor. He chopped it down using the ax at the foot of his statue. When it fell it split into four parts in the shape of a cross. In 738, he was raised to the position of archbishop, thus the garb of a bishop, over all Germany east of the Rhine. In 754, while preparing to baptize a large number of converts in Frisia (now parts of the Netherlands and Germany), his group was attacked by robbers and he and all of his followers were killed after he told them to lay down their arms: "Cease fighting. Lay down your arms, for we are told in Scripture not to render evil for good but to overcome evil by good." As a result, they were all martyred. The robbers opened the chests and boxes that carried the belongings of Boniface's goods and found only papers and books. The books and papers were found later pierced by knives and swords. Boniface is shown clutching a book with a knife stuck in it.

There are two more items of the apse area of interest, one missing and one new. The missing items are small shelves, one on either side of the apse area. The shelf on the left side held the cruets, patens and associated items. The shelf on the right side held the missal stand. A table on the right side by Joseph's altar now replaces both shelves. The new items are light covers by the sacristy doors. The cover on the left is St. Peter, the one on the right, St. Paul. These lights provide illumination for areas of the apse and reredos. Next week we will look at the side altars, ambo, pulpit, and the rest of the church.
