Violence Against Women

We pray for women who are victims of violence, that they may be protected by society and have their sufferings considered and heeded.



In reflecting on the different traditions and practices that make up our Lenten journey, here are some brief thoughts and history on the Way of the Cross. It is of course better known as the Stations of the Cross or also in Latin *Via Crucis* or *Via Dolorosa* (the Way of Sorrows). The object of these statues, paintings, and images of Christ's passion are meant to allow the faithful to do a miniature pilgrimage to Jerusalem without leaving their own town. It is a beautiful devotion that is based on our desire to visit the sites of Jesus' road to Calvary, which opens our road to heaven. Tradition tells us that Mary would visit the places of Her Son's passion, so this would make it other than the Mass, one of the oldest devotions of the Church.

Pilgrims from Jerusalem inspired by visiting and praying at the different places of Jesus' Passion, brought back their experiences and over time inspired artists to make representations of these in monasteries and Churches and the devotion grew. Interestingly, there have been additional stations and so the number was not always fourteen, with some variations up to 31 including stations that focused on Mary's school and the houses of Herod and Simon the Pharisee and some that included the Agony in the Garden. Regardless, this is a great devotion not just for Friday's in Lent, but for every Friday of the year. Also, if you cannot come physically to the Church to pray them, we have book and online versions to pray as well. Let us continue to grow closer to Jesus this Lent and allow His Passion to inspire us to serve our parishes and communities as well.

PRAY THE ROSARY

DIOCESAN LENTEN REGULATIONS

Easter Duty: All the faithful are bound by the obligation of receiving Communion at least once a year.

Fast: Ages 18-60 are allowed one full meal on Ash Wednesday & Good Friday. Two other meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken, but they should not together equal one full meal. No eating between meals, but liquids are allowed.

Abstinence: Ages 14 and older are allowed no meat each Friday of Lent, unless health would seriously be affected.

In addition, acts of penance are to be chosen by each person according to circumstances; including increased prayer life, greater effort in the pursuit of virtue and voluntary surrender of pleasures.

Parents are to see to it that minors are educated in an authentic sense of Penance.

GOSPEL REFLECTIONS:

GN 22:1-2, 9a, 10-13, 15-18; PS 116:10, 15, 16-17, 18-19; ROM 8:31b-34; MK 9:2-10

Today's readings are a powerful testimony to God's profound love for each one of us. It is a reminder for us. Christian stewards, to all surrender that we have to the Gracious Giver.

The First Reading from Genesis is the

infamous story of God putting Abraham to the test. God commands Abraham to offer his son, Isaac, to the Lord as a sacrifice. Abraham obeys the Lord. Yet, a messenger of the Lord cries out at the last moment to stop him. Because of Abraham's faithfulness and surrender to the Lord, he is blessed abundantly.

We can only imagine how Abraham felt, offering the life of his son, not understanding why, but blindly obeying. Yet, Abraham's response of total surrender to God's plan is a testament to trust in God's deep love for us. As Christian stewards, we are called to surrender all to the Lord — our time, our talents and even our material possessions. We should willingly give God our entire lives with the confidence that He will take care of us.

St. Paul echoes this message so beautifully in our Second Reading. He says, "He who did not spare his own Son but handed him over for us all, how will he not also give us everything else along with him?" God loves us so much that He gave us His only Son who suffered, died and rose for us. He has given us His very best. Can we not entrust our entire lives to Him knowing He will continue to pour out His love on us? As we continue our journey through Lent, let us reflect on God's profound love for us.
