Dear Disciples of Christ,

Jesus gave his whole life in loving service of others, especially the poor, the sick, the lost, and those forgotten by society. Day after day he brought the love and mercy of God to those considered unworthy by many people of the time, healing their broken bodies and forgiving their sin-sick souls.

In Matthew 25:35-40, Jesus tells his disciples a parable about the sheep and the goats. He makes it clear that at the end of our lives we will be judged by how we have treated the poor and vulnerable, for Jesus is present in just such people in need:

“For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, a stranger and you welcomed me, naked and you clothed me, ill and you cared for me, in prison and you visited me.’ Then the righteous will answer him and say, ‘Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you drink? When did we see you a stranger and welcome you, or naked and clothe you? When did we see you ill or in prison, and visit you?’ And the king will say to them in reply, ‘Amen, I say to you, whatever you did for one of these least brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me.” Mt 25:35-40

So to be a true disciple of Jesus requires more than simply believing in him, attending mass, and praying. Following Jesus means doing what Jesus has called us to do: to reach out in loving service to those around us, especially the poor and forgotten.

As you fulfill your service hours this year, bear all of this in mind. Service is not a burdensome requirement imposed by a religious education program, but rather a calling from Christ to participate in the exciting adventure of his mission. May you be blessed by his love.

The Diocesan policy regarding Confirmation preparation states that one of the components of preparation should be “involvement in service, reflecting Christ’s social mission”, which helps develop the candidate’s faith and personal growth. The list and requirements below were developed to be in line with the Diocesan policy. This is not to imply that other service activities are not worthy activities but it is a means to insure that the Confirmation candidate is involved in service that reflects Christ’s social mission and helps them grow and develop their faith.

Students should bear this in mind when creating their own service activities or signing up for those offered by others. The RE Office will email out any service opportunities that arise and meet the policy above.

The required number of activities must include a minimum of two activities from within the church and two from the larger community. An activity may not be used more than twice for the service requirement.

Categories of Service Hours

Category I. Service within the Church: the family of faith

A. The service of worship

- Attending a **weekday** mass.

B. The service of prayer

- Leading a family Rosary, attending Stations of the Cross.

- Spending an hour with Jesus in the Adoration Chapel.

C. The service of fellowship

- Helping with set up, take down or serving at a parish social function: Christmas bazaar, CRHP, Helping Hands, etc.

Category II. Service beyond the Church: the human family

F. The service of justice

- Participating in pro-life work: praying at a clinic, attending a march.

- Advocating on behalf of marginalized groups: writing to legislators.

G. The service of charity

- Helping the elderly in their homes, visiting them in nursing homes.

- Serving at a food pantry, homeless shelter, or soup kitchen.

- Raising money for a charitable cause.

8th Grade

Journals due at 8th Grade Sponsor Sessions in **MARCH**.

Instructions for Recording Service

1. Fill out the top portion of the back cover of this booklet.
2. For each service activity you do, fill out a page from this journal.
3. Have an adult witness from the event sign your record.
Service Activities will only be counted if there is an adult signature.
So remember to bring your book to each event or you can tear out a sheet from the book to bring to the event and then staple it back into the book.
4. Write a brief reflection (3-5 sentences) on your experience of the service.
What did you learn about doing service, other people, yourself, and God through the experience?
All service activities must have a written reflection to be counted.
Please write legibly, print if necessary.
5. Sign each page when you have completed it.
