### Guidelines for Resumption of Public Masses @ St. Peter-All Hallows' Parish.

**1. Space is limited to 85 and attendees must call office @ 916-456-7206, to reserve seating. You must call every week no later than Thursday at 12 noon, prior to each weekend. Vulnerable ages 65+ and persons with compromised health are asked to continue with shelter-in-place, until further notice. Masses will continue to be Live Streamed at 10:30a.m. + 12:30p.m. every Sunday.**

**2. Attendees MUST wear face masks and temperatures will be taken before Mass with hand sanitizer available at the entrance. Please arrive 20 minutes ahead of time to check in.**

**3. Enter and exit through the main front door only. Doors will be closed during Mass. Once we reach 85 people, the doors will be closed and no one else let in.**

**4. Ushers will provide directions or additional instructions as you enter the vestibule. Please practice patience.**

**5. Only pews marked with safe distancing can be filled, families who live together may sit together. The Chapel will remain closed.**

**6. Communion to the homebound is halted until further notice.**

**7. Communion will only be distributed on the hand. Extend your hand to receive the host. Take a step to the side, remove your mask and consume the host. Once you have consumed the host place your mask back on and return to your pew.**

**8. Please keep your face mask on until you enter your car. Gathering of people outside is not recommended.**

**9. Reminder If you are feeling sick or exhibiting symptoms, PLEASE STAY HOME**

**10. If you have been in contact with someone with COVID-19, PLEASE STAY HOME.**

**11. Please note that your mask needs to cover your mouth and nose!**

### Reflection on the Feast of Corpus Christi

Processions marked the Solemnity of Corpus Christi since Catholics began celebrating it in 13th century France. After Sunday Mass parishioners marched through the town behind a monstrance displaying a host before returning it to the church tabernacle for adoration. They had a glorious sense of the mysterious reality of Christ present in both the host and the as church. The procession was also an echo of the Exodus experience. Understanding the solemnity in this light is important.

Bread was always sacramental. The Hebrews slaves eat unleavened bread in haste, expecting their imminent freedom. God then fed them miraculously with mana from heaven, as they wondered in the wilderness. Christ celebrated this Passover tradition on Holy Thursday. But Jesus now offered his own body, not mana, as the food that would sustain us in our wilderness journey.

The early Christians held their Eucharistic gatherings in peoples' homes. Several families would take a weekly meal gathered together. Each family brought their own food. As disparities between wealthy and poor Christians became divisive, they dropped the secular meal while retaining the sacramental bread and wine. That was enough to sustain them in their faith. St Paul said communion also sustained unity in the face of persecution and suffering.

In its constitution on the church, the bishops of Vatican II said that we are "... pilgrims in a strange land, following in trial and oppression the paths [Christ] trod, we are associated with his sufferings as the body with its head, suffering with him, that with him we may be glorified." In the breaking of the bread we are united with all people who suffer the oppression of racism, injustice, and poverty. Pope Francis said that communion is food for the journey, not a reward for the righteous. Today, our wilderness is vast and our hunger is deep. Thankfully, we have food for the journey.
