Guidelines for Resumption of Public Masses @ St. Peter-All Hallows' Parish.

We are pleased to resume the Celebration of Mass in our Church.

- 1. Church Reopening: Saturday, June 13th & Sunday, June 14th, with all seven Masses.
- 2. Space is limited to 71 and attendees must call the office @ 916-456-7206, to reserve seating. You must call every week no later than 12:00pm Thursday prior to each weekend. Vulnerable ages 65+ and persons with compromised health are asked to continue with shelter-in-place, until further notice. Masses will continue to be Live Streamed at 10:30a.m. + 12;30p.m. every Sunday.
- 3. Attendees MUST wear face masks and temperatures will be taken before Mass with hand sanitizer available at the entrance. Please arrive 20 minutes ahead of time to check in.
- 4. Enter and exit through the main front door only. Doors will be closed during Mass. Once we reach 71 people, the doors will be closed and no one else let in.
- 5. Ushers will provide directions or additional instructions as you enter the vestibule. Please practice patience.
- 6. Only pews marked with safe distancing can be filled, families who live together may sit together. **The Chapel will remain closed.**
- 7. Communion to the homebound is halted until further notice.
- 8. Communion will only be distributed on the hand. Extend your hand to receive the host. Take a step to the side, remove your mask and consume the host. Once you have consumed the host place your mask back on and return to your pew.
- 9. Please keep your face mask on until you enter your car. Gathering of people outside is not recommended.

Reflection on 12th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Jesus had been teaching his disciples about the Reign of God privately. Still, in today's reading from Matthew, he sends them out to proclaim the message publically. In doing so, they will face, "Terror on every side!" But Jesus tells them to, "Fear no one." Except for those who can destroy both body and soul in Gehenna." Who are they, and what is Gehenna?

Gehenna has become synonymous with hell. It was an actual place just outside ancient Jerusalem. In Jesus' time, it was a garbage dump and would have had fires burning continuously. When modern archeologists excavated the site, they found the ruins of a pagan temple beneath the ancient rubbish. They also found the remains of children used as human sacrifice. The Jewish people tore down the temple in disgust and turned the site into a garbage dump to show their contempt for child sacrifice. Today we cherish our children as much as our Jewish ancestors did.

Catholics have long supported the rights of the unborn. More recently, we have opposed our government's separation of children from their families at our southern border. On these issues, we have been faithful to Jesus' direction to proclaim the gospel from the housetops. Our voices are not as loud in denouncing other evils afflicting our children. We have not adequately addressed the clerical and Episcopal misconduct of the sexual abuse scandal. Nor have we pressed our government to regulate hate speech and online bullying on social media, which affects so many of our young people. What have we done to address the inequalities in our educational systems? Poor neighborhoods have chronically underperforming schools. Our college graduates begin their work loves thousands of dollars in student debt. For the first time in our history, experts tell us we cannot deliver on the promise that our children will do better than their parents. In the light of all this and more, what would Jesus have us do?

Pray. Inform ourselves about the ways we are sacrificing our children. Lobby our representatives. Proclaim the gospel from the housetops. "Fear no one." And as Jeremiah says, ". . . praise the Lord for he has rescued the life of the poor from the power of the wicked."
