Act of Spiritual Communion:

O my Jesus, I believe that you are truly present in the Most Holy Sacrament of the altar. I love you above all things and desire to receive you in the Eucharist. Since I cannot receive you sacramentally at this time, I beg you, dear Lord, come into my heart spiritually and refresh my soul. I adore you with profound reverence; I embrace you and unite myself wholly to you. Never permit me to be separated from you.

Please be on time for mass! Doors will close at the start of mass and will remain closed. If you are late you will not be allowed in.

Reflection on 29th Sunday in Ordinary Time

This year's presidential election is the most contentious in living memory. In today's gospel, Jesus' opponents try to trap him politically with a question about taxes. His response, render unto Caesar that which is Caesar's and to God, that which is God's, baffles them. How can his advice inform Christian voters today? The faithful must make an informed, conscientious decision and then act in a way that fulfills both a civic duty and religious conviction. Let's try to apply this to the two most pressing issues of the election, the economy, and health care. The two parties are opposites in their approaches to health care. The Democratic plan to deal with the pandemic emphasizes its seriousness and responds aggressively with face coverings and physical distancing. The Republican strategy is to downplay the dangers of the disease and let it spread among younger people to achieve herd immunity. Both parties are pressing for a vaccine. The Democrats are proposing Medicare for all who need it to provide insurance for all Americans. Republicans are challenging the Affordable Care Act in the Supreme court. It would strip health insurance from over 20 million Americans and exempt insurance companies from covering patients with preexisting conditions. Health care is a policy issue, but there is also a religious dimension to it. As a disciple of Christ, I would measure both policy proposals against the example of Jesus' ministry and teachings. He healed all the sick who came to him, including foreigners. He never charged the sick, demanded a copay, or refused anyone because of a preexisting condition. In economic matters, Jesus focused on the poor. He fed the hungry, commanded his disciples to share the needy, and even advised a rich young man seeking heaven to sell all his possessions and give the poor money. The Democratic candidate would repeal tax breaks for large corporations and the wealthy while raising taxes on Americans earning over \$400,000 per year. The Republican candidate for president would keep recently enacted tax breaks for large corporations and the wealthy. Again, some apparent differences between the two candidates. Should there be another presidential debate, I would love to see the moderator give each of the debaters a coin and pose the same question that Jesus faced. While no candidate could ever completely mirror Christ's vision, I have a feeling that the Democratic candidate would present his case and let the faithful voters pass judgment. I can see the Republican candidate pouting because the image on the coin is Caesar's and not his.
