Parish Upgrades

Our most recent project walled off and secured our trash bins addressing several longtime issues. We no longer have scavengers rifling through our garbage strewn discarded trash throughout the grounds. We've halted the illegal dumping of garbage in our trash receptacles. And perhaps most importantly we have removed an unsightly eyesore from the grounds. Reflection on Feast of All Saints

Remember bookstores? They always had an entire section reserved for self-help books on personal development, success, finding happiness, or leading a good life. The Sermon on the Mount in Matthew's Gospel would probably be found in this section. However, the virtues and qualities that Jesus associates with a good or happy life contrast with contemporary wisdom. Virtues like poverty of spirit, mournfulness, and meekness, stressed by Jesus in the Beatitudes, are counter cultural. How can meekness lead to success? The thesaurus says that the word patience is synonymous with this virtue. It seems to fit.

As a High School religion teacher, I started every class with a reading of the day's Gospel. I would not proceed with the class until at least one student could find a connection in the Gospel reading to what we were studying or to what was going on in our lives and society. Often, after a student read the Gospel, there was a prolonged period of Silence. It seemed to last forever. But I always waited until someone could make the connection. Patience paid off for my students and me. We could find the Gospel's relevance in our lives. It was enriching. But patience is not passivity.

Sometimes we can mistake failing to act for patience. Tolerating an abusive relationship in the false hope that things will get better is not being patient. The victim is frozen by fear and the other psychological forces that are a part of the toxic relationship. It's hard to tell the difference between virtue and iniquity.

A Cardinal gave a keynote address at a Catholic educational conference I attended. Following his presentation, a teacher from an all-girls Catholic high school of high-achievers lamented that few of his students considered pursuing careers in the church. He observed that these students could succeed in every professional field except in the church. What should he tell these young women when they ask about women's ordination? The Cardinal replied, "Tell them to be patient." A woman sitting next to me rose and said, "We've been patient for 2,000 years. Shouldn't we act now?" The Cardinal did not respond. Patience or passivity? Happy feast day!
