Reception of Holy Communion:

Beginning Sunday, November 29, 2020, weather permitting, we will be offering the reception of Holy Communion after the 10:30am and the 12:30pm Live Streamed Masses. This will take place outside in the church parking lot. Father will confirm if communion will be happening following the virtual mass. Make sure that you tune in to the virtual mass and not just show up.

Communion will take place immediately after the Final Blessing.

Parishioners will be expected to line up by the Statue of Mary, directly across from the east side parking lot. Communion recipients will need to be 6 feet apart and wearing a mask that covers both the nose and mouth. After receiving communion, you must leave immediately.

Support AB-15, which will extend the eviction moratorium through the end of the year

According to Assembly Bill 3088, on February 1st, 2021, millions of California tenants could be evicted for unpaid rent during the COVID-19 pandemic if they don't pay at least 25% of their monthly rent that was due between September 1, 2020 and January 31, 2021. To make it worse, one month later starting March 1st, 2021, landlords will be able to sue tenants for all unpaid rent in small claims court. However for millions that lost their income during the pandemic, many have not been able to return to work and federal unemployment benefits have run out, and many others were never able to receive unemployment in the first place. Unless a new bill is passed in January - AB15 - we will begin to see a mass tsunami of evictions, with thousands pushed into homelessness and a level of economic poverty from which they will never be able to recover.

Reflection on Second Sunday in Ordinary Time

Growing up in the late 1950s and early 1960s, my religious education centered on the Baltimore Catechism. It was comprised of 499 prepackaged questions and concise answers concerning Catholic dogma and doctrine. They required me to memorize not only the answers to the questions but also the questions themselves. My teacher, always a nun, would point to a student and just say the number of the question. The victim took it from there. Being good at memorization, I did well but, I rarely understood what I was mouthing. They were never my questions.

When I became a teacher, I was determined to get my students to ask their own questions. That's why I love today's readings. In John's Gospel, the first words out of Jesus' mouth are a question to a pair of would-be disciples. "What are you looking for?" Jesus was asking, what do you want? That's not a catechism question. If you were face to face with God, knowing full well that God would respond, what would you ask for? They just wanted to know where he was staying.

Not exactly a profound question, but Jesus' answer to that question was life-changing. Instead of telling them where he was staying, Jesus invited them to come and see for themselves. They followed him and saw not only where he lived but how he lived. That changed everything. The two disciples joined Christ in a life of love, service, and self-sacrifice. Not an easy life. Many disciples suffered dearly for their faith. But after a life well lived there was the hope of resurrection.

When you are praying and you feel that God is really listening and will answer your prayer, make your petition. Just be careful what you ask for. The answer may not be what you expect.
