Update of COVID Precautions from Bishop Jaime Soto:

Bishop Soto is rescinding the general dispensation from the obligation to attend Sunday Mass. As of Sunday, June 20, 2021 all the Catholic faithful in the Diocese of Sacramento are obliged to personally attend and actively participate in the Sunday celebration of the Sacrifice of the Mass (Canon 1247). Our church is currently open 100% of the seating capacity.

1. PLEASE BE ON TIME!! For Security Reasons: You will need to be on time - all doors must remain closed after mass has started. This applies to Adoration and other activities in the church.

2. Face Masks are still required

3. Priest, deacons, and Extraordinary ministers should continue to use face masks for the distribution of communion;

4. The two front doors will be open before mass. The outside door on the chapel side will remain closed and used for exiting only. Ushers/Greeters will need to monitor mask wearing as people enter the church.

5. We will continue to Live Stream the Sacrifice of the Mass for those who are unable to attend as we monitor the number of people who are using this service.

Reflection:

Missionary Discipleship

In today's Gospel Jesus calls his disciples together, and then sends them off to proclaim the gospel, combat evil, and heal the sick. He also tells them to live simply while they do. Christ's call to evangelization is not just to the twelve disciples, He is calling all of us to be missionaries. How are we supposed to do that?

In the Pope's General Audience on June 23rd, he talked about evangelization when commenting on Paul's letter to the Galatians. He said we must proclaim the gospel with humility and in fraternity. It sounds a lot like what Mark is telling us in today's Gospel. However, the pope talks about humility not in terms of simplicity of possession. For him, humility means putting aside our own personal views and instead, proclaim the Risen Christ. The pope warns that there are many of us who claimed to have exclusive access to the truth. They do not proclaim Christ's gospel, rather they promulgate their own view on religious truth. They are inflexible and lack humility.

In his homily at last Sunday's 4:00 PM Mass, Monsignor James Murphy took the occasion of Independence Day to address our society's polarization. He spoke of a Catholicism that bridges the gulf between political opposites. The first step he suggested was that we should humbly pray for our country and the people we do not agree with. Again, the word humility came to the forefront. Christ calls us to proclaim the gospel, combat evil, and mend the broken. Strategies to accomplish this vary and change, but one thing is clear. We will need to be humble and work together in fraternity as missionary disciples.
