The Seventh Sunday of Easter

Within the transitional state the disciples had to navigate between following Jesus and leading his church after his resurrection, they experienced an even briefer transition: from Jesus' ascension to the coming of the Holy Spirit. In the passage of Acts immediately preceding this one, Jesus told his disciples to stay in Jerusalem for in a few days they would receive the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit descends upon them in the following chapter. In between, in this short passage that is today's first reading, the disciples did two things. They gathered together and they prayed. Though we already have the Holy Spirit's presence within us, every year we have the opportunity to imagine the state of the disciples during this anticipatory period, gathering together to pray during this ten-day period between Ascension and Pentecost.• Before ascending to his Father, Jesus told his disciples that once they received the Holy Spirit they would become his witnesses: first, to Jerusalem, next, to Judea and Samaria, finally, to the ends of the earth. This mission, for which they had to wait, can be ours at once. We too can move outward, from our home to our community, to our country, to the whole world. With the guidance of the Holy Spirit we can build the kingdom of God anywhere anytime. • Every Sunday for the last six weeks the second reading has been taken from the First Letter of Peter. Though unlikely to have been written by Saint Peter himself, the letter is written like a pastor addressing his faithful sojourners. The writer repeatedly encourages them to conduct themselves with reverence and humility despite persecution. Sharing in the undeserved sufferings of Christ is an opportunity to glorify God. God's tender arms, which supported his Son in his time of trial, support us as well.

Prayer was an essential feature of Jesus' life here on earth. It enabled him to communicate with his Father. He prayed in the Gospels often, when performing miracles (raising Lazarus from the dead), teaching his disciples the Lord's Prayer, or suffering on the cross. Today's entire Gospel is a prayer he makes to his Father while sitting with his disciples at the Last Supper. Moreover, he is praying for his disciples as well as for himself. Knowing what was about to come, Jesus' concern is for the ones he loves. Knowing that God is the source of all that is good, he refers to his disciples as "the ones you have given me" (John 17:9). Imagine the disciples listening to Jesus speaking of them in such glowing terms. He tells his Father that they accept his words, understood his identity, believed in him and kept God's word. It is no wonder that after Jesus was taken up to heaven they "devoted themselves with one accord to prayer" (Acts 1:14). They had seen Jesus pray. They had heard Jesus pray. They understood prayer's importance and its efficacy. So they realized that through prayer they could remain close to him and to God.

Question of the Week:

How can I emulate the first disciples? Can I endure suffering without fighting back? Can I devote myself to prayer? Can I become aware of the Holy Spirit's effect on my life? When have I experienced prayer bringing me closer to God?
