RESPECT LIFE MONTH: PROPORTIONATE AND DISPROPORTIONATE CARE AT THE END OF LIFE

Last week, I discussed the issues of euthanasia and physician-assisted suicide and the rapid growth in support they are experiencing. As we close Respect Life Month, I believe it is important to clear up a misunderstanding that I have encountered about the Church's teaching about the end of a person's life.

At times, very faithful people, who believe wholeheartedly that every life is sacred and inviolable, can often hear the Church's teaching on end-of-life issues and believe, because of the sacredness of life, that every decision to end life-support (often called "pulling the plug" informally) would be considered euthanasia or that to choose to forego very extensive and difficult medical procedures in order to save someone's life would always be equal to physician-assisted suicide. The idea they have is that we must fight to preserve someone's life until there is simply no other option available and they pass away against our best efforts in order to consider ourselves "good Catholics."

Please know that is not the case. Instead, the Church has a very developed teaching on this issue. Ultimately, the decision of stopping certain life-preserving treatments or choosing not to receive them in the first place depends on a case-by-case decision. The Church states that if a treatment is futile and offers no help, obviously, there is no need to continue with it. She also states that we have to consider whether the treatment that is intended to preserve life is advisable.

Here an important determination must be made between whether the treatment being provided or proposed is *proportionate* or *disproportionate* to the desired outcome:

Ordinary or proportionate means are those that (in the judgment of the patient assisted by health care professionals) offer a reasonable hope of benefit and do not entail an excessive burden or impose excessive expense on the family or the community. A person has a moral obligation to use ordinary means.

Extraordinary or disproportionate means are those that (in the judgment of the patient assisted by health care professionals) do not offer a reasonable hope of benefit, do entail an excessive burden, or do impose excessive expense on the family or the community. A person may forgo extraordinary means.¹

Note the important fact that the only person who can determine whether the means are too "burdensome" is the patient himself or herself. It is a decision that only the person whose life is in question can make: Is the procedure too risky? Are the side-effects too unbearable? Will this extend my life long enough to make it worth it? Am I at the end of my life and just ready to meet the Lord? Can I recover from another surgery? Will this treatment ruin my family financially? The questions go on; and they are important. One person may answer differently than another; often, both answers are morally acceptable.

In the end, a decision of this caliber depends largely on the estimation of the individual with a full knowledge of the medical reality at hand and a well-formed conscience. Please know that your priest will always be available to enter into a conversation about these questions as they arise, as well, in order to give direction and peace of mind as God calls the souls of his children home.

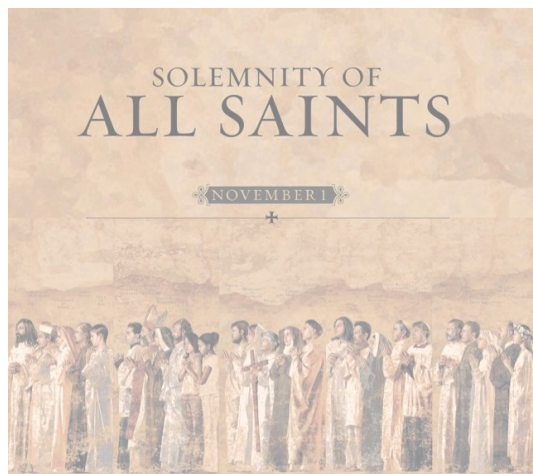
