November—We Pray for the Deceased

In your envelope packet is an envelope for All Souls Day. We continue the custom in which parishioners are invited to write as many names of deceased relatives and friends on the envelope, which will then be placed in a prominent place in the sanctuary during the month of November, the time we set aside in a special way to pray for the dead. They will serve as a sacramental—a holy reminder—to pray for those who have died.

Contribute as much or as little as you like in the envelope, and the total amount collected will be divided by the usual offering for a Mass intention and that number of Masses will be offered for those loved ones and all the dead. We will offer as many Masses as we can during the month of November, and then throughout the rest of the year.

This annual custom of ours is different than the specific intention for Masses that are offered each day and are listed in the upper left hand of this page of the bulletin each week. To have a Mass offered for a particular intention you may use the "Mass Intention" envelopes that are on the counter in the vestibule. The custom of offering Masses for the repose of the deceased or any good purpose is ancient in the Church. It is the most efficacious prayer to be offered because we join our offering to the offering of Christ on the Cross to our Heavenly Father.

Think About Life...

Sometimes you hear people argue that abortion should be legal if the family would experience lower quality of life because of the baby's birth. The example might be given that a family will not be able to support another child and will become even poorer. But it is never justifiable to kill some innocent people in order to improve the condition of other people.

If the issue is poverty, we wouldn't encourage a poor mother with eight children to kill the oldest three who eat the most. So encouraging her to kill the youngest and most vulnerable child – the one in her womb – does not make any sense.

People may be poor for different reasons. Sometimes they lack the education or the opportunity to succeed. Sometimes they live in an economically depressed area and cannot find adequate jobs. Sometimes they make poor decisions – like dropping out of school or using drugs, which limit their opportunities later. In some instances, they are oppressed by negligent, greedy, or power-hungry employers or governments. And in other circumstances, their nations are torn by war and conflict. Oftentimes, those around them who are better off do not provide the assistance and care that they could and should. But regardless of the reason, it is not fair to blame the unborn child for the problems that adults create. Besides, abortion does not solve any of these problems. Abortion has been legal in most places in the world for over 40 years, yet there is no evidence that it has reduced poverty.

From a quality of life point of view, it is important to deeply consider what we mean by "poverty." It is very rare in the Western world for anybody to starve to death because they have too many children. In fact, it's doubtful that this has ever happened in the United States in contemporary times. Having children can certainly make things economically difficult. If a family has several children, they will usually make many material sacrifices that other families don't have to make. But it generally does not mean that anyone will have to starve to death. Our generous nation has many religious and social programs that prevent something like that from happening. So the real question becomes: should one person have to die so that other people don't have to sacrifice material quality of life? If we answer, "No," then we should do everything we can to eliminate poverty, while fiercely protecting the lives of those who are most vulnerable.
