Session 7: **A Love That Lasts – Discovering Authentic Love**
In his Apostolic Exhortation *On the Role of the Christian Family in the Modern World (Familiaris Consortio)*, Pope St. John Paul II stated, “God created man in His own image and likeness: calling him to existence through love, He called him at the same time for love. God is love and in Himself He lives a mystery of personal loving communion. Creating the human race in His own image and continually keeping it in being, God inscribed in the humanity of man and woman the vocation, and thus the capacity and responsibility, of love and communion. Love is therefore the fundamental and innate vocation of every human being” (FC 11).
In the world's view, love is often defined by the Greek word eros—the passionate love that seeks pleasure in the company of a beloved. This kind of love focuses on what we can get out of the relationship, particularly a romantic relationship. It's about good feelings, emotion, and pleasure. It's primarily about getting, not giving.
The kind of vocational love St. John Paul II talks about is called agape—a total, committed, and unconditional love that centers not on what we can get from the other person, but on what we can give.
This kind of love mirrors the love of the Trinity and the love that God has for each one of us. It's a selfless and self-sacrificing love. But in a divine paradox, the more we practice agape, the more we give of ourselves to another, the more we discover the deep, lasting love our hearts desire. We will only find our fulfillment and happiness when we live total self-giving love in relationship with God and the people in our lives.
Pope Benedict XVI taught that eros and agape are not intrinsically opposed. If the passionate love of eros ascends to the sacrificial love of agape, eros and agape can become united in Jesus Christ, who loves us so much he gave up his life for us. Such a love then becomes “concern and care for the other,” a true self gift (Deus Caritas Est, 6, 10). For as the Catechism explains, “To love is to will the good of the other” (CCC 1766). **This Session Will Cover:**

- What it means to love according to God's plan
- Why the only way we can find the love we desire is by living God's authentic love
- The essential characteristics of this authentic love

The Widows: Scott Hahn Reflects on the Thirty-second Sunday in Ordinary *1 Kings 1:10–16; Psalm 146:7–10; Hebrews 9:24–28; Mark 12:41–44*

We must live by the obedience of faith, a faith that shows itself in works of charity and self-giving (see Galatians 5:6). That's the lesson of the two widows in today's liturgy.

The widow in the First Reading isn't even a Jew, yet she trusts in the word of Elijah and the promise of his Lord. Facing sure starvation, she gives all that she has, her last bit of food—feeding the man of God before herself and her family.

The widow in the Gospel also gives all that she has, offering her last bit of money to support the work of God's priests in the Temple.

In their self-sacrifice, these widows embody the love that Jesus last week revealed as the heart of the Law and the Gospel. They mirror the Father's love in giving His only Son, and Christ's love in sacrificing Himself on the cross.

Again in today's Epistle, we hear Christ described as a new high priest and the suffering servant foretold by Isaiah. On the cross, He made sacrifice once and for all to take away our sin and bring us to salvation (see Isaiah 53:12).

And again we are called to imitate His sacrifice of love in our own lives. We will be judged, not by how much we give—for the scribes and the wealthy contribute far more than the widow. Rather, we will be judged by whether our gifts reflect our livelihood, our whole beings, all our heart and soul, mind and strength.

Are we giving all that we can to the Lord—not out of a sense of forced duty, but in a spirit of generosity and love (see 2 Corinthians 9:6–7)?

Do not be afraid, the man of God tells us today. As we sing in today's Psalm, the Lord will provide for us, as He sustains the widow.

Today, let us follow the widows' example, doing what God asks, confident that our jars of flour will not grow empty, nor our jugs of oil run dry.

November—We Pray for the Deceased

November is the time we set aside in a special way to pray for the dead. Contribute as much or as little as you like in the envelope, and the total amount collected will be divided by the usual offering for a Mass intention and that number of Masses will be offered for those loved ones and all the dead. We will offer as many Masses as we can during the month of November, and then throughout the rest of the year.

This annual custom of ours is different than the specific intention for Masses that are offered each day and are listed in the upper left hand of this page of the bulletin each week. To have a Mass offered for a particular intention you may use the “Mass Intention” envelopes that are on the counter in the vestibule. The custom of offering Masses for the repose of the deceased or any good purpose is ancient in the Church. It is the most efficacious prayer to be offered because we join our offering to the offering of Christ on the Cross to our Heavenly Father.
