Dear Family in mourning,

Please accept my deepest and sincere sympathy in your time of sorrow. I appreciate your help in preparing the Mass of Christian Burial for your beloved deceased. Attached are selections from the Sacred Scriptures for the Liturgy of the Word. You may choose three readings: one from the Old Testament, another from the New Testament and a third from the Gospel (this is optional: you can ask the priest to choose for you.) Family members or friends may read the first two readings (the Old and New Testament readings) and the priest will read the Gospel. Inform the readers that the readings will be placed on the pulpit so they need not bring a copy with them.

Also attached are selections for Sacred Music. For the service, you may choose four hymns: the processional hymn, the offertory hymn, the communion hymn, and the recessional hymn. Secular and recorded music are not permitted.

The Funeral Pall, a large “blanket like” vestment is placed over the casket upon arrival at Church (it replaces the flag or flowers), and represents the baptismal garment. Family or friends, with the help of the funeral director, may help with the Pall and the carrying of the casket.

Don Rickenback is the parish director of music for funeral liturgies and can help you with preparing the Funeral Mass. Please send him an email at drickenback@strancisweston.org if you do have any questions about music.

The priest who celebrates the Funeral Mass will also lead a simple prayer service at the Wake during calling hours unless there is a conflict. If I can be of further assistance, you are welcome to call me at (203) 227-1341, extension 128.

FYI: Funerals are not permitted on Sundays or Holy Days of Obligation, or during Holy week on Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Holy Saturday. Cremation is permitted, however, the cremains ought to be interred.

SCRIPTURE READINGS

OLD TESTAMENT

1 A Reading from the second book of Maccabees (12:43-46)

Judas, the ruler of Israel, took up a collection among all his soldiers, amounting to two thousand silver drachmas, which he sent to Jerusalem to provide for an expiatory sacrifice.

In doing this he acted in a very excellent and noble way, inasmuch as he had the resurrection of the dead in view; for if he were not expecting the fallen to rise again, it would have been useless and foolish to pray for them in death.

But if he did this with a view to the splendid reward that awaits those who had gone to rest in godliness, it was a holy and pious thought. Thus, he made atonement for the dead that they might be freed from this sin.

2 A Reading from the book of Job (19:1, 23-27)

Job answered Bildad the Shuhite and said: Oh, would that my words were written down! Would that they were inscribed in a record: that with an iron chisel and with lead they were cut in the rock forever!

But as for me, I know that my Vindicator lives, and that he will at last stand forth upon the dust; whom I myself shall see: my own eyes, not another's, shall behold him; and from my flesh I shall see God; my inmost being is consumed with longing.

3 A reading from the Book of Wisdom (3:1-9)

The souls of the just are in the hand of God, and no torment shall touch them.

They seemed, in the view of the foolish, to be dead; and their passing away was thought an affliction and their going forth from us, utter destruction.

But they are in peace.

For if before men, indeed they be punished, yet is their hope full of immortality; chastised a little, they shall be greatly blessed, because God tried them and found them worthy of himself.

As gold in the furnace, he proved them, and as sacrificial offerings he took to himself.

In the time of their visitation they shall shine, and shall dart about as sparks through stubble; they shall judge nations and rule over peoples, and the Lord shall be their King forever.

Those who trust in him shall understand truth, and the faithful shall abide with him in love: Because grace and mercy are with his holy ones, and his care is with the elect.

4 **A Reading from the Book of Wisdom (4:7-15)**

He who pleased God was loved; he who lived among sinners was transported.

Having become perfect in a short while, he reached the fullness of a long career; for his soul was pleasing to the Lord, therefore, he sped him out of the midst of wickedness.

But the people saw and did not understand, nor did they take this into account.

Good is the Lord to one who waits for him, to the soul that seeks him;
It is good to hope in silence for the saving help of the Lord.

In conclusion, just as through one transgression condemnation came upon all, so, through one righteousness act, acquittal and life came to all.

The law entered in so the transgression might increase but, where sin increased, grace overflowed all the more, so that, as sin reigned in death, grace also might reign through justification for eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord.

12 A Reading from the Letter of Saint Paul to the Romans (6:3-9)

For if we have grown into union with him through a death like his, we shall also be united with him in the resurrection.

We know that our old self was crucified with him, so that our sinful body might be done away with, that we might no longer be in slavery to sin.

For a dead person has been absolved from sin.

If, then, we have died with Christ, we believe that we shall also live with him.

We know that Christ, raised from the dead, dies no more; death no longer has power over him.

13 A Reading from the Letter of Saint Paul to the Romans (8:14-23)

Brothers and Sisters:

Those who are led by the Spirit of God are sons of God,

For you did not receive a spirit of slavery to fall back into fear, but you received a spirit of adoption, through which we cry, "Abba, Father!"

The Spirit itself bears witness with our spirit that we are children of God, and if children, then heirs, heirs of God and joint heirs with Christ, if only we suffer with him so that we may also be glorified with him.

I consider that the sufferings of this present time are as nothing compared with the glory to be revealed for us.

For creation awaits with eager expectation the revelation of the children of God; for creation was made subject to futility, not of its own accord but because of the one who subjected it, in hope that creation itself would be set free from slavery to corruption and share in the glorious freedom of the children of God.

We know that all creation is groaning in labor pains even until now; and not only that, but we ourselves, who have the fruits of the Spirit, we also groan within ourselves as we wait for adoption, the redemption of our bodies.

14 A Reading from the Letter of Saint Paul to the Romans (8:31-35, 37-39)

Brothers and Sisters:

If God is for us, who can be against us?

He did not spare his own Son but handed him over for us all, will he not also give us everything else along with him?

Who will bring a charge against God's chosen ones?

It is God who acquits us.

Who will condemn?

It is Christ Jesus who died, rather, was raised, who also is at the right hand of God, who indeed intercedes for us.

What will separate us from the love of Christ?

Will anguish, or distress or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or the sword?

No, in all these things, we conquer overwhelmingly through him who loved us.

For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor present things, nor future things, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor any other creature will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.

15 A Reading from the Letter of Saint Paul to the Romans (14:7-9, 10-12)

Brothers and Sisters:

No one lives for oneself, and no one dies for oneself.

For if we live, we live for the Lord, and if we die, we die for the Lord; so then, whether we live or die, we are the Lord's.

For this is why Christ died and came to life, that he might be Lord of both the dead and the living.

Why then do you judge your brother?

Or you, why do you look down on your brother?

For we shall all stand before the judgement seat of God; for it is written:

As I live, says the Lord, every knee shall bend before me, and every tongue shall give praise to God.

So then each of us shall give an accounting of himself to God.

16 A reading from the first Letter of St. Paul to the Thessalonians (4:13-18)

We do not want you to be unaware, brothers and sisters, about those who have fallen asleep, so that you may not grieve like the rest, who have no hope.

For if we believe that Jesus died and rose, so too will God, through Jesus, bring with him those who have fallen asleep.

Indeed, we tell you this, on the word of the Lord, that we who are alive, who are left until the coming of the Lord, will surely not precede those who have fallen asleep.

For the Lord himself, with a word of command, with the voice of an archangel and with the trumpet of God, will come down from heaven, and the dead in Christ will rise first.

Then we who are alive, who are left, will be caught up together with them in the clouds to meet the Lord in the air.

Thus, we shall always be with the Lord.

Therefore, console one another with these words.

17 A reading from the first Letter of St. John (1 John 3:1-2)

See what love the Father has bestowed on us that we may be called the children of God.

Yet so we are. The reason the world does not know us is that it did not know him.

Beloved, we are god's children now; what we shall be has not yet been revealed.

We do know that when it is revealed we shall be like him, for we shall see him as he is.

18 A reading from the first Letter of St. John (1 John 3:14-16)

We know that we have passed from death to life because we love our brothers and sisters.

Whoever does not love remains in death. Everyone who hates his brother is a murderer, and you know that no murderer has eternal life remaining in him.

The way we came to know love was that he laid down his life for us; so we ought to lay down our lives for our brother and sisters.

19 A reading from the Second Letter of Paul to Timothy (II Timothy 2:8-13)

Remember Jesus Christ, raised from the dead, a descendant of David: such is my gospel, for which I am suffering, even to the point of chains, like a criminal.

But the word of God is not chained.

Therefore, I bear with everything for the sake of those who are chosen, so that they too may obtain the salvation that is in Christ Jesus, together with eternal glory.

This saying is trustworthy: *If we have died with him we shall also live with him; if we preserve we shall also reign with him. But if we deny him he will deny us. If we are unfaithful he remains faithful, for he cannot deny himself.*

20 A reading from the Letter of Paul to the Philippians (Philippians 3:20-21)

Our citizenship is in heaven, and from it we also await a savior, the Lord Jesus Christ. He will change his lowly body to conform with his glorified body by the power that enables him also to bring all things into subjection to himself.

The Word of the Lord,
All: Thanks be to God!

21 A reading from the Second Letter of Paul to the Corinthians (II Corinthians 4:14-5:1)

We know that the one who raised the Lord Jesus will raise us also with Jesus and place us with you in his presence.

Everything indeed is for you, so that the grace bestowed in abundance on more and more people may cause the thanksgiving to overflow for the glory of God.

Therefore, we are not discouraged; rather, although our outer self is wasting away, our inner self is being renewed day by day.

For this momentary light affliction is producing for us an eternal weight of glory beyond all comparison, as we look not to what is seen but to what is unseen; for what is seen is transitory, but what is unseen is eternal.

For we know that if our earthly dwelling, a tent should be destroyed we have a building from God, a dwelling not made with hands, eternal in heaven.

22 A reading from the Second Letter of Paul to the Corinthians (II Corinthians 5:1, 6-10)

So we are always courageous, although we know that while we are at home in the body we are away from the Lord, for we walk by faith, not by sight.

Yet we are courageous, and we would rather leave the body and go home to the Lord.

Therefore, we aspire to please him. Whether we are at home or away.

For we must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ, so that each one may receive recompense, according to what he did in the body, whether good or evil.

23 A reading from the First Letter of Paul to the Corinthians (I Corinthians 15:51-57)

Behold, I tell you a mystery.

We shall not all fall asleep, but we will all be changed, in an instant, in the blink of an eye, at the last trumpet.

For the trumpet will sound, the dead will be raised incorruptibility, and that which is mortal must clothe itself with immortality.

And when that which is corruptible clothes itself with immortality, then the word that is written shall come about:

Death is swallowed up in victory. Where, O death, is your victory? Where, O death, is your sting?

The sting of death is sin, and the power of sin is the law.

But thanks be to God who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ.

24 A reading from the First Letter of Paul to the Corinthians (I Corinthians 15:20-23)

Christ has been raised from the dead, the first fruits of those who have fallen asleep.

For since death came through a human being, the resurrection of the dead came also through a human being.

For just as in Adam all die, so too in Christ shall all be brought to life, but each one in proper order: Christ the first fruits; then, at this coming, those who belong in Christ; then comes the end, when he hands over the kingdom to his God and Father.

For he must reign until he has put all his enemies under his feet,

The last enemy to be destroyed is death, for *he subjected everything under his feet.*

But when it says that everything has been subjected, it is clear that it excludes the One who subjected everything to him.

When everything is subjected to him, then the Son of himself will also be subjected to the One who subjected everything to him, so that God may be in all.

And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come back again and take you to myself, so that where I am you also may be.

Thomas said to him, “Master, we do not know where you are going; How can we know the way?”

Jesus said to him, “I am the way and the truth and the life.

No one comes to the Father except through me.”

28 A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew (11:25-30)

At that time Jesus answered: “I give praise to you, Father, Lord of heaven and earth, for although you have hidden these things from the wise and the learned you have revealed them to the childlike.

Yes, Father, such has been your gracious will.

All things have been handed over to me by my Father.

No one knows the Son except the Father, and anyone to whom the Son wishes to reveal him.”

“Come to me, all you who labor and are burdened, and I will give you rest.

Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am meek and humble of heart; and you will find rest for yourselves.

For my yoke is easy, and my burden light.”

He said to them “Do not be amazed! You seek Jesus of Nazareth, the crucified. He has been raised; he is not here. Behold the place where they laid him.

For this is the will of my Father, that everyone who sees the Son believes in him may have eternal life, and I shall raise him on the last day

31 A reading from the holy Gospel according to John (6:51-59)

Jesus said to the crowds: “I am the living bread that came down from heaven; whoever eats this bread will live forever; and the bread that I will give is my Flesh for the life of the world.”

The Jews quarreled among themselves, saying, “How can this man give us his Flesh to eat?”

Jesus said to them, “Amen, amen I say to you, unless you eat the Flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood, you do not have life within you.

Whoever eats my Flesh and drinks my Blood has eternal life, and I will raise him on the last day.

For my Flesh is true food, and my blood is true drink.

Whoever eats my Flesh and drinks my Blood remains in me and I in him.

Just as the living Father sent me and I have life because of the Father, so also the one who feeds me.

This is the bread that came down from heaven.

Unlike your ancestors who ate and still died, whoever eats this bread will live forever.”

32 A reading from the holy Gospel according to John

Father, they are your gift to me.

I wish that where I am they also may be with me, that they may see my glory that you gave me, because you loved me before the foundation of the world.

Righteous Father, the world also does not know you, but I know you, and they know that you sent me.

I made known to them your name and I will make it known, that the love with which you love me may be in them and I in them.”

33 A reading from the holy Gospel according to John (11:21-27)
