A WORD FROM FR. JOHN...

Today, we celebrate the Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity. This is a very important feast, as the *Catechism of the Catholic Church* proclaims: "The mystery of the Most Holy Trinity is the central mystery of the Christian faith and of Christian life. God alone can make it known to us by revealing himself as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit," (#261). It goes on to quote the Athanasian Creed stating, "Now this is the Catholic faith: We worship one God in the Trinity and the Trinity in unity, without either confusing the persons or dividing the substance; for the person of the Father is one, the Son's is another, the Holy Spirit's another; but the Godhead of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit is one, their glory equal, their majesty coeternal, (DS 75; ND16)," (#266). Got it? Clear as mud!



Rather than trying to get our minds around the mystery of the Trinity, in particular how three persons can be one God, it might be best to take a clue from what our *Catechism* tells us and what we know from our own experience. For what we know about God is what God has revealed to us. A basic truth of trinitarian theology is that it moves from the economic Trinity revealed in salvation history to the immanent Trinity where analogies from created reality can help us, and not vice versa. Our knowledge and experience of Jesus Christ and the outpouring of the Holy Spirit, and what that reveals to us about God the Father, and their relationship to one another and to us shapes our knowledge and understanding of the Trinity. Like every other person in our lives, we come to know and love the persons of the Trinity in our relations and relationship with them - through our encounters, conversations, just being in their presence, experiencing what they say and do and how they move and are.

As human beings, we are created in the image and likeness of the Triune God, and thus equipped for, drawn into and destined for relationship with and in God. God became one of us, so that we could become one with God. The communion that we experience in the Eucharist is a foretaste and promise of our full communion with God in heaven. Heaven entails our being embraced in the loving communion of the three persons of the Trinity. The loving relationships that we experience here and now, whether with our friends, between spouses, and among family members are foretastes and preparation for the fullness of God's loving heavenly communion. In relationship, we are being formed to become the person we are created to be.

Jesus' disciples came to know him and love him by dwelling with him from the time of his baptism by John in

the Jordan to his ascension to his heavenly Father. That's how Jesus revealed God to them. Not surprisingly, we come to know God through a similar process of discipleship. As Jesus tells his disciples at the end of the gospel according to Matthew that we hear proclaimed at Mass today, "Go and make disciples." The faith is passed down from generation to generation not primarily through preaching and teaching (although those are important), but through lived experience as disciples. Dwelling with other disciples of Jesus Christ, who in their words and actions, through the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, who fills them up and oozes out of them, we become more and more disciples of Jesus Christ. Together God is made manifest and revealed through our living out the faith in our daily lives. We come to know and understand our Triune God by walking the walk and talking the talk as his disciples.

Next Sunday, June 3, on the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Jesus Christ (aka The Feast of Corpus Christi), we invite you to be part of our Eucharistic Procession. This is not something wholly unknown to our communities; there are photos of past processions in our parishes. But probably not many have been held in the living memory of most of our parishioners. We engage in a procession with the Blessed Sacrament, to celebrate the sacrament, to signify God's presence in our world and in our lives, and to remind us of our common pilgrimage to Heaven, as a prayerful and edifying act of the entire Church. Fr. Matthew explains more about why we are doing this procession in the "Renewing and Refreshing Adult Faith" column on page 4 of this bulletin. We have laid out a route to encompass all three of our churches with consideration of the Mass times at each, and created multiple and varied ways for all to participate. You need not walk with the procession to participate. You can join in the prayer at various stops along the way. As the flyer in today's bulletin indicates, there are multiple places where you can join and leave the procession, with scheduled times along the way to facilitate your planning. Also, you are most welcome to celebrate Mass at any of our churches, perhaps even coming to St. Boniface for the 9:00am Mass, and participating in the procession from start to finish. A number of volunteers have come forward to shuttle folks back to their cars if needed. As with all good parish celebrations, food will be served at each church. So, please join in the enthusiasm building around our Eucharistic Procession, and come pray with us, walk with us, eat with us and/or share fellowship with us, as we celebrate and make manifest the Body of Christ in the Eucharist and in this gathering of our parish community.

RENEWING AND REFRESHING ADULT FAITH
Understanding a Eucharistic Procession

Catholics who attend the Mass of the Lord's Supper are familiar with the Eucharistic Procession that occurs after the distribution of Holy Communion. The Eucharist moves from the place of celebration to the place of reposition, so that the faithful may worship for a period of adoration.

The same source tells us that a Eucharistic Procession is desirable on the Feast of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ. Why is a procession desirable for our parish? The answer can be found in looking closely at our neighborhood.

Our parish is situated in an area that has several needs: healing, peace, unity, and belief in God are just a few. Many parishioners dedicate their time in serving some of these needs, but if service is not connected to our participation and belief in the Eucharist, something is missing.

This procession is a moment for our parish to bring Christ into the community. By walking together with one another, our brothers and sisters will see that our worship moves us to response. Prayer stops along the way will acknowledge these and other needs, and our route will also connect our worship sites.

An easier option would be to process around the Church (similar to Palm Sunday) and then conclude as usual before going on our way. However, if we really believe that the Eucharist has the power to transform our lives and the world, do we have the courage to show it by bringing our Lord to the community that we live in?

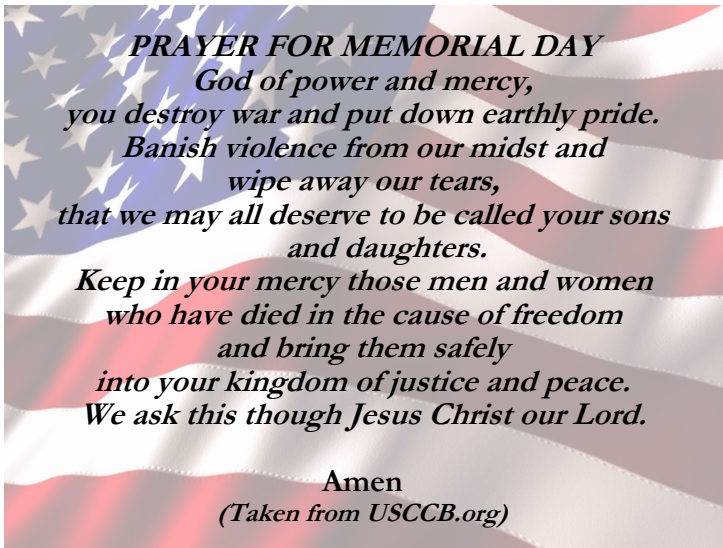
