

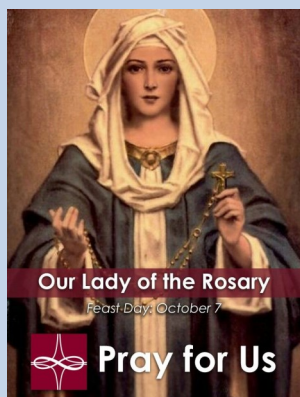

## A WORD FROM FR. JOHN...

Over the last several weekends, we have been holding renewing and refreshing sessions with our Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion (EMHC). This wonderful group of dedicated parishioners perform an essential and sacred ministry in assisting us with the distribution of the most Holy Body and Blood of Christ in our Eucharistic celebrations, and to the homebound and those in nursing homes and health care facilities. All three of our churches are in need of additional EMHCs. If you are interested in volunteering, please contact Sue Howard, Beverly LaBelle or me for more information. In our sessions, a couple of points came up, which our current ministers asked me to share with all of you.



First, I have asked them to assist me in curtailing the practice of a communicant taking the host and dipping it into the Most Precious Blood and then consuming it. While the Church allows for the reception of Holy Communion by means of intinction, it requires the involvement of three ministers huddled close together. The first minister, usually the priest, takes the host, dips it into the Most Precious Blood contained in a chalice held by a second minister, holds it up before the communicant proclaiming “The Body and Blood of Christ.” The communicant responds, “Amen,” and receives communion on the tongue from the hand of the first minister, while a third minister holds a paten under the chin of the communicant. Those of us who are old enough may remember receiving communion on the tongue from the priest as the altar server held that same paten (what looks like a metal plate with a handle) under your chin. And those of us who watched Pope Francis celebrate Mass when he visited the United States may remember seeing him administer communion by means of intinction to the deacons serving on the altar. I have instructed our ministers of Holy Communion to place their purificator over their cup and say kindly to those who approach seeking to dip the host, “We don’t do that here. If you would like to consume the host, I would be happy to offer you the cup.” This will require graciousness and kindness on the part of the minister. Hopefully, as such, it will be received well by the communicant.

Second, whether one chooses to receive the host on the tongue or in the palm of the hand, both of which are appropriate and acceptable, please allow the minister to place it there. It can be tricky and troublesome for the minister, when the communicant attempts to grasp the host with their lips or teeth, or plucks it with their fingers out of the fingers of the minister as it is offered. With that said, there may be instances, especially when a communicant is one-handed (for example when carrying a child or a cane, or perhaps following injury or surgery), where the minister and communicant work cooperatively to assure the secure transferring of the host between them. Yet, even in these instances, the transfer of the host should look more like the communicant is receiving the host from the minister, as opposed to grasping or seizing it from the minister.

As we all endeavor to reveal the reverence with which we approach the reception of Holy Communion, we act cooperatively, literally in communion, to bring about our sacred communion with God in the Eucharist. I hope you receive these words in a spirit of openness and cooperation. For I do not offer them in a spirit of correction or admonition, but as an invitation to affirm, by our choices and actions, the deep reverence that we all share for the Body and Blood of Christ in the Eucharist, and for the Spirit of Christ in one another. If you have any questions or concerns regarding this matter, I would ask you to address them to me directly. Thank you.

One last point as we approach the cold and flu season, please remember that our obligation to attend Sunday Mass is excused, if we are sick or not feeling well. Also, please be understanding if someone refrains from sharing the sign of peace. They may be seeking to avoid passing on a cold. Or they may be in a position where they need to be especially cautious to avoid infection, perhaps because of their own compromised immune system or that of someone with whom they are living or working. To signal our need to avoid physical contact during the sign of peace, we may consider folding our arms across our chest and merely exchanging the greeting of peace with one another. These simple actions along with the normal practical steps, like coughing and sneezing into our elbow instead of our hand, combined with regular hand washing, will help us all to stay healthier. Thanks again for your kindness and cooperation in this matter.

**RENEWING AND REFRESHING ADULT FAITH**  
**How My Family Tries to Live Pope Francis'**  
**Call to Holiness**  
**(Chapter 4, paragraphs 110-157)**

“When we feel overwhelmed, we can always cling to the anchor of prayer, which puts us back in God’s hands and the source of our peace.”(114) Parenting is difficult, overwhelming, and stressful and at times can even make one feel lonely. During the school year one of our family’s intentions is to pray and eat dinner together every night; we are fortunate when this occurs. The infamous schedule overtakes easily and one must be diligent to maintain a balance and keep the door to God open.

“Do not deprive yourself of a happy day (Sir 14:11.14). He wants us to be positive, grateful and uncomplicated.”(127) Maintenance of balance is more straightforward come summertime. We leave behind most technology as we take various outings and embrace the ordinary — a meal shared with family or guests where time and conversation are the blessings. Old fashioned fun occupies our days — bike rides, water sports or going to the beach. Signs of holiness in the spectacular are apparent all around: hikes on beds of soft pine needles under trees’ tall canopy, watching heron fly in the early morning fog, searching for and finding a beautiful piece of sea glass, or taking in the bounty of God in evening’s sunset.

“True enough, we need to open the door of our hearts to Jesus, who stands and knocks.”(136) Our summer and our lives are rich in God’s blessings.

**Rejoice, and be glad!  
Blessed are you, holy are you!  
Rejoice and be glad! Yours is the kingdom of God!**

Jesus said it on the Sermon on the Mount and now Pope Francis reminds us that God calls us *all* to be saints—and he shows us how to respond to that call in his apostolic exhortation on holiness, *Gaudete et Exsultate*. READ IT! It is our roadmap!

In a culture that often asks us to keep our relationship with Jesus to ourselves or has us push our faith to the sidelines, we now have a pathway to find true happiness, to find real love, to understand what God wants from us, to reorient our vision, to find Jesus!
