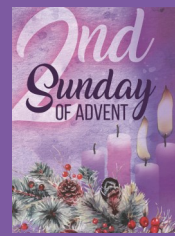

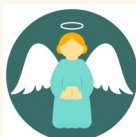

A WORD FROM FR. JOHN...

On this second Sunday of Advent, we have the first of the great figures of the season. John the Baptist arrives on the scene wearing camels hair clothing, eating locusts and honey, and baptizing with water those who acknowledge their sins. We might wonder if the crowds did not flock to him, because of his peculiar appearance and unique diet. Afterall, while I could see myself wearing animal skins, I don't see myself eating bugs no matter how much they are coated with honey. Yet, we would do well to heed the words of the prophet Isaiah, who indicates that our Lord does not judge by appearance or decide based on hearsay.

There was more to John than his strange clothing and desert diet. He was offering a demanding and compelling message that captured the attention of everyone from those living in the city of Jerusalem to the surrounding region and beyond. The heart of his message was a call to repentance as a means of preparing for someone greater who was to follow him and come baptizing with the Holy Spirit and fire. The repentance or metanoia that John is calling for entails a change of thinking, attitudes, behavior and relationships. He is right to indicate that those who are set in their ways and self-assured of the righteousness of what they claim to know and do, like the Pharisees and Sadducees, would struggle to accept and more than likely reject and oppose John's message about repentance.

I get the sense that similar groups can be found in our contemporary society. The opposing sides in numerous debates in politics, religion, culture, economics, etc. probably would easily characterize each other as being intransigent and self-righteous. The apparent inability of the sides to engage in positive dialogue that could lead to greater mutual respect and understanding, and perhaps ultimately to reconciliation and compromise that would benefit the common good of all only highlights the problem. While it may be easy for each side to point to the solution being in the other side's needing to change, true repentance can only come about if one decides for oneself to change oneself.

For that to happen we need to turn the focus on ourselves. We need to examine our own conscience looking at our own thoughts, words and actions in light of Christ and employing the gifts of the Holy Spirit that Isaiah recalls for us in our first reading. Do we trust that by allowing God to lead us into the transformation that God seeks in our lives that it will have spillover effects on the people and world around us? In my experience, when I am frustrated and struggling, pausing to engage in an examination of conscience and repenting based on what I discover helps put things in better perspective. Sometimes that leads me to celebrate my repentance and God's mercy, love and forgiveness in sacramental confession.

Regardless, as a result of my repentance, and in accord with Paul's message in our second reading, I seem to gain both endurance and encouragement from God that in keeping with the Spirit of Christ leads to greater harmony with others as we work together toward a positive resolution of our difficulties.

Coming up this Tuesday, December 10, at 6:30pm at St. Boniface, and this Saturday, December 14, at 1:00pm at Blessed Sacrament are our parish Advent Penance Services. Our communal celebration will entail a liturgy of the word followed by individual confession and absolution. We will be joined by our children, who will be celebrating their First Penance, and their families. I encourage you to join us as a way for us to encourage and inspire one another in our faith journeys. We have placed pamphlets with examinations of conscience for children, youth and adults in our churches to help you prepare. If you are unable to join us for either celebration, hopefully you will have a chance to approach the sacrament at our regularly scheduled times or by contacting one of our parish priests to arrange a time that will work for you.

In preparing for the coming of Christ, John the Baptist came with God's message of repentance. He indicated that our repentance would set us up to receive so much more from the baptism of the Holy Spirit and fire that Jesus Christ would bring at his coming. As we look forward to the amazing reality that Isaiah foretells in our first reading, it may seem so far beyond us and the current state of our world and society. Yet, are we willing to be open to and a part of the amazing transformation that the coming of Christ entails? By seeking to repent and welcome in that metanoia, that change in our thinking, attitudes, behavior and relationships, we will be more awake and prepared to enter into the peace, love and joy of Christ's coming that we sing about in so many of our Christmas carols.

Please check out the Advent-Christmas flyer available online and at the entrances to church for the variety of opportunities available to you in the week ahead and throughout the Advent season. And thank you to all those who have donated to the Catholic Ministries Appeal. We continue to make good progress toward our parish goals. TAX SAVING QUALIFIED CHARITABLE DEDUCTION

The 2018 changes to Federal income tax rules are a mixed blessing for New York Residents. However, one tax saving deduction that remained is the **Qualified Charitable Deduction (QCD)**. Tax payers 70 1/2 and older, who must make annual MRW withdrawals from IRA retirement accounts, can deduct amounts **made directly to charities (such as Blessed Sacrament, St. Boniface and St. Mary's)** decreasing taxable income. QCDs are subtracted from the taxable income on line 4a of the 1040. However, you cannot have such withdrawals sent to you and then forwarded to a charity. They must go directly to the charity from the IRA account. Contributions qualifying as QCDs can be made at any time during the tax year. This is not intended as tax advice. "We make a round Advent wreath showing us God's never-ending love for us, made with fresh evergreen boughs. They remind us of a part of nature still living in the bleakness of winter. We take some time for quiet reflection as we enjoy the wreath."

"Last year we went to Blessed Sacrament to make a real wreath out of greenery. The girls really enjoyed that. We lit the candles before dinner with the prayers provided to us."

Youth Ministry News

Calling All Youth (grades 6-12); this Advent show love for our neighbors with Cookies and Cards Making!

Next Sunday, Dec. 15, from 4:00-6:00 pm, in the Blessed Sacrament School Youth Room. Enjoy Christmas carols and cocoa while we bake and decorate cookies as well as Christmas cards for people who are sick, home bound, alone/away from family during the Christmas season.

Our plan is to make the sugar cookie dough recipe and frosting ahead of time, so the youth can just create with cookie cutters, bake and decorate during our time together, in addition to making cards.

One or two adult volunteers would be very helpful as well, if possible.

The amount of dough we make up will depend on the number of teens who let us know they would like to take part, this could be a small project or a large one, depending on how many we have helping to make it happen, either way it will very fun! **RSVP by December 12 to sercc.youth@dor.org**

THE SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM (CONTINUED)

Along with the family of the person to be baptized all present renew their own commitment to follow Jesus Christ. We also invoke the prayers of the saints as we process to the baptismal font. We know, as Christians, that we are always surrounded by the saints—a cloud of witnesses—and this is emphasized by the stained-glass windows depicting the saints in our churches. The water of the font is then blessed and the child is baptized with the pouring of water or by immersion. The church teaches us that in baptism we die to our old self and emerge from the waters of baptism as a new creation, an adopted child of God, stamped with the image of Jesus Christ. We become "another Christ," commissioned to go forth and do as Jesus did, proclaiming the Gospel in word and deed.

ADVENT WREATH

Advent is a special gift to us in the Church. It offers us a time for quiet reflection that runs contrary to the wider culture. You will notice in our liturgical environment that we have made bare some of the spaces that usually have plants or decoration. This is to help produce for us that empty visual and spiritual space where we can enter into the quietness of the season of Advent.



This year we have chosen a new space for the Advent Wreath at St. Mary's and St. Boniface. It is closer to where we will see the crèche scene and the Baby Jesus in four weeks' time. Here is where we place our hope. Here is where we wait in eager expectation the birth of the Christ Child. As we light the candles each week we are one week closer to realizing the true light that will come into the world.

In your own home you may want to find a new place for your Advent Wreath as well. Maybe a place close to where your tree will be or where you place your own crèche scene. Even without a wreath we pray that you can create in your own home a prayerful place where you can enjoy the quietness of Advent and the renewal of your spirit.
