Prioress' Reflection

Harvest time, seed time, thanksgiving, volunteers. Since this Fall issue always gives tribute to our wonderful volunteers (we don't have any other kind!), I should perhaps list volunteers first, then thanksgiving, seed time and harvest time. Perhaps I should begin with thanksgiving for the volunteers since we experience the harvest of the wonderful seeds of their generosity, fidelity, love for God and for us that we receive!

Eighteen years ago on her 80th birthday the beginning of February, Sr. Aleydis, our main cook for the retreat house, suffered an incapacitating stroke and we had no Sister to replace her. Somehow we managed through the busy time of Lent and the longer summer retreats of that year.

The beginning of that September I remember reminding God that we had 10 weekend retreats coming up. He needed to show me if we could do it with volunteers or did we need to hire someone. Eighteen years later we still have no one on the payroll! What an ongoing answer!

God's loving Providence has greeted us and continues to greet us each day! Although I do have to admit that His loving Providence does not always arrive early—but God always comes through! How many times a large weekend looms in front of us; I know that we are short-handed and God draws people out of the woodwork to help us. That was our experience on our two recent retreats in September.

People ask how do we get our volunteers? I answer that God sends them; otherwise they would never be so generous and work so hard! I just answer the phone and say, "Thank You" for your generous offer. Truth be told, I sometimes also call

a volunteer and say, "Please!" It is always amazing to ask someone to help cook for a group of 60 and that person responds not only affirmatively but adds, "Thank you for calling me." Most people would expect to hear a personal tone to, "Sorry, the number you have dialed is out of order"!

For the sake of this article, I just looked up the definition of "volunteer" in several dictionaries on-line and was rather surprised by what I found—or didn't find. The general definition of a volunteer is someone who offers to do something for an organization without being paid. This is like describing a human being as an upright mammal.

To paint a picture of our volunteers, we need to include these descriptive words: committed, dedicated, faithful, concerned, caring, responsible, going beyond, involved, and generous in the gift of themselves in whatever areas they can help us. They also look out for us by giving advice, reminders, and suggestions that help stimulate us and guide us.

The lives of the volunteers and that of our monastic community are intertwined. Our volunteers don't volunteer for an "organization" but out of love for God, for us, and for our guests whom they also help welcome as Christ. We pray for them and their concerns and needs—and they pray for us and rejoice with us in how God blesses us and them. The people who volunteer here have formed a community among themselves and have become friends. Many add that our prayer for them is the best gift they receive.

We also have those "volunteers" who cannot physically help us but pray for us every day; many have physical limitations and sufferings that they offer us for us as well. Just recently a man in a nursing home told a visitor that he prays for St. Emma's every night. We want to thank

all of you who sustain us by your prayers whether or not you can physically set foot on St. Emma's.

Many of you are in all of our categories—including who help support us financially and prayerfully—and sometimes from a great distance.

If we had to pay a salary (even one—yet alone more!), we would never be able to make the improvements or to maintain St. Emma's the way we do. Imagine getting major repairs done and only having to pay for the parts and not for the labor. That is what happens when you donate here: the money pays for the usual parts and the volunteers provide the labor of love.

When people write Thank You notes for their experience here as a retreatant, a guest in the B&B or a guest at one of our events, they usually mention our "wonderful volunteers" and that is how they experience them.

Harvest time, seed time, thanksgiving, volunteers. Now I end with "thanksgiving for the volunteers for we experience the harvest of the wonderful seeds of their generosity, fidelity, love for God and for us!"

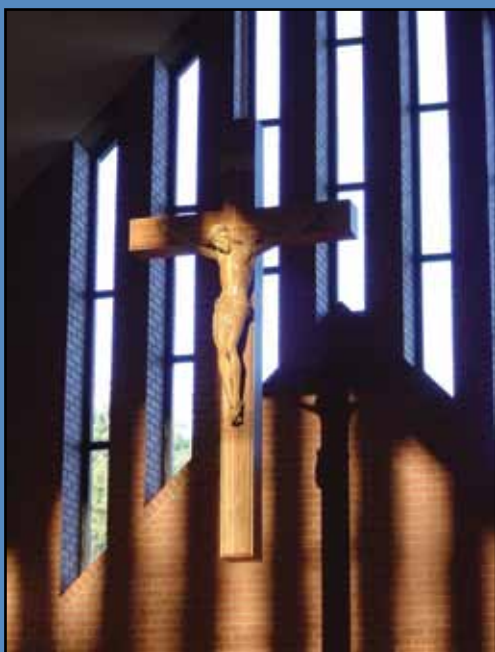

Listen and Live the Gospel

*“Hear the Word of the LORD, you nations,
proclaim it on distant coasts.” – Jeremiah 31:10*

As Christians, we know that we are called to “Proclaim” God’s Word to the world – and often we strive to do just that. But, notice in Jeremiah’s call we are told to “Hear the Word of the LORD” – he calls us to first LISTEN.

Listening is not always an easy task. To hear God’s Word, we must take the time in a quiet place to read and reflect on God’s Word. Benedictine Communities, such as St. Emma’s Monastery, practice an ancient form of meditation known as *Lectio Divina* or Divine Reading. *Lectio divina* is an ancient practice of sitting with the Word of God, praying with and over the Word of God, and being formed by the Word of God.

As a means of deepening your spiritual life and of uniting with the Sisters of St. Emma’s, I invite you to spend an hour each day (or even each week) in *Lectio Divina*. Here is a quick overview of how to pray using *Lectio Divina*.

Select a small Bible passage – a few sentences or a paragraph. You will pray it four times as follows:

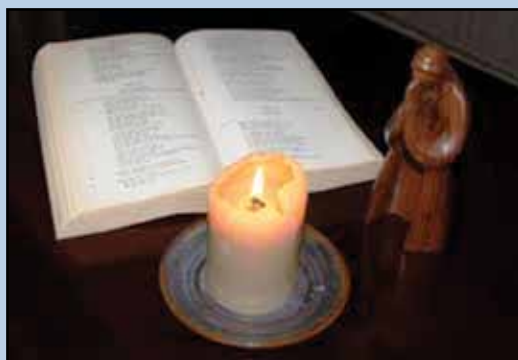
First, pray the verses slowly. A slow, thoughtful reading of a section of Scripture allows you to savor the text and turn the words over in your mind and heart. Be attentive for a word or phrase that may speak powerfully to you.

Next, pray the verses again, but this time allow a word or phrase to ruminate and speak more powerfully to your heart and mind. This inner pondering will invite you into further dialog with God.

Now, pray the phrase or word directly to God using ideas or images. Interact with Him as the One Who loves, cherishes and accepts you. Share with Him what you have discovered in your heart.

Finally, rest in God’s embrace and become aware of simply resting in His loving presence.

St. Emma’s bookstore offers several books on *Lectio Divina*. I personally recommend **Lectio Divina Bible Study: The Mass in Scripture** by Stephen J. Binz. I found it to be a great spiritual tool as well as informative in areas of our Catholic faith.
