Although the liturgical season of Ordinary Time begins this week, today's reading continues with the celebration of the Baptism of the Lord, which concludes the

Christmas season. Today's reading from the Gospel according to John immediately follows John the Baptist's testimony about Jesus and his identification of Jesus as the Lamb of God. Having been baptized by John, Jesus begins to gather followers. The first followers sought out Jesus because of the testimony and witness of John the Baptist.

We are familiar with the title that John the Baptist uses for Jesus—the Lamb of God. We hear it weekly at the fraction rite during Mass. For those who heard John the Baptist, however, this title recalled key themes from the Old Testament. It alludes to the paschal lamb offered as a sacrifice when God freed the Israelites from slavery in Egypt, the event that is commemorated by the Jewish Passover celebration. The designation also recalls the prophet Isaiah's description of the suffering servant of Israel. In using this name for Jesus, John the Baptist predicts Jesus' passion and death and the new interpretation of Passover that will begin with Jesus' Last Supper.

We learn in today's reading how Jesus' first followers were gathered. The first two, Andrew and another man, were followers of John the Baptist. After hearing John's testimony, they became followers of Jesus. During their time with Jesus, the details of which are not specified, Andrew and the other follower came to believe that Jesus was the Messiah. Andrew then brings his brother, Simon, to Jesus. Immediately, Jesus gave Simon a new name, calling him Peter, which means "rock" in Greek. The renaming of Simon to Peter is reported in all four of the Gospels.

In the exchange between Andrew, the other disciple, and Jesus, we see an example of the usual pattern for first-century Jewish rabbinical schools. Jews sought out rabbis and established themselves as disciples of a particular rabbi. Jesus appears to have been unique in that he sought out individuals, inviting them to be his followers. In the passage that follows, John's Gospel tells us how Jesus took the initiative in calling Philip and Nathanael.

Jesus asks Andrew and the other disciple, "What are you looking for?" This is a telling question, and one that we might often ask of ourselves. John the Baptist testified to Jesus' identity, the Lamb of God, using the framework of the Old Testament. Andrew, Simon, and the other first disciples were looking for the Messiah, whom they also came to know as the Son of God. What do we look for and what do we find in Jesus?

## “Te seguiré”

Papa Francisco: Como en la fiesta de la epifanía y en la del Bautismo de Jesús, la página del Evangelio de hoy propones también el tema de la manifestación del Señor. Esta vez, es Juan Bautista quien lo señala a sus discípulos como «el Cordero de Dios», invitándolos a seguirlo. Y así es para nosotros: Aquel a quien hemos contemplado en el misterio de la Navidad, estamos ahora llamados a seguirlo en la vida cotidiana. Por lo tanto, el Evangelio de hoy nos introduce perfectamente en el tiempo litúrgico ordinario, un tiempo que sirve para animar y verificar nuestro camino de fe en la vida habitual., en una dinámica que se mueve entre Epifanía y seguimiento, entre manifestación y vocación. El relato del Evangelio indica las características esenciales del itinerario de fe, que es el itinerario de los discípulos de todos los tiempos, también del nuestro, a partir de la pregunta que Jesús dirige a los discípulos que comienzan a seguirle: «¿Qué buscáis?».

1.- Cada uno de nosotros, como ser humano, está en búsqueda: búsqueda de felicidad, búsqueda de amor, de una vida buena y plena. Dios Padre nos ha dado todo esto en su Hijo Jesús.

2. En esta búsqueda, es fundamental el papel de un verdadero testigo: de una persona que ha hecho antes el camino y ha encontrado al Señor. En el Evangelio, Juan Bautista es ese testigo. Por eso pudo orientar a sus discípulos hacia Jesús, que los involucra en una nueva experiencia diciendo: «Venid y veréis».

3.-Y aquellos dos no pudieron olvidar la belleza de este encuentro, hasta el punto de que el Evangelista anota incluso la hora: «Eran alrededor de las cuatro de la tarde». Solo un encuentro personal con Jesús genera un camino de fe y de discipulado, que, en esa hora que Dios conoce, puede dar un sentido pleno a nuestra vida y hacer fecundos nuestros proyectos y nuestras iniciativas.

4.- Es necesario ir en busca del Maestro Divino e ir a donde vive. La pregunta de los dos discípulos a Jesús, «¿Dónde vives?», tiene un sentido espiritual fuerte: expresa el deseo de saber dónde vive el Maestro. La vida de fe consiste en el deseo de estar con el Señor, reavivando el encuentro con Jesús en la oración, en la meditación de la Palabra de Dios y frecuentando los sacramentos para estar con él y dar fruto gracias a él, a su ayuda, a su gracia. Buscar a Jesús, encontrar a Jesús, seguir a Jesús: este es el camino (14-1-2018).
