CAIN AND ABEL: DEATH AND HUMAN DIGNITY

REFLECTIONS FROM ST JOHN PAUL II'S *EVANGELIUM VITAE* FOR PRO-LIFE MONTH

Last week, we saw where our understanding of the Gospel of life comes from. "After all, life on earth is not an 'ultimate' but a 'penultimate' reality; even so, it remains a sacred reality entrusted to us, to be preserved with a sense of responsibility and brought to perfection in love and in the gift of ourselves to God and to our brothers and sisters" (*EV*, 2). Knowing our goal is heaven while at the same time respecting the gift of life here on earth, we live out the Gospel of life in charity. This charity takes work. It calls us to reject the selfishness and pride that comes with the original sin we inherited.

To better understand our call, it is good to understand our enemy, death. "God did not make death, and he does not delight in the death of the living. For he has created all things that they might exist... God created man for incorruption, and made him in the image of his own eternity, but through the devil's envy death entered the world, and those who belong to his party experience it" (Wisdom 1:13-14; 2:23-24). I think because we know God is all powerful, we can attribute to God death. God does not desire death for anyone. He allows it as the natural consequence due to sin, as he continues to allow us to exercise free will. To choose to love, as we spoke of above, God has risked the possibility that we choose not to.

"The Gospel of life, proclaimed in the beginning when man was created in the image of God for a destiny of full and perfect life, is contradicted by the painful experience of death which enters the world and casts its shadow of meaninglessness over man's entire existence. Death came into the world as a result of the devil's envy and the sin of our first parents. And death entered it in a violent way, through the killing of Abel by his brother Cain: 'And when they were in the field, Cain rose up against his brother Abel, and killed him' (Genesis 4:8). This first murder is presented with singular eloquence in a page of the Book of Genesis which has universal significance: it is a page rewritten daily, with inerasable and degrading frequency,

in the book of human history" (EV, 7).

I'm sure you remember the story. Cain and Abel both make an offering to God. God prefers Abel's offering to Cain's (and doesn't give a reason why). Cain, envious of his brother, kills and buries him. God notices, as "the voice of your brother's blood is crying to me from the ground" (Genesis 4:10). God gives Cain a chance to confess but Cain selfishly answers, "Am I my brother's keeper?" God who, remember, despises death, chooses mercy on Cain, marking him and condemning him to the wilderness. "In the account of Abel's murder by his brother Cain, Scripture reveals the presence of anger and envy in man, consequences of original sin, from the beginning of human history. Man has become the enemy of his fellow man."¹

"Brother kills brother. Like the first fratricide, every murder is a violation of the 'spiritual' kinship uniting mankind in one great family, in which all share the same fundamental good: equal personal dignity. Not infrequently the kinship 'of flesh and blood' is also violated, for example when threats to life arise within the relationship between parents and children, such as happens in abortion, or when, in the wider context of family or kinship, euthanasia is encouraged or practiced" (EV, 8). The horror of such actions against life should be obvious, however Cain, the first murderer, wasn't horrified by his action.

Instead of remorse, he lied to God. "I do not know; am I my brother's keeper?" "Cain tries to cover up his crime with a lie. This was and still is the case, when all kinds of ideologies try to justify and disguise the most atrocious crimes against human beings... Cain does not wish to think about his brother and refuses to accept the responsibility which every person has towards others. We cannot but think of today's tendency for people to refuse to accept responsibility for their brothers and sisters. Symptoms of this trend include the lack of solidarity towards society's weakest members such as the elderly, the infirm, immigrants, children, and the indifference frequently found in relations between the world's peoples when basic values such as survival, freedom, and peace are involved" (EV, 8). We have seen just how little human life has been valued by so many in war, in genocide, in abortion, in mass murder, the refusal to accept responsibility for the other. Indeed, that responsibility is exactly what we are called to in justice toward our brothers and sisters, because of their inherent dignity being made in the image of God. "Whoever attacks human life, in some way attacks God" (EV, 9).

We can see what happens to Cain. His life is permanently changed by his act. He is cursed to live in a wasteland, the wilderness, rather than the pastoral comfort of his farm. "Murderous violence profoundly changes man's environment... uncertainty and restlessness will follow him forever" (EV, 9). In the snuffing out of a life, the murderer sees his own life radically diminished by his act. God sees this and is merciful to Cain, putting the mark on his forehead to protect him from others with murderous intent. "Not even a murderer loses his personal dignity, and God himself pledges to guarantee this. And it is precisely here that the paradoxical mystery of the merciful justice of God is shown forth" (EV, 9). Murder touches all: the victim, the victim's family and community, as well as the murderer himself.

The Gospel of life seeks to elevate the dignity and therefore the life of every single person. No one deserves to be murdered, from the womb to the jail to the tomb. It's those most vulnerable, those whose dignity is harder to perceive because of their state in life, who need to have their dignity protected.
