#### **Catechetical Corner**

The United States Conference of Catholic Bishops(USCCB) identifies seven themes in Catholic Social Teaching: <u>Life and Dignity of the Human Person</u>, <u>Call to Family</u>, <u>Community and Participation</u>, <u>Option for the Poor and Vulnerable</u>, <u>Rights and Responsibilities</u>, <u>Solidarity</u>, <u>Care for God's Creation</u>, and <u>The Dignity of Work and the Rights</u> of Workers.

The fourth theme is Rights and Responsibilities. The Catholic tradition teaches that human dignity can be protected and a healthy community can be achieved only if human rights are protected and responsibilities are met. Therefore, every person has a fundamental right to life and a right to those things required for human decency. Corresponding to these rights are duties and responsibilities—to one another, to our families, and to the larger society.
