Contact Tracing

When someone tests positive for COVID-19, the Washington Ozaukee Health Department will conduct “contact tracing” to quickly identify, assess, and isolate people who have been exposed to COVID-19. When a Catholic Formation student, catechist, senior leader or staff tests positive for COVID-19, the Catholic Formation Department will notify Lumen Christi School if the individual was present in the school building. The Catholic Formation Department will also notify those who may have been in close contact while they were in Catholic Formation Classes. **Close contacts** include individuals who have been within 6 feet of the individual for at least 15 minutes. Contacts are only informed that they may have been exposed to a patient with the infection. They are not told the identity of the patient who may have been exposed to them. This notification will be done via email.

When a Catholic Formation Student tests Positive

When a Catholic Formation student tests positive for COVID-19 or comes into close contact with someone that tests positive for COVID-19, they will need to stay home from Catholic Formation until the appropriate quarantine period has been reached. Close contact is defined as being within six feet of someone that tested positive for COVID-19 for at least fifteen cumulative minutes over a 24-hour period.

When a Catholic Formation Student Tests Positive or a Student has been in “Close Contact” with a Positive Case

The following chart delineates how long students in such situations will need to stay at home before returning to Catholic Formation Classes. If a student is going to miss Catholic Formation classes, the formation director for their age group will provide them with a virtual lesson or a lesson that can be completed at home. Please stay in contact with your healthcare provider, our Catholic Formation Office, and the local health department. They will guide you through the quarantine and isolation process, and will determine the best date for returning to Catholic Formation.

A negative test does not change the quarantine timeframe or the number of days the student is assigned for virtual instruction.

IF	THEN	Calendar days before student can return to Catholic Formation
Your child tests positive for COVID-19	If your student is missing a class, they will be given the home study class option for the class that they miss. The last day prior to your child’s return to Catholic Formation in person, your child must be symptom-free.	At least 10 days from date of test or onset date
Someone in your child’s household tests positive for COVID-19	Your student will be given the home study class option during the time any members of the household that test positive are isolating plus an additional fourteen calendar days after the infected member/s of the household are released from isolation. This assumes that the student continues to be in direct, close contact with the household member while they are infectious. <i>If the COVID-19 positive household member is able to isolate separately from the student, the student would follow the return to formation guidelines for “close contacts.” This also assumes your student does not develop symptoms during the quarantine period</i> the class that they miss. The last day prior to your child’s return to Catholic Formation in person, your child must be symptom-free.	At least 24 From the date of household member’s test onset date.
Someone your child has been in “close contact” with tests positive for COVID-19.	If your student is missing a class, they will be given the home study class option for the class that they miss. If your student is symptom-free throughout this time, your student can return to in person Catholic Formation instruction. <i>This assumes your child does not develop symptoms during the quarantine period.</i>	At least 14 Days from date of exposure.
