**A NOTE FROM  
FATHER DANIEL . . .**

**Called to Happiness: Blessed are those who mourn, the poor,  
the humble, the pure of heart...**

This month our G.I.F.T. theme: Called to Happiness, reminds us of the universal call to holiness. As we reflect on holiness, we consider among other things the Beatitudes and the preferential option for the poor. Our readings this weekend call our attention back to these aspects of our Christian Life.

In our first reading, we encounter Elijah, who is sent to the widow of Zarephath. Elijah had come to King Ahab to speak to him about God's punishment and reward, and to call him to the exclusive worship of the God of Israel. Ahab argued with Elijah by saying that Moses had warned against worshipping other gods, saying that if such be done, rain would not fall, yet rain continued to fall on a land abundant with altars to other gods. Elijah then brought drought upon the land to prove Ahab wrong. Once the drought settles upon the land, God sends Elijah to the widow, who is near starvation along with her son. Later, her son dies and Elijah is compelled to bring him back to life and to do so must give up on the drought. This is an experience of learning for Elijah. The theological argument he engages in with the king is of profound importance, yet in proving his point he disregards the suffering of the poor. God has to expose him to the suffering of the widow in order for him to understand what matters the most to God. This passage shows us as well what is the most dear in God's heart, the suffering of the poor. We are invited to at least two reflections: 1) To understand that in our time of suffering and distress, God is not indifferent to us; actually there is nothing that God cares more about than our suffering. 2) To examine our lives and see if we have allowed things other than the suffering around us to take priority. Our mission is to be God's eyes that look towards the poor and suffering, our hands are meant to be God's hands that reach out to bring comfort, peace and justice. In my family, in my workplace, in my community, am I one who is specially attentive to the poor, the suffering, the lonely? Am I one who seeks to comfort above all else? Have I allowed my own pride and agendas to take priority? Am I so caught up in proving a point, in proving myself that I have forgotten that the whole purpose of life is to reach out in love to those around me? What is more important in my interactions—to be right or to be compassionate? Blessed are the poor and those who mourn because God's love is preferentially with them. May we all look to them first just as God does.

In the Gospel, Jesus praises the offering of the widow. The fact that Jesus even notices the widow in the midst of all the rich once again reinforces the idea that God is intent on the poor. This widow exemplifies for us an attitude that is essential to holiness, purity of heart. Her heart fully trusts God. She gives all she has. Personally, I would dare say that this kind of abandonment is at the heart of holiness. This absolute trust in which we do not calculate, we do not hold back, we give everything because we are certain that God will always provide, will always take care of us. This is not an argument for financial recklessness, this is about a spiritual attitude. It is hard for us to keep our minds and hearts pure and at peace because many thoughts make us doubt that God is truly working for us in all things. We are constantly upset by the ups and downs of life and always struggling with the situations we face because deep down we just think nothing is the way it is supposed to be. What if instead of just assuming that everything is wrong and broken, we were to try to approach our lives and our situations from the perspective of trust. Knowing that in all things God is working out our salvation (this of course excludes objectively evil situations that must be opposed and changed, such as abuse or injustice); what if instead of fighting every situation I face, I were to take a step back and ask: what is God inviting me to learn through this situation? What are the wounds that are made apparent by this situation that God might want to heal? How can this situation help me grow? What attachments and places of pride are touched by this situation as a call to let go, and grow in humility and freedom?

May we continue to grow in holiness/happiness as we place our trust in God and reclaim our mission in life to care for the poor and suffering, A.M.D.G., Father Daniel
