A Note from Deacon George

Each week at Mass, we hear selected readings from the Bible. In general, the first reading that we hear is from the Old Testament, then we have a response based on the Psalms, followed by a reading from the New Testament, and finally, a reading from the Gospels. In fact, much of the Mass has its basis in Scripture.

Since the Bible is so important to the understanding of our faith, it is important to understand its origins. What we call the Old Testament is also known as the Hebrew Bible. The Stories that make up the Hebrew Bible existed in oral and written form for many centuries. For instance, the Book of Kings, tells of King Josiah, who ruled the Kingdom of Judah from 640 to 610 BC, who read the Law of Moses to the people.

The first attempt to collect all of the books and write down the Oral histories came during the Babylonian Exile around 587 to 539 BC. With the Temple destroyed and the Jewish people scattered in captivity, the stories of God's special purpose for the Jewish people were needed to give the people cohesiveness, faith and hope. This collection became known as the Torah or in Greek, the Pentateuch, which became the first five books of the Bible.

Around 100 BC, in Alexandria, Egypt, a Greek version of the Jewish Scriptures was collected and published. It was called the Septuagint (meaning 70) since it was believed that 72 Jewish elders labored to produce this book, and Greek was the common language at the time. The Septuagint collected 46 books, and was the common form of the Scriptures for many centuries.

The Septuagint was used by Jesus' followers, as well as the many writings from the Apostles and from Paul. The Letters of Saint Paul are the earliest Christian writings that we have coming from around 20 years after Jesus' death and resurrection. The Gospels followed later. Scholars believe that the Gospel of Mark, which is believed to be the first Gospel was written somewhere between 66 to 70 AD (though some place it as early as 50 AD). This was followed by Matthew and Luke's Gospels from around 85 to 90 AD, and, finally, John's Gospel from between 90 to 110 AD, though the Gospel writings may have existed earlier in some oral or written form. Finally, it was in 419 AD that the Second Council of Carthage affirmed the books that make up what we call the New Testament today.

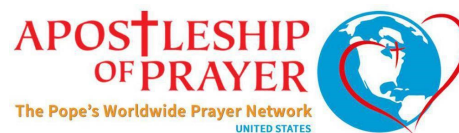
