An Update from Father Daniel

June 6, 2020 we received communication both from state authorities and from our Bishop, His Excellency Salvatore R. Matano that we can now hold religious gatherings with up to 25% occupancy while maintaining social distancing and all policies and procedures established by our Bishop in communication of May 21, which we shared with all during a Town Hall online meeting on May 24 as well as through our bulletin, social media, website, and postal service letter.

In order to keep social distance the actual capacity of our churches at this time will be 65 at Saint Anthony, 75 at Holy Cross and 85 at All Saints.

Given that this is only about half of our Sunday Mass attendance, as you know we have modified our Mass schedule so that all have an opportunity to attend Sunday Mass every week.

Our new Mass Schedule is:

Saint Anthony Parish: Tuesday 10:30 am, Saturday (Sunday Vigil Mass) 4:30 pm and Sunday 2:00 pm

Holy Cross Parish: Wednesday 10:30 am, Sunday 8:30 am and Sunday 4:30 pm.

All Saints Parish: Thursday 10:30 am, Saturday (Sunday Vigil Mass) 2:30 pm and Sunday 10:30 am.

Attending Mass:

To prevent having to turn people away at the door, **in person attendance at Mass is by sign up only.** To sign up you can go online (we email out the sign up link every Friday and post it on our Facebook daily) or you can call the office at (607) 241-0821 Tuesday-Wednesday-Thursday 9 am-4 pm.

As explained in previous weeks, much will be different when you come to Mass.

Here are a few reminders (for the complete information please refer to previous communications):

- You will be required to wear a **mask** from the moment you leave your car until you have returned to your car
- **Restrooms** and crying rooms will not be available
- There will be no coffee hours or congregations of people of any kind before or after Mass
- When you arrive you might have to wait at the door, yellow lines on the sidewalk will help you maintain social distance
- Once you come in we ask that you **sanitize** your hands
- You will be provided with a one use only **worship aid** that we ask you either take home or put in the recycling bin on your way out.
- You will be **ushered to a specific seat**, we will seat people from front to back, preserving 6 feet distance between those that do not live together. We ask for especial flexibility and responsibility with this. You will likely not end up seating where you usually do. Please be very careful to keep six feet distance at all times from all who do not live with you.
- Once all on the list have been seated or once it is time to begin Mass we will lock the doors to the church. **Please make sure to get to church at least 5 minutes prior** (15 if you can) before the start of Mass.

- At **Communion** time there will be only one communion station. **We will ask all to remain in their seats. Father will call forward one pew at a time.** Please use the yellow lines on the floor to help you maintain 6 feet distance from all that do not live with you.
- Once you receive Holy Communion, you will return to your pew as usual.
- At the **end of Mass**, we will once again ask you to stay in your pew, and you will be **ushered out** to make sure that social distance is kept.
- There will be no sign of peace and **no holding hands** at any time during the liturgy.
- **There will be no collection**, if you want to make a donation to the church and you are not doing it online remember that for visitors and the few that continue to use envelopes for their donations as well as for second collections, maintenance collections, candles and other donations, we now have **one sacrificial offering station** in each of our churches, where you can drop in your donations at any time. There is only one of these stations at each of the churches. All other donations boxes and slots have either been removed or sealed so that all donations are put into the one more secure sacrificial offering station, and also to limit contact surfaces that have to be disinfected constantly. The Sacrificial Offering Stations are a drop box safe and different colors of envelopes are provided for the different types of donations such as: regular collection, donation towards deferred maintenance, second collections, candle donations, fair trade coffee donations, coffee hour donations, poor box. If you continue to receive a personalized set of envelopes, then we ask you to use your envelopes and put them directly into the drop box safe.

I encourage all to sign up (online or by calling the office) and join us for Mass in person. For those that do not feel safe or are homebound we will continue to livestream all of our Masses and other devotions.

Please remember that we stream simultaneously through our Facebook page: www.facebook.com/netcatholic and through our YouTube Channel: www.youtube.com/c/netcatholic. We do this so that if the quality is not very good in one platform you can quickly switch to the other. They seem to “take turns” in failing. A few weeks ago the quality on Facebook was very poor, for the past couple weeks the quality on YouTube has been very poor, so please just check and switch platforms as needed. In the 3 months that we have been doing this we have only had both platforms fail at the same time 3 times. These issues are not something we can control locally. They either rest with the platforms themselves or with our internet provider, so please once again take advantage of the fact that we stream simultaneously on two platforms and switch between them as needed.

Please also remember that once our streaming ends the recording remain available, so you can go back and watch them whenever you want. This means that even if both platforms were to fail at the same time for a given Mass, it is more than likely that with 6 Masses over the weekend, there would be a recording available for you to attend Mass online.

An Update from Father Daniel (cont.)

Keep in mind that the obligation to attend Mass remains lifted at this time.

Baptisms, Weddings and Funerals

At this point we can celebrate Baptisms, Weddings and Funerals but we will only be able to have a limited number of people in church (65 at Saint Anthony, 75 at Holy Cross and 85 at All Saints) These limits will not change until social distance is no longer necessary. If you want to request one of these celebrations, please contact Father Daniel directly.

Sacraments of Healing: Confession and Anointing of the Sick

Confession is by appointment. You can call, text or email Father Daniel to set up an appointment. Anointing is done as requested. Please call, text or email Father Daniel.

First Reconciliation, First Eucharist and Confirmation

We will be contacting the families this week to schedule First Reconciliation celebrations between June 16 and July 16.

We will be contacting the families to schedule First Holy Communion Celebrations to happen at Sunday Mass between July 19 and September 6.

We are waiting to hear from our Bishop regarding a new schedule of Confirmation Celebrations and we will let families know as soon as we know.

Parish Office

Our parish offices will reopen June 30 if the state and the Diocese allow it. The offices will be relocated in each of our parish campuses to allow for social distance. The office at Saint Anthony

will be relocated to the former nursery between the Church and the Parish Hall. The office at Holy Cross will be relocated to one of the former classrooms in the narthex of the church. The office at All Saints will be relocated to the former Choir Room. Our parish office will reopen with the following schedule:

Tuesday 8am– Noon and 1—4 pm at Saint Anthony
Wednesday 8am– Noon and 1—4 pm at Holy Cross
Thursday 8am– Noon and 1—4 pm at Saint Anthony
