HOLY HOUR AND STATIONS OF THE CROSS FOR LENT

Each Friday during the Season of Lent, our Parish will be holding our annual Holy Hour at 5:30 p.m., followed by Stations of the Cross at 6:30 p.m. All are invited to come and spend some time with the Lord in Eucharistic Adoration, and walk the way of the Cross in preparation for Holy Week and Easter Sunday. Holy Hour and the Stations will begin this Friday, February 16.

LENTEN REGULATIONS AND GUIDELINES

Lenten fast and regulations for the Diocese of Worcester are as follows: Abstinence from meat is to be observed by all Catholics 14 years of age and older on Ash Wednesday, Good Friday, and all the Fridays of Lent. Fasting is to be observed by all Catholics who are 18 years of age but not yet 59 years of age on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. Those who are bound to fast may take only one full meal. Two smaller meals are permitted if necessary to maintain strength according to one's needs, but eating solid food between meals is not permitted. Catholics should not lightly excuse themselves from these prescribed Lenten penitential practices.

LENTEN READING MATERIAL

Many options for Lenten spiritual reading have been left at each entrance to the Church. All parishioners are invited to take one or two booklets to incorporate into your prayer life the great deal of wisdom found in them that comes to us from St. Teresa of Calcutta, Henri Nouwen, Pope Francis and others. These small bits of religious wisdom give us much to reflect upon as we go travel through this holy season in preparation for Easter.

OPERATION RICE BOWL

Cartons for Operation Rice Bowl can be found at each entrance to the Church. For those who participate in this Lenten program, we invite to place coins in the carton and we will collect them at the end of Lent, and forward the total to Catholic Relief Services. The money collected is used to serve the needs of the poor in America and throughout the world, and those who struggle through natural disasters.

ON THE EUCHARIST

"Reading the account of the institution of the Eucharist in the Synoptic Gospels , we are struck by the simplicity of the 'solemnity' with which Jesus, on the evening of the Last Supper, instituted this great sacrament. There is an episode which in some ways serves as its prelude: the anointing at Bethany. A woman, whom John identifies as Mary the sister of Lazarus, pours a flask of costly ointment over Jesus' head, which provokes from the disciples – and from Judas in particular – an indignant response, as if this act, in light of the needs of the poor, represented an intolerable 'waste.' But Jesus' own reaction is completely different. While in no way detracting from the duty of charity toward the needy, for whom the disciples must always show special care... he looks toward his imminent death and burial, and sees this act of anointing as an anticipation of the honor which his body will continue to merit even after his death, indissolubly bound as it is to the mystery of his person."

THE NEED FOR SEX EDUCATION: "Sex education should also include respect and appreciation for differences, as a way of helping the young to overcome their self-absorption and to be open and accepting of others. Beyond the understandable difficulties which individuals may experience, the young need to be helped to accept their own body as it was created, for 'thinking that we enjoy absolute power over our own bodies turns, often subtly, into thinking that we enjoy absolute power over creation'... An appreciation of our body as male or female is also necessary for our own self-awareness in an encounter with others different from ourselves. In this way we can joyfully accept the specific gifts of another man or woman, the work of God the Creator, and find mutual enrichment."

FROM THE PASTOR

Some of the stories in the Scriptures we encounter and are called to reflect upon are sometimes beyond belief. For example, the story in this week's first reading from Genesis being the story of God calling Abraham to sacrifice his son Isaac. We can only ask ourselves, "Did God really do this? Did God really and truly set up Abraham by telling him that he must sacrifice his son on a griddle?" The answer is an apparent yes.

Using this story as a connection to our lives, seeing the bigger picture as to why God would demand something from us that seems either irrational at times or downright impossible is a hard pill to swallow. We know we want all things easy and plush. I know I do. But we also know that things get in the way of our easiness and smooth living. However, do we see such "things" that get in the way of an uneventful day as opportunities to grow as a Christian?

Abraham had his day all set. He was going to take Isaac to Dairy Queen for an ice cream, then head out to the Red Sox game at Fenway Park to watch them beat up on the dreaded Yankees again, and then have a nice dinner in Boston after the Sunday afternoon game, drive home with some lively conversation between father and son, and then finish off the night with the watching of the replay where Isaac made such an incredible catch on a foul ball in the State Street Pavilion, leaning over the pole that holds the fans in, reaching down three feet while Abraham held onto the shirt of his son, that it made all the news stations. The foul ball by Isaac catch was so good that even Big Papi, while still playing at the time, tipped his helmet to Isaac for making a spectacular catch. What a way to end a good day between father and son.

Instead, God tells Abraham to gather together some wood, put your son on the griddle as the sacrificial lamb, and get ready to start the fire. Which day would you prefer. If you answered the first one, and not the second, then that makes you part of the majority of 99.9% who would prefer the day at Dairy Queen and in Boston. It's much easier, and much less stress, for obvious reasons.

On the other hand, how many of us can say we have the faith of Abraham? A level of faith that absolutely, unequivocally trusted that God, in his own way that was fully mysterious to Abraham, was going to bring good out of the sacrificial offering of Isaac. Thus, one purpose of this seemingly irrational, violent, and disturbing story that we find in the Book of Genesis is that God, in his own way, will allow situations in our lives that will, over the long haul, bring about a deeper faith in him that we previously did not know. And quite honestly, this is a hard truth. It's a hard truth because most of us want the easy road to Paradise. I know I do. Realistically, however, this easy road may be easy for some moments here and there, as the disciples experience in the Gospel story on the mountain this Sunday; easy in the sense that a semblance of quiet and peace reign for the moment, appreciating that we have such moments still.

The hard truth of our faith, however, - and this is a lifelong spiritual battle for most every one of us – is that as Christians, a Cross is never far away from being carried by us. Smaller, yet sometimes painful crosses, that were made from the wood of Jesus's Cross. Our faith is never deepened in Christ by way of the easy road and easy life that many folks seek. Christian faith is deepened through hard moments and hard experiences, better known as cross-carrying. All one needs to do is read the Epistles of St. Paul to grasp this fundamental Christian factoid, most especially Galatians.

The part missing from the story in Genesis regarding Abraham sacrificing Isaac is the certain anguish that Abraham had to know as he and Isaac, instead of walking into Fenway Park, walked to a griddle for burning.
