RELIGIOUS QUOTE OF THE WEEK

THIS SHALL NEVER HAPPEN TO YOU: Mt 16:21-22; “Peter was examining the issue by human and earthly reasoning. He thought it disgraceful to Jesus as something unworthy of him. Jesus responded sharply, in effect saying, ‘My suffering is not an unseemly matter. You are making this judgment with a carnal mind. If you had listened to my teachings in a godly way, tearing yourself away from carnal understanding, you would know that this of all things most becomes me. You seem to suppose that to suffer is unworthy of me. But I say to you that for me not to suffer is of the devil’s mind.’ So he repressed Peter’s alarm by contrary arguments. Remember that John, accounting it unworthy of Christ to be baptized by him, was persuaded by Christ to baptize him, saying, ‘Let it be so now.’ So we find Peter as well, forbidding Christ to wash his feet. He is met by the words, ‘If I do not wash you, you have no part in me.’ Here too Jesus restrains him by the mention of the opposite, and by the severity of the reproof he repressed his fear of suffering.”

RECONCILIATION AND PENANCE

Mortal and Venial Sin: “In another passage of the New Testament, namely in St. Matthew’s Gospel, Jesus himself speaks of a ‘blasphemy against the Holy Spirit’ that ‘will not be forgiven’ by reason of the fact that in its manifestations it is an obstinate refusal to be converted to the love of the Father of mercies. Here of course it is a question of extreme and radical manifestations: rejection of God, rejection of his grace and therefore opposition to the very source of salvation - these are manifestations whereby a person seems to exclude himself voluntarily from the path of forgiveness. It is to be hoped that very few persist to the end in this attitude of rebellion or even defiance of God. Moreover, God and his merciful love is greater than our hearts, as St. John further teaches us, and can overcome all our psychological and spiritual resistance. So that, as St. Thomas writes, ‘considering the omnipotence and mercy of God, no one should despair of the salvation of anyone in this life.’

TRIP TO POLAND APRIL 2021

Our Parish trip to Poland has been rescheduled for next year. The new dates for the trip will be April 12-22, 2021. The cost of the trip is \$3300, and single supplement \$699. We will visit cities and sites such as Warsaw and its historic monuments, Malbork Castle, Gdansk, Torun and the house where Nicolaus Copernicus was born, Czestochowa, a tour of Auschwitz-Birkenau, Krakow and a visit to the 16th century Wawel Royal Castle, as well as the Jewish Quarter, the birthplace of St. John Paul II and the Museum of Cardinal Karol Wojtyla, and other cultural experiences of Poland. Evil becomes good through a grand magic trick. If the Church does not denounce the illusion that these new ‘rights’ bring, chaos will ensue. And it will lead the world into darkness. Paul VI showed this prophetic courage with his encyclical *Humanae Vitae* on marriage and the regulation of births. John Paul II constantly spoke about the ravages of the culture of death. Benedict XVI called Europe to re-discover its Christian roots. And, today, Francis rejects the economic exploitation of man by man. The recent popes have not been followed by the governments of the West. The evil has worsened. But we must not throw up our hands.”

One of the many fundamental meanings of our Christian faith is the difficult words of Jesus pertaining to denying ourselves, picking up any cross aimed at us, and following after him. This great Christian truth, first, recalls that we are not meant to stay here. We do not have a lasting home on Mother Earth, especially when Mother Mary awaits, because the cross will eventually be put to use. And second, the words of Jesus are a stark reminder that cross-carrying is part of the deal, if you will. It would be more than nice if we could escape this life without much trouble along the way. As mentioned in this column a few weeks back, even the Holy Family had close calls with the violence of this world, as well as some pretty bad people along the way, the last ones for Jesus being the revolutionary Barabbas and the power-hungry Pilate. So, if the Holy Family had troubles, then where does that leave us? But realists we are, if nothing else. Most people I'm blessed to know have carried their crosses well when thrust upon them. I'm not saying they are accepted with joy. But carry them with grace they do.

Jesus' reaction to Peter in the Gospel seems harsh ("Get behind me, Satan!"), and it is, because what's at stake are all the marbles of eternal life. How can we not love the Lord's approach of allowing *absolutely nothing and no one* to get in the way of his hour, his mission, and his victory? Not even the words and apparent concern from his lead Apostle Peter could alter what God had prepared through his Son! That's the kind of God I want to worship! One that calls out the evil in his presence, not assuming a politically correct manner of having to be nice to everyone because he's more concerned about hurting someone's feelings rather than bringing them home to eternal joy. That sort of foolishness accomplishes no lasting good. I'm not saying we should subscribe to the school of hurting others. By no means! Love your neighbor! But the greater truth of Jesus' life, death, and resurrection far outweighs any minor debacles we experience here. The late, great Pope St. John Paul II is the best example in my lifetime. He spoke and taught the truth with a combination of force and gentleness. Compromise the Christian truth he never did!

As we come to the end of August and near the time of year when the weather cools and schools, we pray, teach our youth effectively through a lasting pandemic, whichever model is used, may the Lord Jesus lead each of us in the ways of his lasting goodness and love. St. Peter lost his mind for a moment thinking he was defending and speaking good to Jesus. His heart was in the right place, but his understanding was not far along the path of God's plan for salvation. A quick turnaround was in order to shake Peter up. And get shaken he did. We may have to experience the same as Peter once in a great while. If it happens, listen to what God is saying for your life. His goal for us in our free will is to land us in his presence forever. Which, by the way, we have much say about.

FROM THE PASTOR

There is only three people who ever rebuked St. Peter: Jesus, St. Paul, and Peter's mother. Seriously, we know every mother rebukes their son at some point in their lives. We can be pretty certain that St. Peter was a good son, obeying his parents in every request, performing every chore given to him, reciting his Hebrew prayers when supposed to, not turning his back on his Jewish neighbors and friends, and a fisherman who could compete with the best of them in that walk of life. Peter would have won many fishing derbies.

St. Peter was undoubtedly a strong guy, strong enough to carry forth the teachings of Jesus and lead a Church that is the Bride of Christ and the source of salvation. He had broad shoulders to carry the load Jesus placed on him, a load that included eventually the martyrdom his own life. Of the 12 Apostles, St. Peter gives us more to reflect on about our faith in Christ than the rest of them put together. Judas showed us what not to do. Peter shows us what to do, except for every once in a while, like three denials and this Sunday's Gospel.

After last week's Gospel when Peter spoke the greatest truth of all, inspired by the Spirit of God; "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God," it didn't take very long for Peter's holy inspiration to turn into dis-inspiration. One moment he had the Holy Spirit speaking clearly and forcefully through him. The next moment he opened himself to the wiles of Satan, who sought to prevent the Lord from carrying his Cross for the world's salvation. Anything that stopped the most perfect act of unconditional love, the guy with the pitchfork was all for it. And, as he continues to today, he would use any person made in God's image and likeness to assist in bringing about his evil result. Peter went from the Holy Spirit to Satan faster than we can say "Jack Rabbit." Or that lake down in Webster (Lake Chargoggagoggmanchauggagoggchaubunagungamaugg). Trying to say this name would have provided St. Peter with lots of time and space in his soulful movement from the Spirit to the Devil.

However, we know that Peter meant good when he told Jesus there was no way they, the Apostles, were going to let their Master carry a cross in Jerusalem and die on it. Peter the tough-guy bodyguard was ready, willing, and able to knock any person on their keister who attempted to force Jesus into such an act. After all, he did cut off the ear of the slave in the Garden of Gethsemane when they came to arrest Jesus much later in this salvation story. This shows he was ready to "protect" his Lord. Peter's well-oiled alarm system of protecting Jesus was like that of a nuclear warning system during the height of the Cold War. He was ever vigilant toward deflecting anything and anyone who sought to hurt his Master. Turns out, however, that Jesus didn't need a bodyguard. In fact, knowing what we know now, we believe in our heart of hearts that Jesus is *The Bodyguard*, protecting our bodies – and souls – to the point of resurrection.

Peter meaning good in saying he would stop the Lord's death, one would think, would count for something. Have you ever tried saying or doing something good for someone with genuine concern in your heart, but instead it led to a less than good result? This happens a lot. We mean well, but our well-meaning can be misplaced because we didn't understand the entire story or potential inherent dangers. Lighting a fireplace fire in a house to provide light and warmth for someone during the winter months is a well-meaning act. Forgetting to put the fire out when you go to bed upstairs can burn the house down. Peter forgot to put out the fire with Jesus. And if the Lord didn't correct him, if the Lord allowed Peter to carry out his well-meaning words of "No such thing shall ever happen to you," if the Lord allowed the light of Peter to shine above and beyond the Light of the World, then the House of Salvation would have burned down. God knows best.
