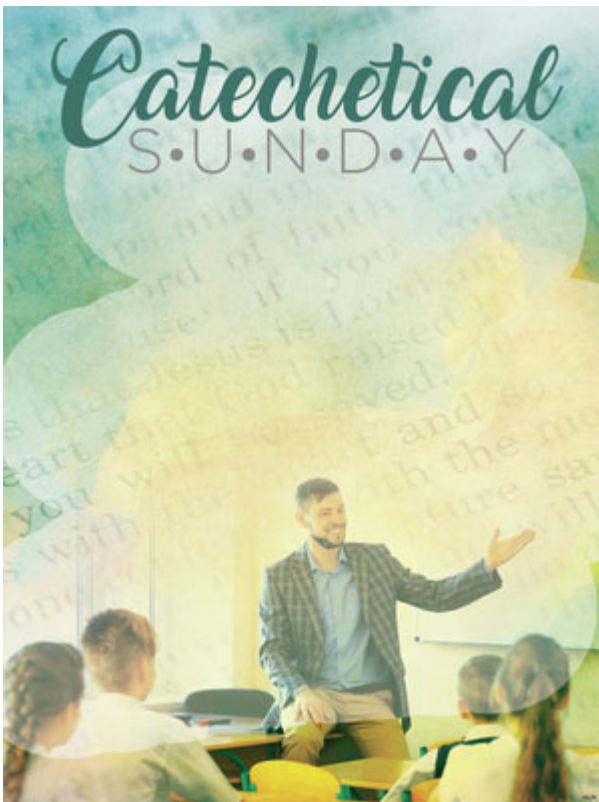

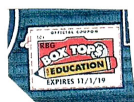

NON-TRIVIAL PURSUITS

Weekly challenge from your Faith Formation Team (9-15-2019)

A very popular spring festival, although not included in the Law of Moses, is Purim. It celebrates God's protection of the Israelites from a scheming antisemitic official in the court of the Persian emperor. The events are recorded in a book named for the heroine, a Jewish girl conscripted into the imperial harem. What was her name?

Answer to Last Week's Question: (9-8-2019)

In the escape from Egypt, the Hebrews left in haste, and had to bake their bread without waiting for it to rise. The unleavened bread at the Seder recalls this hurried escape.

Preparation for the annual Passover celebration included a rigorous cleaning to remove any trace of leaven – any crumbs of bread or bits of grain that might become fermented if they got damp). In many families the afternoon before the Passover begins traditionally includes a "hunt" through all the house to be sure nothing leavened remains hidden.

In addition, to this Passover connection, in the instructions for the Temple sacrifices, the Lord declared that grain offerings which were burned on the altar must always be unleavened. Spiritually, "unleavened" represented what is pure and uncontaminated, as God's chosen ones are called to be.

Jesus spoke of leaven in both positive and negative contexts: the Kingdom of God will spread like leaven through a batch of dough, but beware the "leaven of the Pharisees," false "checklist salvation" teaching that also spreads.

God's mercy: always present to all

During Ordinary time the Lectionary presents stories and teachings from Jesus' everyday ministry. This week's readings remind us that God's mercy is always present.

Luke's gospel continues Jesus' teaching on the road to Jerusalem. The Pharisees and scribes criticize Jesus for the company he keeps. In response, Jesus tells them three parables about being lost, being found, and rejoicing:

The ones who listen vs the ones who complain. Luke sets the context for Jesus' three parables by telling us who is *listening* to Jesus (tax collectors, prostitutes) and who is *complaining* about Jesus (Pharisees and scribes). The parables have good news for the ones who listen, and a call to *metanoia* for those who complain.

Good news for those who listen to Jesus. In the lost sheep and lost coin parables, Jesus says there is *great joy* in heaven over a sinner who changes his or her mind/heart (*metanoia*). In the lost sons parable, the younger son "comes to himself" or "comes to his senses" and returns to his father. Despite what the Pharisees say about sinners, Jesus tells the tax collectors and prostitutes that *change is possible and mercy is present*.

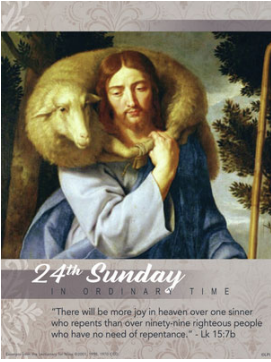
An invitation for those who complain about Jesus. In the lost sons parable, the older son is angry because his father welcomes and reinstates the younger son. When the older son refuses to enter the feast for his brother, his father leaves his guests and celebration to talk with him. The father patiently explains to the older son that he has always had his father's love and has lost nothing. Will the older son change his heart/mind (*metanoia*) and join the joyful feast? Jesus tells the Pharisees and scribes that *even the righteous* need change and mercy, especially in judging sinners.

This week's readings remind the believing community that God's mercy is always present. This is good news for everyone, the lost and the found. It is also good news for those who have never been lost. The righteous benefit from God's mercy as well: shielded from temptations never encountered, strengthened when others were weak. Do we set a higher value on our own virtue because we forget we are all equal beneficiaries of God's mercy? Do we see God's mercy in our own lives? Do we extend God's mercy to others?

Mercy is a keyword in the gospel today even though it does not appear in the text. But mercy is the motivating force behind the father's actions, and the experience of the younger son who has been forgiven. Only when the younger son has "hit bottom," so to speak, does he awaken to the notion of returning to his father's home, where he hopes to be a hired hand. And that part of the story is an accurate reflection of human nature. Often, before we seek repentance and ask forgiveness we must hit bottom. The younger son was not interested in repentance when he had plenty of money and resources! Only when he was feeding the pigs and desirous of their food did the realization strike him.

And so it may be with us. We must die to our own pride, self-assurance, and resources, recognizing that all is a gift of the Father. The son did not earn this money on his own. Perhaps it is only when we hit bottom with the recognition that all is the Father's, not our own, will we be ready to return to the embrace of mercy, and live a new life of reconciliation.

The scribes and the Pharisees are not happy. He whom the crowds follow, who multiplies loaves and fishes, and who heals those with infirmities also eats with tax collectors and sinners. In response to their grumblings, Jesus tells three parables of three things lost and found: a sheep, a coin, a son. In each parable the joy of finding is so great it must be shared with others. The shepherd and the woman invite their friends and neighbors to rejoice with them, while the father of the prodigal son slaughters the fattened calf and puts on a banquet with music and dancing.

There are many layers to these parables to be explored, but one of them is certainly the joy of finding. The shepherd wastes no time scolding his sheep, and the father of the prodigal won't even let his son complete his apology before he clothes him in a fine robe and new sandals. Jesus answers the scribes' and the Pharisees' self-righteous stinginess with abundant welcome. The tax collectors and sinners are not to be turned away from Jesus' table; they are the very reason he is here. St. Paul says in today's second reading, "This saying is trustworthy and deserves full acceptance: / Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners."

There is a lesson here for us, especially those of us who find our place in the pews every Sunday and holy day. Are we prone to grumbling too when we see those who drop in once or twice a year join us at the table of the Lord? Does our community practice the hospitality of Jesus who welcomed all with joy, love, and compassion? If we call ourselves Christian we must take on the path of Jesus: seek the lost and welcome the sinner.
