Weekly challenge from your Faith Formation Team (10-27-2019)

Friday is the Feast of All Saints and Saturday is All Souls Day. Which makes this a good time for a quick review question: Why is it incorrect to say, when someone has died, "Heaven has another angel"?

### Answer to Last Week's Question: (10-20-2019)

The Israelites were forty years in the wilderness of the Sinai peninsula – one year at the base of Sinai, one year crossing to the borders of Canaan – and thirty-eight years commonly referred to as "wandering." This wandering was the result of a failure of faith. When the spies returned from their scouting expedition in Canaan, they reported that the land was inhabited by giants and the Israelites would surely be destroyed if they tried to enter. Only Caleb and Joshua wanted to go forward as the Lord was directing. Persuaded by the majority report, the people rebelled, asking Moses to take them back to Egypt. Because of the people's lack of faith, the Lord decreed that they would not enter the Promised Land for a generation - until all the adults who had rebelled had died.

### The relationship that prayer expresses

During Ordinary time the Lectionary presents stories and teachings from Jesus' everyday ministry. This week's readings present stories about prayer and ask us to consider what prayer reveals.

Luke's gospel continues Jesus' teaching on the road to Jerusalem. Jesus tells the Pharisees a parable about prayer, a public saint, a public sinner, and a God who gives gifts.

A public saint. Jesus' hearers would recognize the Pharisee as a stock character: the super-pious good person. The Pharisee's prayer reveals who he really is: someone who blathers on, comparing himself favorably to everybody else. He graciously reminds God about the tax collector's deficiencies, in case God hasn't noticed. He is so busy enumerating his own self -professed righteousness that he has no room for God's gift of righteousness, stunting his relationship with God.

A public sinner. Jesus' hearers would recognize the tax collector as another stock character: the cheating, Roman-collaborating bad person. The tax collector's prayer reveals who he really is: a sinner and he knows it. The tax collector requires God's gift of righteousness because he has none of his own. Because he both needs and recognizes his need for God's gift, he receives it.

A God who gives gifts. Righteousness, a right relationship with God, is God's free and unmerited gift to humans. If we believe we already possess righteousness, God can't give it to us. We can't possess our own righteousness and receive it as a gift: possession and gift cancel each other out.

This week's readings, like last week's, present the difficulty of prayer. The first reading assures us that God hears the requests of the oppressed and humble. The gospel suggests how God acts on our requests. The parable describes a reversal: God rejects the outwardly good Pharisee and approves the outwardly sinful tax collector. God's kingdom confronts and subverts human expectations. God doesn't play by our rules. Do we assume we are already possess righteousness? Do we leave space for and accept God's gift? What does our prayer reveal about our relationship with God?



### **ALL SAINTS DAY 2019**

This Friday, the Church will once again celebrate the feast of All Saints. The Gospel will give us the Beatitudes of the Gospel of Matthew, sometimes called a "self-portrait" of Jesus. We sometimes wonder what a life of Christ would look like in a different age or culture, or from different perspectives. For this we have the saints. Each saint takes as a keynote the life and mission of Jesus, then plays this song in his or her own time and place as one expression of the Christian life. St. Francis of Assisi shows how this

is done in thirteenth-century Italy. St. Ignatius of Loyola shows how this is done in Reformation Spain. St Teresa of Calcutta shows how this is done in the late twentieth century. Our task is to play this song as well in our own time and place.

The gospel begins with Jesus ascending a mountain, taking his seat, and issuing these Beatitudes in a clear echo of the Sinai covenant when God himself issued the Law to Moses. It's as though Matthew is saying this teaching of Jesus is the (new) law. It enjoys pride of place.

In fact, chapters 5 through 7 are referred to as the Sermon on the Mount, opened by the Beatitudes. But it is the entire three chapters that might be considered the new "law" for the disciples.

The Beatitudes that Matthew gives us are translated into English as "Blessed," but they could just as easily be translated as "Happy" as in "Happy are the poor in spirit." These Beatitudes express a different way of approaching the world. The poor in spirit in Jesus' day were certainly not considered "blessed" or "happy," but for Jesus theirs was the kingdom of heaven. For Jesus, those mourning would be comforted and the meek would inherit the earth. A reversal was in order to be brought about by God himself. The kingdoms of this world do not alleviate all poverty and mourning. But God will! This doesn't mean we don't work to alleviate suffering, poverty, and the like, but it will happen once and for all with God himself as king.

The example of the saints shows us what the Christian life, the self-portrait of Jesus, looks like throughout history. We have many examples. Now let's go do this ourselves, live the Beatitudes in our time and place.
